DIARY OF A GIRL SCOUT AT CAMP

Editor's Note—This is one of several reports sent in by Fay Brannon, Senior Girl Scout, who with Karen Ralston represented Klamath County at the Girl Scout Roundup in Colorado Springs recently.

Sunday—This morning we practiced raising of the Avenue of Flags. The three of us, Ellen, Karen and I put up the Philippine flag. During the day we went to the trading post and that night had supper.

Following the evening meal we went to the flag lowering and then down the Trail of Tears to the Indian Village, where a group of boys did Indian dances. They were very good.

From there we went to the art exhibit building and met several girls from Massachusetts in Section 5. All the girls were nice and friendly. They came to our tent to swap with us and we talked and sang.

Monday—After breakfast we went to the flag raising. One of our friends took pictures of it for us. We then went on the Nature Trail. It is a lot like Oregon and has ponderosa pine along it.

Upon passing the trading post on the way back we stopped and got food for lunch.

We had rest period from 2 to 3 p.m. Some of us did our washing or wrote letters.

Later in the afternoon we again went to the trading post, where girls were given demonstrations of Indian dances. We then invited one of the instructors at the art exhibit to eat dinner with us.

This evening there was square

dancing in our Section A. There are over 1,000 girls in each section. In ours there are 352 girls plus adults.

Tuesday—Today we practiced for our demonstration after breakfast. We are also making costumes for it. We then picked up our laundry and went to the trading post, where we stood in line for 30 minutes, after which we got Cokes and watched roping demonstrations, cooking demonstrations and a marching drill by Marines.

After lunch Karen and I watched girls from Florida do the history of the Seminole Indians.

Wednesday—Today there was a program at the big arena of the Indian Village. Songs were sung and there was a grand entry of youths on horseback. They depicted scenes of the Old West.

Later a group of Boy Scouts did Indian dances for one hour and 45 minutes. They were wonderful. Then horse tricks were performed as well as rope tricks. It was most enjoyable.

Thursday—The main water pipe broke so we had to fill everything with water so the water could be turned off to be fixed.

It was very windy this morning. After breakfast we watched demonstrations. This afternoon we will go on a tour. We also went to the trading post where I was interviewed on the radio for about three minutes.

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Reich Threatens Peace, Says President Of UPI

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Frank H. Bartholomew, president of United Press International, said today that the biggest "real threat of war" exists in the person of the Communist boss of East Germany.

Bartholomew said that on a recent trip to Russia he had found no indication of war preparations. There were no air-raid shelters in Moscow and no air-raid sirens, he said.

"There has never been an air-raid drill," he said. "Nothing in the press indicates that war is expected. The people are told that they will be successful in completing the seven-year plan and the government will be successful in preventing war."

"My own personal opinion, then, is that we are observing the perpetration of the greatest military bluff in the span of written international history."

Bartholomew said, however, in a speech prepared for delivery to the Los Angeles Advertising Club, that "a real threat of war does exist."

"I think it lies in the person of Walter Ulbricht, secretary of the Communist Party of East Germany and the Communist boss of that unfortunate section of his nation."

Bartholomew interviewed Ulbricht in his "moth-eaten" East German empire and said he was a curious fellow, about whom Westerners should know as much as possible, "because he may loom of increasing importance in our scheme of things ahead."

"Don't take your eye off that little man with the bitter, sarcastic look and the itchy trigger-finger," he warned.

Bartholomew described Ulbricht as a German who has lived in the Soviet Union so long he speaks German with a Russian accent.

Ulbricht obviously regards his present position in East Berlin as "next to impossible," Bartholomew said. East Berlin is shabby while West Berlin is prosperous, he said, and Ulbricht can not hold the East Germans under his thumb forever with promises of a better life when they can take a subway ride to the West and see "what democracy really does."

"Hence Ulbricht knows the only way he can perpetuate himself and his crew is with the armed might of the U.S.S.R. immediately behind him, or by demolishing West Germany and digesting it into his own moth-eaten empire," Bartholomew said.

"Therefore, all evidence points to the fact that Ulbricht wants trouble and is constantly urging upon the Kremlin that he be allowed to bring the situation to a head."

Area Family Attends Meet

FORT KLAMATH — Warren (Lefty Wild Eagle) Wilder of Fort Klamath, accompanied by his two sons, Tony and Leonard, left recently for Pendleton, where they will attend the week's National Indian Encampment at which Indian tribes from all over the United States will be represented.

Lefty is a member of the Uruk tribe of the upper Klamath River in Northern California, and his wife Genie belongs to the Assiniboine tribe of Montana. The family is well known all over Klamath County and elsewhere, as they have on many occasions presented Indian tribal ceremonial dances, in colorful native attire and headaddresses. They have made several television appearances in Klamath Falls and Medford.

