

Homemakers Plan Camp

A trip to the Oregon Caves campfire program and a Hobo Night. Secret pals will be drawn and Wednesday, July 22, will be visitor's day. Those coming should bring a salad or dessert and a bottle of Elmer's Glue for crafts.

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — What is there about Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev to write home about? After Idaho Gov. Robert E. Smylie and six other governors touring the Soviet Union interviewed Khrushchev July 8, Smylie wrote his wife: "His conversation is loaded with humor, but he showed flashes of what was somewhat like anger at times . . ."

Seven Wagons Plodding West

MOUNTAIN HOME, Idaho (AP) — A warrant failed to halt the Oregon Centennial wagon train Thursday, and the seven wagons plodded on westward today.

The legal skirmish erupted Wednesday night, when rancher Jack Henley said the wagons had trespassed by camping on his property.

Henley swore out a warrant for the wagon master, Tex Serpa of Ashland, Ore.

Serpa strode into court Thursday at King Hill, clad in western clothes and a holster with a gun in it.

Serpa told the court that arrangements to camp on Henley's property had been made with some of his employees.

"I can see no evidence of criminal intent," Justice of the Peace Lynn Sherman said, and then dismissed the case.

Serpa later rejoined the train, which is on a 2,000-mile-plus trip from Independence, Mo., to Independence, Ore.

Today the train is heading for Boise. The wagons are due there sometime Saturday.

State Firms Mull Pact

PORTLAND (AP) — Negotiations are underway with four Oregon steel firms, a United Steelworkers of America spokesman said Thursday. The union's Oregon contracts do not expire until July 31.

Contractors predicted it would be several weeks before the nationwide steel strike has any effect on Oregon because of stockpiling.

The first steelwork on the Portland Exposition - Recreation Commission's Memorial Coliseum gets underway today, and enough structural steel is on hand to complete the project.

New AF Jet Given Duty

McGUIRE AIR FORCE BASE, N.J. (AP) — The Convair F106 Delta Dart, an all-weather jet interceptor designed to wreak atom-rocket havoc among enemy bombers, today stands guard over the nation's most populous area.

A squadron of about 25 planes—the first such unit in the world—was formally put into service here Thursday as part of the North American Air Defense Command.

The squadron is assigned to the New York Air Defense Sector, which protects the 25 million people living in the New York-Philadelphia-Washington triangle.

Compromise Aid Measure Taking Shape In Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — A compromise 3 1/2-billion-dollar foreign aid bill, tailored to meet most of President Eisenhower's requests, took final shape today in a Senate-House conference committee.

The conferees meet again today, to put the finishing touches on a provision to shift military aid funds to the regular Defense Department budget for a two-year trial period.

This was at least a partial victory for the President, who had urged permanent authorizations for military assistance abroad starting with the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1960. The Senate had approved the plan, but it was not in the House bill.

The House conferees agreed to a substitute provision authorizing such appropriations for the years beginning July 1, 1960, and July 1, 1961. If approved by both houses, this would shift military assistance out of the foreign aid bill for two years and enable the President to go directly to congressional appropriations committees for financing it.

All Thursday's actions were tentative, and subject to change before final action is taken at today's session.

The conferees agreed to an authorization of \$1,400,000,000 for military aid this year—100 million more than the Senate voted and 40 million under the House figure. The compromise was 200 million
