'Boots' Porterfield Collects Second Straight OPGA Crown

Herald and News Sports Writer Walt "Boots" Porterfield Jr. set a scorching pace to match the 96-degree heat in defeating Harvey Hixson 5 and 4 in the finals of the Oregon Professional Golfers Match Play Tournament at Reames Golf and Country Club Thursday afternoon.

The 32-year-old veteran from Grants Pass nabbed the title for the second year in a row with a stirring 10 under par performance. Porterfield lost only eight holes the entire day.

Hixson, who gained the finals with a tight, 1-up triumph over Bob McKendrick Wednesday, was down three holes after the 18-hole morning round. The 28-year-old Portland pro fell even farther back after losing the first four holes of the afternoon round, but made a thrilling comeback to take the next four holes with three birdies and an eagle.

Hixson came within inches of taking the 27th hole as he missed a 25-foot putt from in back of the green.

Fluhrer Potential Arrives

MLF's Rod Sparlin and Jeff Gieger contributed three-base knocks for the winners while first gacker Bill Bianchi smashed one to the wall for the Amusement nine. Bianchi's blast was futile, however as he died on third when Allen whiffed the next three batters.

Rhodes Makes Bid

Giants Keep Lead; Yankees Win 2-Header

Hey waiter, Dusty Rhodes says he'll take another short order of that World Series melon he tasted back in 1954.

That series' slice merely whetted Dusty's appetite, so here he is again five years later putting in his bid with the Giants for a second helping.

Remember those amazing pinch hits he collected to lead the Giants to the National League pennant in 1954? Well, Rhodes is doing business at the same old stand in an effort to bring the Giants their first pennant since then this year.

Dusty, who was recalled from the minors only a short time back, kept the Giants on top Thursday night when he came through with one of his patented pinch hits in the ninth inning

to beat the Phillies, 1-0, in the second game of a two-night doubleheader.

The Giants needed that victory to remain one game ahead of the idle second-place Dodgers because the Phillies had taken the opener, 6-4, behind Robin Roberts.

Phils 6-0, SF 4-1

Southpaw Johnny Antonelli pitched superbly in gaining his 14th victory, giving up only three hits while striking out nine.

In the opener, the Phils knocked out former teammate Jack Sanford with a two-run rally in the seventh that broke a 4-4 tie.

The Cubs defeated the Braves for the third straight time, 4-2, and the Reds donned the Cardinals, 7-5. Los Angeles and Pittsburgh were not scheduled.

The White Sox took over the

American League lead by one game by splitting a doubleheader with the Red Sox while the Yankees were taking a twin-bill from the Indians. Chicago beat Boston in the opener, 4-3, and Boston won the second game, 5-4.

The Yankees won their opener from the Indians, 7-5, in 10 innings and the nightcap, 4-0. Washington licked Detroit, 5-2, and Kansas City nipped Baltimore, 4-3.

Cubs 4, Braves 2

Dave Hillman of the Cubs, who had lost five straight games to the Braves during his career, beat them for the first time with a nine-hit effort. The Cubs collected all their runs on five hits, including Ernie Banks' 27th homer, off Lew Burdette.

Reds 7, Cards 5

Jerry Lynch drove in four runs

with a homer and three singles to pace the Reds to their victory over the Cardinals.

Chi 4-4, Boston 3-5

Vic Wertz' third hit of the game, a single, scored Marty Keough from second base with the run that broke a 4-4 tie in the seventh inning and gave the Red Sox their nightcap victory over the White Sox. Sherm Lollar doubled home Jim Landis with the winning run in the seventh inning of the opener.

NY 7-4, Indians 5-0

Mickey Mantle's 19th homer with one on in the 10th inning gave the Yankees their opening game victory over the Indians after Yogi Berra tied the score with his 11th homer in the ninth. Little Bobby Shantz, promoted to a starting role from the bullpen

because Casey Stengel had nobody else, stopped the Tribe on five hits in the nightcap to give the Yanks their first doubleheader sweep since May 30.

Nats 5, Tigers 2

The Senators handed the slumping Tigers their fourth straight defeat and 11th loss in their last 13 games. Bill Fischer registered his eighth victory with relief help from Dick Hyde.

KC 4, Orioles 3

Tom Sturdivant hurled four innings of hitless ball in relief of Bud Daley as the Athletics topped the Orioles. Daley, credited with his ninth victory, had a shutout until the sixth when Walt Dropo hit a two-run homer and Gus Triandos belted his 22nd homer with the bases empty.

The Portland Beavers scored two runs in the seventh inning and broke a 1-1 tie as they defeated Spokane 3-1 in Thursday night's Pacific Coast League baseball game.

Milt Graff, who had four hits in five times at bat, led off the Portland seventh with a double. He scored as Clarence Moore was walked and Charlie Secrest singled.

Moore was put out at third and Secrest took second on the play. Then George Freese was walked and Nini Tornay hit to the infield, leading the bases.

Secrest came in on Jim Green-grass' hit which third baseman Al Norris bobbled.

Portland pitcher Ken Johnson allowed the Indians only four hits.

Elsewhere in the league, the Salt Lake City Bees ran into trouble in their effort to unseat Sacramento as the league leader. The Bees, who had climbed

quietly but confidently to third place, two games behind the Solons, were slapped back into fourth place by the Californians, 4-2.

The second-place Vancouver Mounties kept pace with Sacramento, beating Seattle's Rainiers 3-0 on southpaw Fred Besana's two-hitter. The Portland Beavers stepped past Salt Lake City into third place by taming the Spokane Indians 3-1.

In a battle of second division clubs, the Phoenix Giants trounced the San Diego Padres 6-1 as Benny Valenzuela clubbed out his 13th and 14th home runs of the season.

The Solons banged out 12 hits off Ernie Francis and Jim Umbrecht while Joe Stanka and Terry Fox limited the Bees to eight hits. Fox took over in the eighth from the tiring Stanka with men on first and second and none out. A double play and Eddie Moore's groundout ended the threat.
