Babe Ruth League All-Stars Chosen

With nothing more than makeup games remaining in regular season play, the Klamath Falls Babe Ruth League is now setting its sights on the district tournament scheduled for Gem Stadium starting July 28 and continuing through July 31 with the possibility of a game to be played on August 1.

Since the makeup games, rainouts, postponements etc., can have no bearing on the teams heading the American and National leagues, the predetermined divisions of the master league, a special meeting was held Saturday afternoon at the city hall for the purpose of designating head coaches, assistants and players for the All-Star teams to enter the district playoffs.

Also accomplished at the meeting was the drawing for positions in the four day elimination tournament which pits both Klamath Falls representatives against the lone entry from Lakeview.

The tournament will decide the team to represent the district in the state tournament, also to be held in Klamath Falls, beginning August 7 and continuing through August 9.

Rulings made at the beginning of the season selected as coaches of the All-Star teams, the winning coaches in each of the two respective local divisions.

Willie Dunster, Balsigers coach, chose Fred Taylor and Al Davis as his assistants, to aid him with the National All-Stars while John Paxton, East Side Electric, picked Dick Adreon and Cliff Moore as his assistants to handle the American League Stars. Taylor served as coach of the Merrill squad during regular season play, Davis with Balsigers, Adreon as M. L. Johnson coach, and Moore directed the Superior Troy nine.

IF YOU WERE THE UMPIRE

In most Major League ball parks spectators are warned not to touch a safely batted ball or otherwise interfere with the playing of the game. But repeated warnings sometimes fail to do any good.

Here's a theoretical instance involving fan interference. You may consider yourself a baseball expert if you decide on it correctly.

The White Sox are playing the Yankees in New York. Chicago has Nellie Fox on first base with none out and Jim Rivera at bat. Rivera hits a high fly close to the right field stands in fair territory. It is not deep enough to land in the stands. Outfielder Hank Bauer gets under the ball, but just as he's about to make the catch a spectator leans out from the seats and pins Bauer's arms. The ball drops and Fox comes around to score with Rivera reaching third base.

Do you think that:
a. Rivera should be called out with Fox returning to first?
b. It should be ruled a ground rule double?

c. Rivera should bat over again?
d. Let the play stand as though there had been no interference?

Answer: A—Rivera is out with Fox returning to first base. A ground rule double is out with Rivera reaching third base.

AINTREE, England (AP) —

Jack Brabham of Australia, nursing badly worn tires in the final laps, won the British Grand Prix Saturday and went further ahead in the battle for the world's automobile driving championship.

Driving a Cooper Climax, Brabham led from the start of the 225-mile race and collected eight points to send his season's total to 27 toward the driving title. His average speed was 89.88 miles per hour.

Britain's Sterling Moss, who was runnerup last year to the late Mike Hawthorn in the driving championship, finished second Saturday in a BRM for six points.

Brabham beat him by only 22 seconds. Third place went to Bruce McLaren of New Zealand in a Cooper Climax.
