Sellers Use Steel Strike To Unload Some Holdings

NEW YORK (UPI) — Stocks declined on reduced volume when a half million steel workers went on strike during the past week.

The decline running to more than 5 points in some instances reflected a desire to take profits. The sellers seized upon the steel situation to unload some of their holdings.

Contrary to the usual procedure in the stock market not to sell on strike news, the steels were depressed along with other sections. Their losses ranged to 3 points.

Business news aside from the strike situation was favorable. Steel operations, of course, fell off sharply and declines were noted in car loadings and truck movement.

At the week's close the Dow Jones industrial average stood at 67.13 off 6.43 points; railroad 166.95 off 5.27; utility 88.95 up 0.11, and 65 stocks 219.21 off 2.74.

Weakness in railroad shares stood out. This group stands to lose sharply by a steel strike. Pennsylvania Railroad started laying off men and said the total layoffs may run to 6,290 persons.

In the rail section, Norfolk & Western fell 4 1/2 points; Baltimore & Ohio 3 1/4; Pennsylvania was down 1 1/4 and Santa Fe nearly 2.

U. S. Steel, Allegheny Ludlum and Wheeling Steel lost more than 2 points each. Carpenter Steel was down 3. Bethlehem lost more than a point. Youngstown Sheet & Tube, a con. a-mover, gained nearly 4 points.

The automobile industry continued active and its output for the week showed a small gain. However, selling went ahead in the group where losses ranged to more than 3 points in Ford and Chrysler.

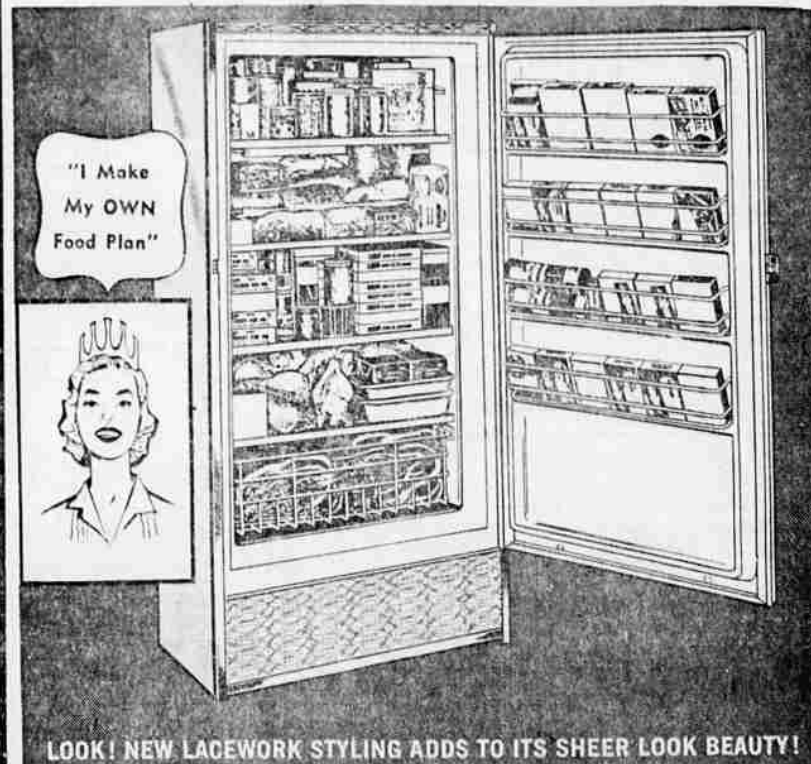
Du Pont fell 3 1/4 points in the chemicals and Allied was down 1 1/2 while Eastman Kodak gained nearly 2 points. Atlas Powder was up 3/4. International Salt

rose nearly 4 points to mark the points. Lifton Industries gained outside limits of the oil section, 6 1/2 points. Consolidated Elec-Texas Instruments rose 1 1/2. Intronics was up 3 1/2.

Top Legislative Hurdles Bar Solons' Adjournment

WASHINGTON (AP) — Adjournment date for the 1959 Congress still is a big toss-up. In its path are five major legislative hurdles: civil rights, labor regulation, housing, highways, and interest rates. Committee action on four of the five is scheduled this week.

Many members are resigned to being in session into September. Some hope to finish around Aug. 22. No one is looking for a July wrap-up.

The fact that such important issues still are unsettled does not mean that they have been shunted aside until the big push for adjournment. Long hours of legislative work have been spent on them in committees, and in some cases on both the Senate and House floors.

Still on the calendar are these major measures:

Civil rights: Most members agree this is the major hurdle. An inkling on prospects in this field may come today when the Senate Judiciary Committee meets to consider a relatively simple bill approved last Wednesday by a subcommittee. The judiciary group is headed by Sen. James O. Eastland (D-Miss.), a staunch foe of any such legislation.

Labor regulation: A labor-management bill generally regarded as more acceptable to organized labor than the Senate version will be voted on formally Wednesday by the House Labor Committee.

Housing: Public hearings on President Eisenhower's veto of housing legislation start Thursday before the Senate Housing subcommittee. Some Democrats still are talking of trying to override the veto. A more likely course appears to be passage of another housing bill, perhaps just before adjournment.

Highways: Proposals on how to finance the nation's big highway construction program will be heard by the House Ways and Means Committee starting Wednesday. Members handling highway legislation insist some provision to continue the program must be worked out before adjournment.
