Olympic Champion Describes Marathon

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Bob Mathias, a strapping, raw-boned man with an iron-hard body, was talking once about the marathon which carried him to Olympic athletic heights when he was a youngster of 18.

"It is," insisted the two-time Olympic champion with a grim edge to his voice, "one of the most terrible ordeals an athlete could undergo. When you get along towards the end of it you wonder why you ever tried to do it."

This is by way of making a point—said point being that another young man named Rafe Johnson had better get on the ball.

Because a handsome, well-built Russian named Vasily Kuznetsov makes this 10-event muscular marathon look ridiculously easy.

JOHNSON TOP U.S. HOPE

Johnson is the top U.S. hope for the Olympics, which will be forthcoming next summer in Rome. He and Kuznetsov have been battling the marathon world record back and forth like a tennis ball. But in a driving thunderstorm at Franklin Field Sunday, as the United States and Russia concluded a two-day track and field meet, Kuznetsov was prevented from eclipsing his own brand new world record only

by the weather. Johnson would have had his hands full trying to stop him.

The decathlon is an ordeal. In the space of two days, the candidates for its roll of honor must run 100 meters, broad jump, shot put, high jump, run 400 meters, skip over the 110-meter hurdles, hurl the discus, pole vault, toss the javelin and wind it all up by running 1,500 meters. It is all figured out, event by event, with points awarded according to the performance. Kuznetsov, a black-haired 27-year-old athlete who stands six feet, one inch and weighs 183 pounds, holds the current world mark of 8,357 points—only man to pile up more than 8,000 points on four different occasions.

BETTERED 8,000 AGAIN

One of those four times was Sunday, despite a thunderstorm which inundated capitalistic Franklin Field. At the end of the first day's five events, he was running 50 points ahead of his world record.

He built that lead to 79 points Sunday and was 74 points ahead with only three events remaining. Then the heavens wept on his chances. The rain slicked the pole vault runway and ruined him. It greased his grip on the javelin and turned the grassy footing to a base of treachery.

Yet, going into the final event, that murderous 1,500-meter run, he needed to run only 5:02.6 to set a new record. The track was inches deep in water and, while Oregon's Dave Edstrom splashed home in 4:59.8, remember that this is one of the blond Yank's top events.

Kuznetsov, who was third in the 1936 Olympic decathlon, gave it a game try. He pounded home in 5:03.8 and when they tallied up the points his total was 8,350.

That was just seven slim points behind the world mark he established at Moscow in May. And, under the circumstances, it was a miraculous performance.

For, as Mathias said, this is a man-killing event. And it took the hand of God to stop the star of the Soviet.

But, things being what they are under the hammer and sickle, maybe that's the way it should be.

Roy Harris slammed a homerun with one on in the fourth inning for the losers while the loss was charged to Frank Delz.

Leon Morgan's three-run four-master in the sixth inning proved to be the winning blow in the second tilt. Morgan's blast brought the Hal's nine from a 1-0 deficit to hand them the victory.

Gus Gestvang hurled the win for the KF squad, giving up but three safeties while striking out eight Bend batters.

Burleson Winner At Philly

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The brilliant young middle distance runner from Oregon, Deyrol Burleson, captured the 1500-meter run in one of the international dual track meet features here Sunday.

He barely nipped his Oregon teammate, Jim Grelle, at the tape.

Their Russian opponents could not stand the stretch drive.

Grelle was winner of the race a year ago when an American team went to Russia. But Sunday it was a re-play of the national AAU meet's metric mile when Burleson came on in the final yards to win.

A third distance runner from Oregon, Bill Dellinger, who now runs for the Air Force, wilted in the 5000 meters and took a third place far behind the two Russians. His 14:48.8 was 31 seconds back of the winner.

Oregon's decathlon star, Dave Edstrom, ran into a tremendous line performance by Russia's Vasily Kuznetsov and came off second best. Kuznetsov's total of 6,350 points was well above Edstrom's 7,399. In third place was Mike Herman of New York with 7,026.

In Sunday's events, Edstrom won the 1500-meter decathlon race, was second in the 110-meter hurdles, the discus, and javelin and third in the pole vault.

The lone woman competitor from Oregon, Sharon Shepherd, placed fourth in the shotput. Her loss of 41 feet 4 inches was far behind the world record performance of 55 feet 6 1/2 inches turned in by Russia's Tamara Press.

The meet brought several close races but none more thrilling than the 1500 meters. The finish was so close that both Burleson and Grelle were timed in 3:49.4—roughly a 4-0 mile.

For the first three laps it was Grelle in second and Burleson third, with their Russian opponents at front and rear. The four runners were well bunched except for a brief time when the Russian pacemaker, Yevzeny Momotkov, pulled a number of yards in front.

On the backstretch in the final lap Burleson stood off a challenge for third place and Grelle made his move into first. At almost the same time Burleson started his drive and the two Americans came out of the final turn with Grelle in the lead.

Grelle, from Portland, was a senior at the University of Oregon this year and Burleson, from Cottage Grove, was a freshman. They continue the long string of fine middle distance runners turned out by Oregon track coach Bill Bowerman.
