Basin Lad Aboard Plane On Radar Patrol Duty

Milton Wilson, whose mother, Mrs. Maggie Wilson, lives near Merrill, is a Navy plane crewman who tends seven tons of radar equipment riding on the spine and belly of a big Super-Constellation. He and hundreds of other servicemen often fly 1,500 dreary miles of Pacific Ocean from the Aleutian Chain to Midway Island in quest of unidentified planes and ships. Their beat, called the Pacific Barrier, is an extension of the nation's landlocked "Dewline," or Distant Early Warning system in Canada and Alaska. The barrier and Dewline form

a neat screen thousands of miles long that hostile craft must penetrate to reach North America. In a wink, once a bogie, or unidentified craft is spotted, word is relayed to a control center in Hawaii. The center, if it cannot identify the radar blip, notifies Continental Air Defense in Colorado, which in turn "scrambles" flights of jet interceptors in Hawaii and Alaska. They streak in for a kill if necessary.

Wilson is a part of a crew of 22 who man the six million dollar 71-ton plane on its 15-hour, 3,000-mile flights. At eight gallons per minute, the plane guzzles 23 tons of fuel aloft. It costs \$110 an hour to keep the plane in the air.

Planes of the Pacific Barrier have logged 54,000 flight hours and 10,800,000 miles. Fuel for last fiscal year cost \$5,940,000. There is no reason to believe the planes will quit flying.

Rear Admiral Benjamin E. Moore, Barrier commander, puts it this way: "Russian surface ships have patrolled the length of the barrier, and Red subs snoop the area often. We know they're there, and they know we know it. This fact serves as an effective deterrent to war."
