NEW YORK (AP) — Closing sessions of last week's fall fashion showings by New York designers resembled a meeting of the United Nations, as 25 women from foreign consulates and three Moscow fashion experts viewed American styles.

The consular ladies were present at the invitation of Leonard and Andrew Arkin, father-and-son team presenting a group of typically American, moderately-priced fashions. A number appeared in native dress, and all applauded the smart, wearable clothes. Their favorite of the Arkin collection was a black broadcloth cocktail dress, cut on slender lines, with plunging back neckline and a satin belt.

All those present appeared captivated by the children's fashions shown by Helen Lee, featuring pint-sized school and party dresses worn by small glamor girls, aged four to eight. A favorite of this group was a red calico smock over a black cotton full-skirted dress, for the smart kindergarten.

Suzy Perette, who often sells as many as 10,000 copies of a single dress, showed a group of the top fashions already ordered in volume by store buyers throughout the country. Best-sellers included: A plaid sheer wool dress with sweater to top and full skirt; a black jersey sheath with square neck, long sleeves and a wide

leather belt; a dress and jacket in violet wool jersey; and a dress-and-jacket outfit in dark green and red-checked wool, with waist-length jacket and scarf neckline. Betty Carol, of Mam'selle, showed a slick group of junior fashions which stressed dress-and-jacket costumes with "space girl" capes and hood.

Paula Dean showed a flattering line of clothes for the woman who is too busy to watch her figure, featuring sheer, chiffon-weight wools and simple jersey dress-and-jacket costumes in high colors.

Meet Set In London Today By International Florists

LONDON (AP) — The time may be approaching when an American—or just about anybody else—will be able to telegraph a dozen red roses to Nikita Khrushchev in the Kremlin.

"Actually," said Thomas Simpson, "we're going to grapple with this thorny problem next week." Simpson is an officer of Interflora, 50-year-old organization that telegraphically flutters flowers all over the world.

"You can now telegraph flowers to Communist Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia," he said, "but the Soviet Union won't allow its florists to belong to our organization." Nine men representing 25,000 florists operating in 120 countries will meet in London July 19.

The nine — three Americans, three Britons, and three from continental Europe—are members of Interflora's world council which dictates the organization's policy.

The Americans are Victor Stein, San Francisco; Eugene Daudelin, Chicago, and Harold Kayton, San Antonio.

Stein, now vice president of Interflora, will become president at the London meeting.

As for operating Interflora service in the U.S.S.R., "A direct appeal to the Kremlin is considered likely," Simpson said.

Has Interflora ever had customers who want to send flowers to the Soviet Union? "We've had many," Stein replied. "And I'd like to say—without revealing how we've done it—that we've gotten our flowers through the Iron Curtain."

"Trade barriers are lifting everywhere," he continued. "Flowers are international. The barriers must be lifted for them."
