KUHS Reports Selection Of Pair To Coaching Jobs

Mansfield Top-flight Pitcher

Klamath Falls sports fans gained a localized interest in the Pan-American Games scheduled for Chicago's Wrigley Field August 26 through September 7 with the announcement today of the appointment of William C. (Bill) Mansfield to the post of head baseball coach at Klamath Union High School.

Mansfield, a graduate of Mich-

igan State University currently completing a tour of duty in the United States Army, is one of two servicemen selected to play on the 18-man baseball team representing the United States in the important Pan-Am.

His appointment to the KU baseball job, which coincided with the announcement by KU athletic director Jim Johnson of the selection of Al Keck as assistant basketball and football coach, rounds out the Pelican coaching staff for the coming school year.

In addition to his baseball job, Mansfield, a bachelor of science in physical sciences including math, chemistry and physics, will fill a gaping vacancy heretofore existing in the Klamath Union teaching staff.

Said Johnson, "We feel we are very fortunate to gain a man of Bill's qualifications, both on the baseball diamond and in the classroom."

Mansfield, the son of Arthur W. (Dynie) Mansfield, head baseball coach at the University of Wisconsin for over 20 years, is a 24-year-old 6-0, 170-pound right-handed pitcher who led the entire Big Ten conference in his senior year with an .000 earned-run average.

A first lieutenant in the Army's Transportation Corp stationed in Okinawa currently, Mansfield recently returned from 13 months of overseas duty in Korea. His release from service will come immediately following the completion of the Pan-Am games and he will report for work at Klamath Union on or about September 10.

During his senior year at Michigan State Mansfield served as president of the student body and was graduated with high scholastic honors.

In addition to his college diamond career Mansfield has spent over five years in top-flight amateur baseball including a 13-2 win-loss record while serving with the Army in Korea. He also served as coach of the First Cavalry All-Stars.

References and recommendations accompanying Mansfield on his brief visit to Klamath Falls Monday include high praise from "Biggie" Munn, MSU athletic director and "Duffy" Daugherty, football mentor.

Said Munn, "Bill is a fine athlete and leader. . . I would recommend Bill highly for any position for which he is qualified and should further recommendation be needed I would be happy to give same."

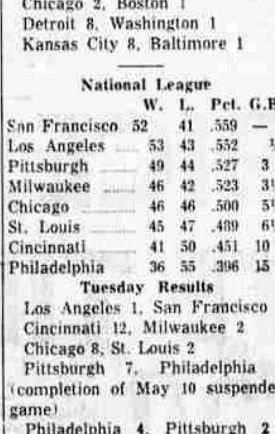
The position at Klamath Union is his first regular teaching and coaching job, however, he has served as a student-teacher at St. Joseph High School in addition to working as assistant football coach. Mansfield is unmarried.

Ray Bluth of St. Louis won the ninth annual ABC Masters tournament with a 7-0 record. He was the fourth unbeaten finalist in six years.

Al Keck Named To Berth

The Klamath Union High coaching staff has been further strengthened by the appointment of Alvin C. (Al) Keck to the positions of assistant football and assistant basketball coach effective as of the beginning of the fall school term.

Keck's acceptance of the posts was made public Monday by KU athletic director Jim Johnson in conjunction with the announce-

ment of the selection of Bill Mansfield as head baseball mentor.

Keck, no stranger to Klamath sports fans, has been the highly successful four sport coach of the Huskies at Merrill High for the past three years. He will join the KU staff immediately following his return from La Grande on August 22, where he will serve as head coach of the East team in the annual Shrine East-West football classic slated for Pendleton.

During his three year tenure at the home of the Huskies, Keck led his football teams to the state quarter-finals the first season, the semis the second, a mighty state championship on his third try.

His basketball teams collected a third in state competition in 1958-59 and league championships twice.

Keck-coached track squads have earned a third and fifth in state-wide rankings.

He, his wife and three youngsters plan on moving to Klamath Falls immediately upon locating a place to live.

He is currently finishing work at the University of Oregon on his master's degree. Keck is a graduate of both Minot Teachers College and the University of North Dakota.

During his college career he was a standout four-sport performer, collecting state championships in the discus and the shotput.

A promising major league baseball career was interrupted by World War II abetted by a knee injury in football.

Of Keck's acceptance, Johnson, whose responsibility it has been to fill vacancies created at KU by the departure of Andy Knudsen and Gene Strehlou, said, "Getting Al's agreement to join our staff takes a load off my mind. It rounds out, nicely, what I think should prove an excellent staff."

In addition to his coaching chores, Keck will serve as a classroom instructor in social studies, thus also alleviating some of the teacher problems existing at Klamath Union.

County School Superintendent Carol Howe, who now must find a suitable replacement for Keck at Merrill, said, "We are naturally sorry to see Al go—but we cer-

tainly will miss his coaching and leadership."

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McLish 3-Hits NY; Bums Close Up

Indians Maintain Top Spot

If there was any hope at all for the Cleveland Indians this past spring the bet was it lay in their young pitchers. Kids like Gary Bell 22, Mudcat Grant, 23, and Herb Score 25.

