

Six Newspaper Deliverers Indicted For Extortion

NEW YORK (AP) — Six members of the independent Newspaper and Mail Deliverers Union have been indicted on conspiracy and extortion charges. Dist. Atty. Frank S. Hogan said they used threats of work stoppages to obtain \$110,600 from 19 newspaper and magazine distributing companies from 1955 to 1957.

Four present or former officials of the union were among the six indicted Tuesday.

The six were already under federal indictment on charges of violating antitrust and racketeering laws in connection with the

wholesale distribution of newspapers and magazines in the metropolitan area.

The six men were arrested Tuesday. They had been free in bail pending trial on the federal charges.

After their arrest on the state charges they were freed in custody of their lawyers, pending bail arrangements.

Those indicted are: Irving Bliz, 56, Great Neck, N.Y., described by Hogan as a "nominal member" of the union and vice president of the Bronx County News Co., and secretary-treasurer of the Bi-County News Co., wholesale distributors, of Garden City, N.Y.

Sam Feldman, 40, Yonkers, N.Y., president of the union from May 1956 until last May.

Harry Waltzer, 50, Brooklyn, business agent from 1949 to date except for 1952.

William Walsh, 59, Hazlet, N.J., business agent for the union from 1949 to 1956.

Angelo Lospinuso, 43, Richmond Hill, Queens, business agent for the union from 1951 to 1956.

Michael Spozate, 59, Brooklyn, also described as a "nominal member" of the union and as vice president of the Pacific News Co. Inc., Brooklyn.

Labor Control Legislation Poses Problems For Group

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Labor Committee comes to grips today with its biggest problem in drafting labor control legislation—wording of a "Bill of Rights" for union members.

After a month of wrangling over details, the committee has completed a redraft of Senate-passed legislation, except for defining the rights of union members and passing on amendments to the Taft-Hartley law.

Chairman Graham A. Barden (D-NC) has set Friday as a target date for completing a bill.

In a preliminary skirmish Tuesday, the committee killed from the Senate bill a provision making it a crime for union officers to interfere with the rights of union members.

A majority of the 20 committee Democrats voted for the amendment of Rep. Ludwig Teller (D-NY) to strike this section and its

criminal penalties. As passed by the Senate, the effect of the action was to leave the bill without any "Bill of Rights" enforcement provisions. The officer to coerce, discipline, threaten, or take reprisal against members for exercising their rights.
