The fifth annual Klamath Falls Club City Tennis Tournament, which welcomes entrants from Kingsley Field, suburban areas and the surrounding communities in addition to the city players, is scheduled at Moore Park from July 18 through 26.

Jimmy Jackson, city champion for the last three consecutive years has moved to Portland, thus opening the door for a new KF champion. Titlists back to defend their crowns are women's singles winner Gertrude Brooks, mixed doubles champs Earl and Gertrude Brooks, and junior women's singles queen, Eunice Anderson.

Castilani Now Laker Coach

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Johnny Castilani was named coach of the Minneapolis Lakers Saturday in a move that reunited him with his college meal ticket, high-scoring Elgin Baylor.

The 32-year-old former Seattle University coach succeeds Johnny Kundla, who quit last spring after coaching the National Basketball Assn. team for 10 years and now is basketball coach at the University of Minnesota.

Castilani's acceptance of the Laker job marks his first venture in pro basketball. After serving as freshman coach at Notre Dame he ran up a record of 49 victories and 9 defeats in two seasons at Seattle.

Presented to newsmen here, Castilani conceded the obvious: "I'm happy to get back with Baylor. There's only one Elgin Baylor."

Baylor's All-America performance thrust Seattle into the finals of the NCAA tournament in 1958.

Parks Resume Summer Slate

Hillsdale Captures Gold Cup

Hillsdale ran to his eighth and richest stakes victory of the year Saturday as he out-dueled Find in the stretch to win the \$162,100 Hollywood Gold Cup Handicap.

As a crowd estimated at 43,000 roared in excitement, jockey Tommy Barrow ushered the high-speed, Hoosier-bred colt into the lead and went on to win the \$100,000 net prize by about a length from Alfred G. Vanderbilt's Old Timer, the 9-year-old Find.

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Mills Little League Ball Park Dedication Slated For Tuesday

A plan inaugurated better than one year ago to provide Klamath Falls Little Leaguers with a regulation ball park of their own culminates at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, July 14, in the dedication ceremonies of the newly-completed Mills Little League Park at the corner of Vine and Owens streets.

Following a brief ceremony the umpires will cry "play ball," getting underway ballgames on both of the new diamonds. Twelve teams of Little Leaguers, six from the Klamath Falls Little League, Inc. and six from the South Suburban Little League will see action in the two games.

The dedication ceremony will include the invocation by Rev. Bob Groves, a brief message from a guest speaker yet to be named, short words from Gene Favell, KF Little League president and Maj. William Harris, South Suburban president, presentations by Charlie Bane and the presentation of the colors by Boy Scout Centennial Troop 100.

Following Tuesday night's grand opening it is planned that the Little Leaguers may finish out their 1959 schedule on the new diamonds. At the close of the first season additional work on the landscaping of the grounds is planned.

Much of the grass in a portion of the park has necessarily been killed during the construction of the park but the situation may be easily remedied, according to park officials.

The new park is the product of the concerted efforts of countless Klamath Falls business houses, construction companies, labor unions, sport fans, players, parents and interested individuals.

The majority of the services, labor, equipment and materials used in constructing the park has been donated or volunteered.

Although it is named Mills Little League Park, the plant does not belong to the Little League nor any one individual group. It remains the property of the city of Klamath Falls entirely, but the scheduling of activities on the field by the Park and Recreation Department will be beamed primarily towards both the Klamath Falls League and the South Suburban group.

The fences are so constructed that they may be removed if necessary in off-seasons to clear the area for other sports.

Year round maintenance on the field becomes the responsibility of the Klamath Falls Park and Recreation Department.
