chevar. Naomi Poyner was a first time guest and Mrs. Margaret Reason was a second time guest.

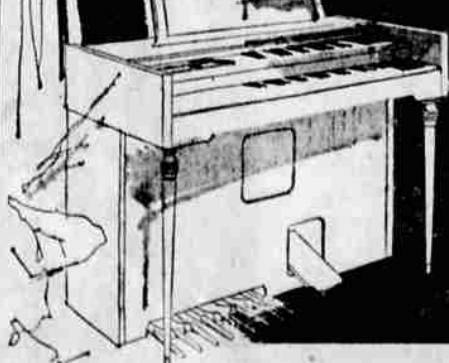
