

Sand Firms Sign Pact

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Agreements have been signed with the Teamsters Union by two Corvallis sand and gravel firms hit May 11 by a strike, the companies said Wednesday.

Corvallis Sand and Gravel Co. signed Sunday. Builders Supply signed Tuesday. Corvallis Sand and Gravel also said it has signed with the striking Operating Engineers Union. The operating engineers' dispute did not involve Builders Supply.

Pickets appeared last month before Corvallis Sand and Gravel. Then other sand and gravel operations at Salem and Independence, affiliated with the Cascade Employers Assn. of Portland, were shut down. The Salem and Independence plants still are closed.

John Ash Jr., head of Builders Supply, said action of his competitor forced him to sign with the Teamsters. He said the employers' organization had been weakened by the action of Corvallis Sand and Gravel.

The organization made no comment. A Corvallis Sand and Gravel spokesman refused to discuss terms of contracts the company signed with the Teamsters and Operating Engineers.

Ash disclosed that Builders Supply granted a 25-cent hourly wage increase retroactive to Jan. 1, 20 cents more next year and an additional 20 cents the following year.

Also in the new contract are provisions for an additional paid holiday—Veterans' Day Nov. 11—and a \$15.50 employer contribution to the Teamsters' health and welfare fund.

Communists Still Uneasy Over Recent Poland Riot

KRAMSKO, Poland (AP)—Communist authorities still show uneasiness two weeks after a religious riot in this town in southeast Poland they thought was a Communist showpiece.

Orders are out for more arrests in a roundup to check agitation for construction of a Catholic church. Local persons say at least 300 have been picked up, although officials say no more than 20 are under arrest.

Tadeusz Marx, Communist chief in the town and chairman of the local council, warned: "Before we build a church, which would cost millions of Zlotys we must build more schools which also cost millions."

Roman Catholic officials said the Communists are reluctant to admit that residents of their "model" town prefer a church to other new buildings.

Communist militiamen armed with submachine guns nightly patrol Lublin, the nearest big city, in fear the unrest will spread there.

Marx blamed a band of fanatical women for the riot here June 26. From a wide variety of sources this account emerged.

The town of 11,000 has no church despite a petition signed by thousands and warnings of church authorities that the people were getting impatient.

On June 26 several hundred Catholics came to sing hymns at the shrine and found the draperies gone. As feeling mounted, they decided to march on the town hall and police station. Along the way the crowd swelled to between 1,000 and 2,000.

The angry marchers smashed windows in the police station and Communist headquarters with bricks. The police admitted using fire hoses to scatter the crowd, and townspeople said they also used tear gas. Reinforcements were brought in from Lublin.

Versatile Jupiter Missile Eyes Launching Of Orbs

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—The Army's versatile Jupiter missile, another successful 1,500-mile trip under its belt, now turns its attention to satellite launching.

A 60-foot intermediate range Jupiter roared aloft Thursday night and dumped a simulated warhead on a target area off the island of Antigua.

Just a short distance from the latest launching, technicians are preparing a giant four-stage Juno II rocket for a satellite attempt expected the middle of this month. A Jupiter forms the first stage of the 76-foot missile.

Riding in the nose cone of the Juno II will be this nation's biggest and most complex scientific satellite to date. It is a 9 1/2-pound vehicle designed to perform at least six experiments in space. Among them are a study of the high radiation belt surrounding the earth and several weather probes.

Satellite boosting will be a new assignment for the Jupiter, which has logged 17 successful shots in war weapons tests. It also served as the first stage for space probes Pioneer III and IV and carried monkey Able and Baker on their historic trip into space and back May 28.

The Army counts only one failure in 21 Jupiter firings.