Mrs. Wilder was unable to accompany her husband and sons to the encampment. She remained at home to care for their business, located one mile south of Fort Klamath at the junction of Highways 62 and 232. The Wilders operate a service station and an Indian art and gift museum, and maintain on the grounds a collection of wild animals and birds which has proved a popular attraction for travelers in this area during the summer season.

She will be assisted in her work by her third son Albert, and a nephew, Duane (Butch) Wilder, who makes his home with the family in Fort Klamath.

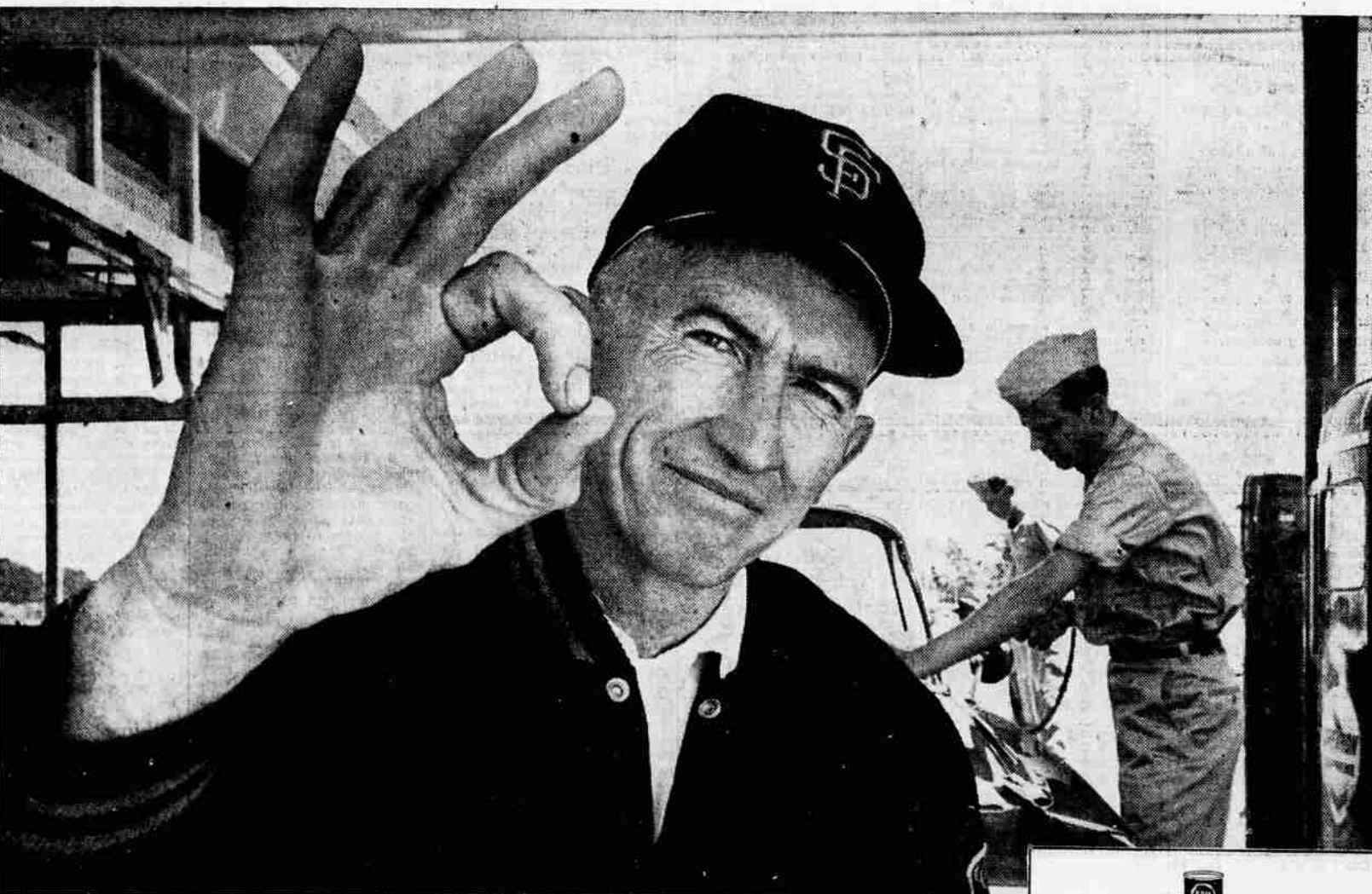


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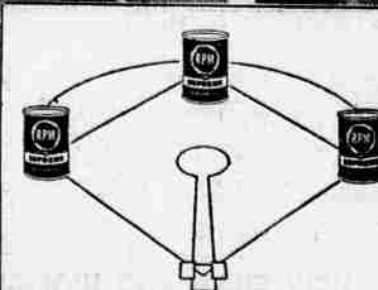
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
