Graziano Hot News In Literary World

NEW YORK (UPI) — The hot news in the literary world today is that Rocky Graziano — ex-middleweight champion, actor, performer in teevee "commodities," golf hacker and bum vivante — has turned author.

There was a rumor awhile back that Rocky had written a book which eventually would up in a movie called "Somebody Up There Likes Me." The falacy was that words crept in which they never taught in the Rock's type of finishing school.

This one, sans "ghost," contains Graziano's own refreshing attitude toward people, places and things.

They made two mistakes when they paid Rocky to write a magazine story called "for \$50,000 I'd fight any of these bums." First, the sub-title should read "Make Me Mad Enough and I'll Do It for Free." Second, they translated it into English and then, to be forceful, it has to be translated back into Grazianism.

But his observations are quite interesting.

ENJOY BEING DULL

He sums up the box fighters of today, as well as the fight game, with pitiful nonchalance, to wit: "These guys ain't just dull. They seem to enjoy being dull. And ya see a guy drip a drop of blood and right away somebody ask that the other guy is a killer."

Floyd Patterson, the former heavyweight champion who becomes the invisible man between bouts and did his most recent training in the secluded wilds of New Jersey, gets a straight tip from the Rock. One thing about Graziano, between fights he met more people than a widow at a seashore resort.

"Patterson should oughta remember," says the Rock, "that you don't excite people by hiding away in New Jersey. People is like me. When I go to Joisey, I go there I play golf."

Health clubs intrigue Graziano, he reveals in next month's issue of Sport Magazine. He even inhabits one, along with such other star actors as Ben Gazzara and Tony Franciosa.

"There's so many of us Eyedlains there," he reports, "you'd think it wuz Mafia headquarters." UNEXPECTED MODESTY

Yet an unexpected modesty appears in the one-time golden boy of the ring when he discusses and assesses his historic abilities. "I wouldn't exactly say I'm a real distinguished actor like Victor Mature," he allows, "although I do okay in my league."

One of his difficulties quite apparently is in mastering his lines. "I make believe I'm linnin'," the Rock admits. "But I don't stick to 'em. After all, I can always add a few lbs and get along." Steve Allen agreed to go along with Rocky on this basis, however. "Just act natural," Allen told

him. "Say what you feel like. Only, don't curse."

Rocky enjoys comedians and feels a close kinship with them. "Half the comedians in the world used to be fighters. That's what they say. Jack E. Leonard, Bob Hope, Joey Bishop — all ex-fighters," he analyzes, a d.d.n.g sympathetically. "I guess there were bums fighting then, too."

J. Regas Condition Serious

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP) — Hydroplane pilot Jack Regas was reported "holding his own but semi-conscious" at a hospital here Tuesday.

Regas entered the hospital unconscious and in critical condition Sunday following a near tragic accident involving Miss Bardahl, the unlimited hydroplane he drove in the Diamond Cup Race on Lake Coeur d'Alene.

The veteran pilot, who races out of Seattle but lives in Oakland, Calif., suffered a fractured skull, crushed chest, three broken ribs and other injuries when his boat crashed into a heavy wave on a turn. Severe water pressure knocked the cockpit out of commission, with the steering wheel and dashboard striking Regas.

Meanwhile, skin divers working from a tug salvaged the engine of Miss Burien Monday from the bottom of the lake. Burien flipped while doing 130 m.p.h. during the race.

Her driver, Bill Brown of Seattle was released from the hospital Monday.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — "Worst ball park in America" declared pitcher Johnny Antonelli of the San Francisco Giants Monday, speaking of the Giants' temporary home, Seals Stadium.

Antonelli was bitter because the Los Angeles Dodgers had just beaten him 3-2 in Seals Stadium on a pair of home runs.

"I don't mind losing, well, not much, but to lose this way . . . dammit, this park is a disgrace," the left-hander exploded in the dressing room.

"Two high fly balls, and they're carried right over the screen," "Gil Hodges' two-run homer in the first and Charley Neal's game-winning homer in the ninth barely cleared the left field screen of the stadium, home field of the Giants until their new park is completed late this season.

"You ask me what kind of pitch I threw to Neal," Johnny declared, "and I say what difference does it make?"

"I get beat by two lousy fly balls. "A pitcher should be paid double for working here. Worst ball park in America."
