



DREAM COMES TRUE — The long awaited Mills Little League Park became a working reality Tuesday evening when 180 Klamath Falls and South Suburban Little Leaguers tangled on two diamonds following an impressive dedication ceremony. The half hour-long ceremonies, emceed by Herald and News Sports Editor Wayne Scott, included a flag raising rite performed by Terry Bane, Gary Mayfield and Steve Good of Boy Scout Troop 100, also of the Little Leagues; a formation on the field of all 180 players; brief talks by Charlie Bane, director of park construction, Gene Favell, KF league president and Maj. William Harris, proxy of the South Suburban League. The invocation was led by



Rev. Bob Groves of the First Presbyterian Church while the dedication speaker was Klamath Falls pioneer life insurance man and onetime mayor, John Houston. Scott, who initiated the ball park plan over a year ago when he promised to grow a beard until ground was broken for the park, gave the welcoming address and was followed by Charlie Bane, the over-all director of construction, who publicly thanked as many persons as possible who donated their time and services. Gene Favell, president of the Klamath Falls Little League Inc., then

presented awards to Scott and Bane from the National Association of Little Leagues in lieu of plaques for services rendered to the Little Leagues. Maj. William Harris, South Suburban proxy, thanked everyone on behalf of all the South Suburban players. Houston likened the ball park, a monument to Klamath Falls progress, to other monuments throughout the history of civilization. Houston also commended parents, fans and coaches for their work with the Little League as the best possible deterrent to juvenile delinquency on the local level.

Today's winners will vie tomorrow in the title-deciding finals, scheduled for 8 a.m.

In Tuesday afternoon's quarter-final action Hixson was four under par, downing Portland's Tom Marlowe, who was one under in putting up a valiant battle.

McKendrick, who was three under standard because of his fine short game, eliminated Don Smith, Portland, 5 and 4.

Oldfield had a lopsided quarter-final triumph, beating Bobby Litton, Vancouver, 6 and 5.

The redheaded Porterfield, best known for his long drives, shot a scorching five under par in dispos-
