### Atlas Flight Said Success

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — A mighty Atlas logged its first successful flight in more than five months and a Thor exploded seconds after launch in a spectacular missile show early today.

The Atlas rumbled 5,300 miles down the Atlantic missile range shortly after midnight and a recovery ship plucked its nose cone from the ocean an hour later. Two hours after the Atlas launch, the Thor ruptured in a brilliant blow-up high in the sky.

The Air Force announced that the range safety officer destroyed the Thor when his instruments detected a malfunction. It appeared the missile failed to halt its upward climb in the normal period.

The recovery of the Atlas nose cone off Ascension Island was a first for this missile. Thor-Able simulated warheads have been retrieved from the water in this area, but previous Atlas payloads eluded searchers.

The Air Force will study the cone to see how it withstood the tremendous heat it encountered on re-entry to the earth's atmosphere from a height of more than 300 miles. It is part of a test program to discover the proper nose cone for carrying thermonuclear warheads.

The Atlas success was a big boost for U.S. hopes for an operational intercontinental range ballistic missile. The Soviets claim they already have one.

### Strike Demands Castro Return

HAVANA (AP) — Cuba's giant Confederation of Workers called a one-hour general strike Thursday to demand that Fidel Castro return to the government.

Castro quit as prime minister Friday in a maneuver that forced out Manuel Urrutia as president. There has been talk since that he might put in a front man to look after the administrative details in which he has no interest while devoting his own time to his land reform program.

**LIGHTENING KILLS CATTLE** — ADVANCE MILLS, Va. (UPI) — A lightning bolt killed 19 Angus cattle huddled beneath a tree on a farm here. Farmer C. M. Fray, who reported the incident Tuesday, said the cattle were worth \$4,000.

### Federal Court Appearance Scheduled For Sleepwalker

CHICAGO (AP) — Ralph Goldberg told the officers he is a sleepwalker. In fact, Goldberg said, he is especially given to sleepwalking when he slumbers in hotels. But they didn't believe him.

Police Sgt. Charles Fitzgerald said, in the first place, Goldberg was wanted by immigration au-

thorities for alleged illegal entry from Canada.

In the second place, Goldberg occupied a room rented in the Morrison Hotel Monday night to one Frank (Hog Dogs) Lisicandrello, 41, described by police as an ex-convict and a robbery specialist.

And, in the third place, a jewelry convention was being held at the Morrison.

So Fitzgerald Tuesday had Goldberg and Lisicandrello and his wife, Margaret, charged with conspiracy to commit a felony. But to get back to the sleepwalking, let's tell this tale the way Fitzgerald related it.

Fitzgerald was in the lobby when Lisicandrello and his wife checked in as Mr. and Mrs. F. Noto of Los Angeles. They received a key to Room 1242, gave it to Goldberg and then left the hotel.

A hand of policemen was stationed in rooms about 1242. Goldberg was snoring through the night.

An alarm clock sounded at 4 a.m. in a nearby room occupied by one of the jewelry conventioners. Goldberg was heard to stir.

At 6:45 a.m. he strolled trance-like from 1242 toward 1238. He tinkered with the lock a bit and then entered—into the arms of detective Raymond Clark.

He explained about the sleepwalking, how he is especially afflicted when slumbering near the long halls of hotels, but to no avail.

Felony court appearances were scheduled today for Goldberg and the Lisicandrellos.

### Sinking Town Has Problem

JACUMBA, Calif. (AP) — This town is going down.

Not downhill or 'downtown—just plain down.

The 300 or so folks who live in this farming community two miles from the Mexican border figure they're in a hole.

The mystery began a week ago when a small crack appeared in the ground near the town's airfield.

It lengthened to 75 yards Monday and became a hole 150 yards long, 5 feet deep and 3 feet wide Tuesday.

It all but swallowed a tractor cutting across a field. A tow truck had to haul it out.

When rancher Hank Ketchum recovered his tractor, he noticed that water from his irrigation ditch was vanishing down two nearby holes. He had to dam up his irrigation ditch.

A 17-year-old girl who went to look at it was buried up to her knees when the ground gave way beneath her. She was pulled out unharmed.

Geologist Don Weaver has an explanation.

Jacumba is about 150 feet above an ancient lava shelf. Runoff water from a nearby Mexican mountain range has caused subterranean erosion. The result: the shell is caving in and the earth is settling. There were cloudbursts and flash floods here two weeks ago.

Weaver says the earth settling could continue for a week, 10 days or longer.

### Liberty Statue Asked For Isles

HONOLULU (AP) — A candidate for one of Hawaii's two U.S. Senate seats suggests a second Statue of Liberty be built at the entrance of Honolulu Harbor.

Republican territorial Sen. Wilfred C. Tsukiyama, 62, dean of Hawaii legislators of Japanese ancestry, made the suggestion at a political rally Tuesday.

He said the statue would symbolize to the Pacific and Asia the same ideals represented by the original Statue of Liberty in New York Harbor.

LONDON (AP) — Sir Winston Churchill observed the no smoking rule today on boarding a British airliner for the Riviera. Usually he ignores it.

The British elder statesman's car drove him and Lady Churchill to within a few yards of the steps of the airliner, and Churchill put out his cigar before getting out.

"As far as I know nobody has dropped a hint," said a spokesman for British European Airways. "We would never stop him. He has been traveling with us a long time and is certainly a very special passenger."

### Cigs-Cancer Link Cited

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Dr. Alton Ochsner, a New Orleans surgeon lecturing at the post-graduate medical assembly of Texas here, said Tuesday the advance of lung cancer is due entirely to cigarette smoking.

"Lung cancer since 1953 has become the most frequent of all cancers," he said.

"Until 1935 lung cancer occurred in the male and female in about the same number of cases. In that year males started gaining. Now 85 per cent of all lung cancer occurs in males."

"Smoking is a form of suicide," he said.

The tobacco industry, which has financed extensive research in the field, contends there has been no scientific proof of a connection between cigarette smoking and cancer.

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
