

Oregon Pros Shoot Under Par 70s At Reames

Oldfield, Hixon Tie In Opener

Sixteen of the Northwest's top pro golfers tied off this morning in the second round of match play in the Oregon Professional Golf Association tournament at Reames Golf and Country Club. The first round of play got under way Monday afternoon following the morning qualifying round.

In the qualifying round, Eddie Oldfield, Astoria Golf and Country Club, and Harvey Hixon, Portland Golf Club, tied for medalist honors with two under par 70s. Salem's Bunny Mason, the 1957 tourney winner, was one stroke back at 71.

Bill Eggers, Rose City Golf Club in Portland, had a 72 while Jerry Cloninger, of Prineville, Tim Marlow, of Eastmoreland in Portland, and Vince Alaska of Coos Bay all were deadlocked at 73. Grants Pass' Boots Porterfield and Al Mundle of Riverside of Portland, both defending champions, carded 74s.

Clark Good, the only Klamath Falls entrant and host pro for the tourney, recorded a 76 in the qualifying round.

This morning's 18 holes of play will be followed by another 18 holes this afternoon. The first pair tied off this morning at 8 o'clock, followed by the rest of the field at 10 minute intervals. Leading the field this morning as the first to tee off were Hixon and Mundle, both winners of their first round matches Monday afternoon. The tourney will continue through Thursday, when the two remaining finalists square off in a 36-hole match.

Good, who drew one of the two byes in Monday's opening round, tied off with Porterfield at 9:10 this morning.

Noted the Reames pro after his qualifying round Monday, "It certainly is going to be hard to pick a favorite in this tournament. It is real hard to tell, especially in match play."

Several comments about the good condition of the course were made after Monday's action. Stated Good, "Everybody likes the course; they think it is out of this world, especially the greens."

Good was optimistic about his chances as he prepared to tee off this morning. "It is going to be real rough, but I think that I can do it just as well as the other fellow can. Although you never can tell which way the ball will bounce."

Reames officials noted that the public is invited to attend the tourney, with no admission fee to be charged.

Balsiger BR Nine, East Side Slated

What should prove the highlight of the local Babe Ruth League season, with the exception of the coming state tournament slated for Klamath Falls in August, is scheduled for Gem Stadium Wednesday evening.

The East Side Electric and Balsiger Babe Ruth teams, currently one-two in the standings, a bare half game separating them, will meet in the feature game of a doubleheader which is scheduled to get underway at 5 p.m. The first game of the evening is between Merrill and Moyina Heights.

Both contests are regularly scheduled games, the irregularity of the evening's fare being that both have been shifted from the original playing site, Conger Field, to the Stadium.

Another difference is that the normal five-inning game duration usually imposed on Gem Stadium Babe Ruth matches will be lifted for the two games. Each will be seven-inning tests as per the scheduling at Conger Field.

The San Francisco Giants' latest buildup for a breakthrough in the battle for the National League pennant is a shambles, torn down once more by Milwaukee's three-man wrecking crew—Burdette, Spahn and Mathews.

Just two days ago, the Giants had a 1½-game hold on first place and Milwaukee was third, 2½ games back. Now the Braves are second, just .002 percentage points behind after a two-game sweep out away by the pitching of Lew Burdette and Warren Spahn and Ed Mathews' slugging.

Mathews' home run and sacrifice fly, good for four RBI, backed Burdette for a 4-2 victory Sunday. Monday night, Mathews two-run homer backed Spahn's six-hit pitching for a 3-0 decision over the Giants, although the Braves managed only four hits.

That leap-frogged the Braves over Los Angeles into second as the Dodgers slipped to third with a 13-5 defeat at Cincinnati in the only other NL game scheduled.

The "10 telling days" are over in the American League race, and if they failed to tell the whole story, they told a horror tale for the Detroit Tigers and New York Yankees.

It all began June 30, when the Cleveland Indians were first by one game over the Chicago White Sox. Baltimore, was third, 2½ games back. Detroit and New York were tied for fourth, trailing by four games.

In the 10 playing dates over that span—during which two of the three western contenders, Cleveland, Chicago and Detroit, were at each other's throat every day—Cleveland came off with an 8-4 record. So did the White Sox.

Boston 13, NY 3

The Red Sox, frolicking through the Yankee series with 58 hits and 59 runs, put away the sweep with a four-run first inning, then chucked through a nine-run sixth—their biggest inning of the season.

Jackie Jensen's three-run homer, his 20th, triggered the first inning against loser Don Larsen after the Yankees had taken a 2-0 lead on Yogi Berra's 10th home run.

In the sixth, the Red Sox sent 13 men to the plate, scored one run when Sammy White scooted home while Yank first baseman Elston Howard argued an umpire's call and then closed it with a grand slam by a pinch-runner.

White started his stroll from second base. He made it to third on a grounder by Don Buddin and kept right on going as Howard—ball in hand and back to plate—disputed umpire Nestor Chylak's safe call on Buddin at first.

Gene Stephens was the slugging pinch-runner, hitting his second homer of the year after replacing Ted Williams, who singled home Jensen with the first score of the inning.

Jensen, who had a double and scored three runs, also forced in a run with a bases-loaded walk for four RBI. He has 10-for-19 with 10 RBI in the series.

Frank Sullivan, the winner in the series opener, took the final for a 6-5 record, breezing in although allowing 10 hits. He struck out seven.

Larsen (6-4) now has lost three in a row and four of his last five decisions.
