

# Bard Festival Hikes Series

Richard Dyer-Bennet, tenor and guitarist, will augment the Oregon Shakespearean Festival's 1936 season with a series of concerts the afternoons of August 5, 6 and 7 in Ashland.

Currently on his annual American concert tour under the management of S. Hurok, the singer of folk and art songs will celebrate the 15th anniversary of his first Manhattan Town Hall recital. In his recital in Ashland Dyer-Bennet, whose art has done much to bring about the present great popularity of folk-songs in this country, will present some of the more than 600 examples of these in his repertoire, including many of particular interest to festival visitors such as the song of victory sung by the conquering English soldiers after the battle of Agincourt, tunes which delighted Queen Elizabeth and her court and haunting sea chanteys.

Born in England, Dyer-Bennet grew up in Berkeley. He was preparing for a concert career when, on a trip to Sweden, he heard the famed old troubador Sven Scholander, and was so impressed he set about collecting his own repertoire in the virtually undeveloped field of American and English folk-songs. Since his Town Hall debut in 1944, he has given 17 major New York concerts, and has become a favorite with audiences from coast to coast.

He will appear in three different recitals in Ashland at 2:30 p.m. each afternoon at the Varsity Theater. Ticket prices for this special festival event are priced at \$2.40 and \$1.80, and are available at all festival ticket agencies, as well as at the box office in Ashland.

The counselor-in-training program conducted by Camp Fire Girls at their resident camp at Lake of the Woods now in its fourth year, will be expanded this summer. The number of girls entering the course has been increased and the instruction will be augmented by the use of resource people, additional staff and a field trip.

## Joe Louis Given Post

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Joe Louis, who used to hammer a wicked tattoo with his fists, is beating the drum for a new record company.

The onetime Brown Bomber from Detroit disclosed today that he is a partner in Triangle Records. His associates are songwriter Cecil (Count) Carter and Los Angeles businessman Bill Graham.

Joe plans a lot of traveling to help promote the records. The ex-heavyweight champion now lives here. He was married last March to Martha Malone Jefferson.

The course, known as Camp Ka-est-a as the PAC course, is limited to a small group of older Camp Fire Girls who give evidence of having counselor qualifications and have demonstrated leadership ability in either their Camp Fire work or school and community activities. The two year course, three weeks each summer, provides a valuable training experience for future camp counselors and teachers. Girls selected for the first year's training are 16 years of age or have completed the junior year in high school.

The girls live together as a group at camp except for the portion of their training when they are assigned to living units of younger girls as part of their training. The PAC counselor and instructor this year is Donna Beckwith, high school teacher, Salem. She will be assisted by the

camp director, Mrs. Naomi French, the Camp Fire Council training chairman, Mrs. Louis Holzgang and other key camp personnel with specific skills.

Girls who have entered the course this year are Judy Johnson, Karen Goen, Sharon McCormick of this city; Gwyndolin Smith, Dorris and Nancy Johnston and Ruth Monckton, Ashland. All have experienced five or more summers at Camp Ka-est-a.

Second year PAC girls are Maryann Olson, Darlene Clark, Chubbie Spero of this city and Nancy Wemple, Dorris. These four girls will graduate at the Camp Council Fire on August 21 and will then be employed on the camp staff as counselors for the last week of camp.

Young women who have completed the course in past years are Mary Irving and Sue Lund of this city and Christine Ryer, Dorris, in 1936; Shara Lynn Loomis, Karen Totton Randall, this city and Denny Marshall, Dorris, in 1937. All except Miss Lund and Miss Marshall will be members of Ka-est-a staff this year.
