In the Derby Stakes, which includes dogs 2 years of age and under, Len Skinner's Whirlybird from Grants Pass nabbed top honors. Lee Carter's Blackie from Klamath Falls was the Qualifying

Stakes winner, which includes dogs over 6 months of age, and Bracken's Flash, owned and handled by Weldon Kline, Medford, was the Open Stakes champion.

Nick, owned and handled by Ken Denman, Medford, was second in the derby, Hal's Smoothie, belonging to Hal Shidler, Klamath Falls, was third and Nick, owned and handled by R. DeBattista, Klamath Falls, was fourth. Earning Certificates of Merit were Dr. Versteeg's Mike, Medford, and L. Dubois' Rufus of Klamath Falls.

Ann Baxter Cops Bow Hunter Title

Ann Baxter, who earned the title of top Oregon archer, in the junior girls' division at the annual Oregon Bow Hunters' field tournament at Mist last weekend, is a member of an archery-minded family. Her brother, Gene, 19, who will be a sophomore this fall at Brigham Young University at Provo, Utah, set a new college record on a target round this spring on that campus. No one had ever broken 500 on that round

until that day. One archer chalked up an even 500 and then Gene topped it with 535 points.

Their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dale Baxter, 5650 Cottage Avenue, are defending man-and-wife team champions at Klamath Archers' annual trophy shoot next Sunday at the Moore Park range.

The young champion will be ineligible to defend her title in next year's annual state field tournament as she will be 16 next June. After 16, she will compete in the women's division.

She will enter the National Field Archers Association tournament at Fall River in the intermediate girls' division. The national open tournament is being held from July 27 through July 30. Approximately 20 Klamath archers have indicated they will participate in the national tournament.

At next Sunday's local trophy shoot for members of Klamath Archers, Ann Baxter will be defending her title as junior girls' freestyle champion. Other trophy holders who will be defending are Bud Vroman, men's freestyle; Bud Case, men's instinctive; Mrs. Dale (Audrey) Baxter, women's freestyle; Maggie Sample, women's instinctive; and Bobby Dearing, junior boys' instinctive.

Registration will start at 9 a.m. on Sunday at the Moore Park range. Spectators are welcome but participation in the trophy shoot is restricted to club members.

Dale Cummins led the Klamathites in scoring with 18 points picking up markers in diving, breaststroke and freestyle. Jay Cox was second with 16 points, scoring in the diving, freestyle and backstroke.
