Gardeners Given Timely Tips On Flowers For Exhibition At Centennial Flower Show

With the Centennial Flower Show just around the corner on the 1st and 2nd of August, local gardeners may appreciate some tips from an expert on how to process flowers for exhibition.

Mrs. Scott McKendree, director of the Klamath Garden District, and an accredited flower show judge, suggests the following methods of caring for the specimens you select from your garden.

First of all, read the schedule for the show carefully. The judges will disqualify any entry that does not follow the rules laid down by the schedule.

Next, select the flower that most closely conforms to the schedule. It should be free from insect and disease, blemishes, cleaned of dust and spray deposits, and not in full bloom. Remember that the judges will rate it as they see it, not as it looked when you picked it. A bloom three fourths open is usually best. There are some tricks that you can use to insure that the blossom will be at the right stage at the right time.

Heat and humidity will hasten the opening of a bud. So if you wish to force the blossom, keep the flower in a warm, dark, draftless place with the stalk in warm water. If you wish to delay the opening of the blossom, reverse the process, storing the flower in

a light, airy place with ice-cubes in the water.

It is a good idea to carry a pail of water with you as you select and cut your specimens, so that they can be immediately placed in the water. Always use a sharp edge for the cutting.

Unless you are trying to hasten the bloom of a flower, cut your flowers the night before the show, preferably after sundown. Place them in deep water right up to the flower head. If the stalk is weak and will not hold the head out of the water, put a paper collar around the head to hold it up. Do not immerse or float the petals of the blossom, but the stem and foliage will be improved by the cool bath. Do not crowd the stems together, especially on those flowers intended for horticultural specimens.

Some flowers take special handling before they are ready to be placed in the deep water. Any flower having a hollow stem, such as the delphinium, the poppy or the dahlia, must first have the stem treated or it will not absorb enough water to hold it through the next day. Either plunge the stems of these flowers into boiling hot water, or hold a lighted match under each stem until it is slightly blackened. With the air removed from the hollow stem, the plant will absorb the water.
