Eastern Oregon — Fair through Thursday. Highs 85-95; low tonight 48-60.

Western Oregon — Night and morning low clouds along coast and patches early morning low clouds inland valleys, otherwise fair; little change in temperatures. Highs 80-90 except about 95 in southern valleys. 65 along coast; low tonight 48-56. Coastal winds northwesterly, 10-20 m.p.h., increasing to 30 m.p.h. along south coast in afternoon.

Northern Oregon beaches — Sunny in afternoon after morning clouds. Bar winds northwesterly to northerly, 10-20 m.p.h. Temperature range 50-65.

Grants Pass and vicinity — Fair and warm through Thursday. Highs 85-90; low tonight 55-60.

Baker-La Grande area — Fair and warm through Thursday with some afternoon clouds. Highs 88-95; low tonight 50-55.

Loggers Fire Weather — Fire danger is moderate in northwest Oregon and along the coast, but continues high in southwest Oregon and central Oregon.

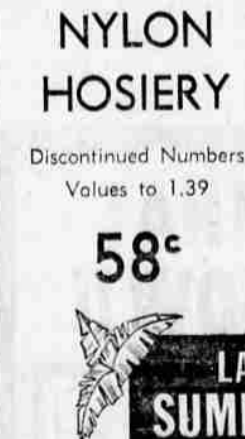