But here it is late July, the Indians have been out front in the American League for most of the season and who has been their ace? A guy named Cal McLish, at 33 a right-hander with a 12-3 record and the best percentage in the league.

He kept them in first by winning his seventh in a row Tuesday night with a three-hit job that beat New York's perked-up Yankees 5-1. That left Cleveland .002 percentage points ahead of Chicago's second-place White Sox, who beat Boston 2-1. It also put the fourth-place Yankees 6½ games behind.

McLish hasn't lost since June 7, when he dropped a one-run decision to the Yankees. That's his only loss to the champs, and he has been the pitcher in four of the Tribe's seven victories over the Yankees this season.

Since his current spurt started, he has won seven and saved one in relief, figuring in eight of Cleveland's last 19 victories.

While barely staying ahead of the White Sox, the Indians pulled 4½ games ahead of third-place Baltimore, beaten 8-1 at Kansas City. Detroit interrupted its skid with an 8-1 victory over Washington.

Indians 5, NY 1

All three hits off McLish were doubles, two by Norm Siebern, who paired with Bobby Richardson in the eighth to break through the big right-hander's bid for an elusive shutout. McLish, whose lone shutout in the majors was a National League job with the Cubs in 1952, walked none and struck out four in his seventh one-run game of the year.

The Indians got to southpaw Bobby Shantz (4-3) in the sixth, scoring three on Vic Power's infield single, Minnie Minoso's double, two errors and Tito Francona's 10th homer. The other two runs came in the seventh when reliever Jim Coates gave up a pair of bases-loaded walks.

Chicago 2, Boston 1

The White Sox broke a 1-1 tie in the seventh against Tom Brewer (7-7) when Jim Landis blooped a scoring single to right on a checked swing. Dick Donovan (7-5) gave up six hits, one Don Buddin's sixth-inning homer.

KC 8, Baltimore 1

Southpaw Bud Daley (10-4) blanked the Orioles on four hits until the ninth, when Walt Dropo homered. The A's had put it away early against loser Milt Pappas (10-5), scoring twice in the first and twice in the third.

Tigers 8, Solons 1

The Tigers, after losing seven of eight and 14 of their last 17, counted six runs on homers by Harvey Kuenn, Lou Berberet and Charlie Maxwell among their eight hits. Paul Foytack (9-8) was the winner with a six-hitter, giving up Roy Sievers' 13th homer in the second inning. Bill Fischer (8-4) lost his first in a month.

When a witness told the court Tuesday that Georgia Aragon knocked Art down during a brawl at her home July 12, Aragon shouted from his seat in the courtroom: "I slipped, your honor."

The witness was Barbara Shey, 20, a Reseda, Calif., dance instructor who accompanied Aragon to his ex-wife's home the day of the domestic brawl.

Mrs. Aragon said she didn't want to put Art in jail, that he acted on impulse, and she admitted she hit him and called Miss Shey an uncomplimentary name. Municipal Judge William Rosen that said that although he would dismiss the charge "I do not condone your molesting or striking your wife."

Braves' Loss Skein At Seven

On June 30, 1953, Jim Konstanty beat the Dodgers 10-9 in relief when Bill Nicholson scored on a squeeze bunt for the winning Philadelphia run in the 10th against Joe Black.

Pittsburgh beat the Giants 3-1 on June 30, 1953, when Cal Abrams hit an inside-the-park home run and Toby Atwell hit a two-run single. The Chicago Cubs rapped St. Louis 10-3 that day, with Ralph Kiner hitting his 16th homer and driving in three runs.

Konstanty? Nicholson, Black, Abrams? Atwell? Kiner?

That's how long it's been since the Milwaukee Braves last lost seven straight. Cincinnati did it, 6-3, on June 30, 1953.

Tuesday night, Cincinnati did it again, dropping the Braves with their first seven-game skid in six years. The Reds did it with a frolick 12-2 breeze while belting one-time nemesis Lew Burdette and tumbling the defending National League champs to fourth place.

Pittsburgh moved into third place, four percentage points ahead of the Braves, by picking up a 7-6 victory, in the completion of a May 10 suspended game with Philadelphia before dropping a regularly scheduled game to the Phillies 4-2. Chicago broke a fifth-place tie with St. Louis by belting the Cardinals 8-2.

Reds 12, Braves 2

The Braves, who haven't been fourth this late since two years ago (when they won the pennant), helped the Reds to their sixth victory in eight games with three boots good for a half-dozen runs.

Don Newcombe (10-3) gave up only five hits, one Johnny Logan's home run in the ninth, walked none, struck out six and drove in three runs with a pair of singles.

Bums 1, Giants 0

The Dodgers, held hitless for six innings, won in the ninth on a single by Charlie Neal and a double by Gil Hodges — the same pair who homered to get the two-game sweep under way with a 3-2 victory Monday.

Bucs 7-2, Phils 6-4

Ted Kluszewski, the Pirates' first fitter when the suspended game was resumed, tagged Jack Meyer's first pitch for a home run for the cushion they needed.

Cubs 8, Cards 2

Sammy Taylor's two-run single brought the Cubs behind for a 3-2 lead in the sixth against loser Larry Jackson (8-8). Jim Marshall's three-run homer and Ernie Banks' solo 26th then made it a rout in the ninth.

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
