

Little Leaguers Face Big Tilt

Tarheels' Jim Tatum Succumbs

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP)—Jim Tatum, 46, University of North Carolina football coach, died Thursday night of a virus infection.

Only his doctors were permitted at his bedside in the isolation ward of the North Carolina Memorial Hospital.

His wife Edna lay ill at home suffering from the same highly contagious virus. She is expected to recover.

In the hospital halls stood relatives, friends and players praying that the big, moon-faced man would win this lonely fight.

Tatum was hospitalized with the virus last Saturday. Since then, his condition worsened rapidly.

Always the center of controversy, Tatum returned to his alma mater here just four years ago. He wanted to rebuild the school into a national football power.

He came from the University of Maryland, where he had built a football dynasty in nine years. His teams there played in three bowl games. In 1953 his team was named national champion and Tatum was voted Coach of the Year.

"Organization," was Tatum's reply to those who asked him his secret of success. He shone as a recruiter and he was known as a tough taskmaster on the practice field. But above all, he was a top-flight administrator and organizer.

A strong family man, Tatum built a fine home in this college village he loved and embarked on a program of rebuilding North Carolina football. Ironically, he figured this year's team would fulfill his dream.

Tatum first came to the University of North Carolina in 1931 from his home in McCall, S.C. Playing under Carl Snavely, Tatum was an all-Southern Conference player.

He was graduated in 1935, followed Snavely to Cornell, but later returned to North Carolina as director of freshmen athletics, becoming head football coach in 1942.

He entered the Navy, served as an assistant to Don Faurot at the Iowa preflight school, and then became coach of the Jacksonville (Fla.) Naval Air Station.

He went to Oklahoma in 1946, guiding his team into the Gator Bowl.

Then he moved to Maryland. At Maryland, his teams won 73 games, lost only 15, and played 5 ties. His teams played in the Orange, Sugar and Gator bowls.

KF, Lakeview Youngsters Vie For Crown At Mills

The cream of two crops of Little League baseball players, one from Klamath Falls and one from Lakeview, square off at 4 p.m. Saturday in Mills Little League Park for the subdistrict championship and the right to continue at Portland next Friday in the quest for the World Little League championship.

Saturday's match, which pits All-Star squads from both communities, is the culmination of two years effort on the parts of

KF Little Leaguers and three for the Lakeview nine. A National Association ruling prescribes that any organization competing on a tournament level must have completed its second year as an active member of the National group.

The subdistrict playoff, which qualifies the winner for the right to represent the district in playoffs at Fairview Farms Park in Portland July 31, will begin promptly at 4 o'clock after brief introduction ceremonies.

Additional bleachers are being constructed at Mills Park to accommodate what is expected to be a tremendous crowd. There is no admission charge.

The Klamath Falls squad is led by manager B. M. Antle and coaches Veryl Young and Bob Moore. The Lakeview unit, which will arrive here for a practice workout on the playing site Saturday morning at 10 is led by ex-Klamath Falls resident Bob Howard. Working with Howard is coach Harold Cook.

During regular season play Antle and Young directed the league champion Weyerhaeuser - Dons team while Moore worked with Hal's Sport Shop, Howard's and Cook's regular season affiliations are not known.

The Klamath Falls lineup, decided late Friday, with the exception of the choice of a starting pitcher, finds Bob Moss catching, either Tim Bailey or Steve Young on the mound, Dick Bath at first base, Jon Crume on second, Larry Barnes playing shortstop, John Parisotto at third, Dave Johnson

Minnie Poles Grand-Slammer; Giants, Los Angeles Both Win

Somebody say the New York Yankees still were the team Cleveland had to beat? Great guy for jokes, that fellow. The Indians left them battered.

It was the Yankees who tumbled the Indians out of first place a week ago, then dumped them to second again Wednesday night when Cleveland blew a 4-0 lead.

But Thursday night the Indians played like contenders again, edging within a half-game of the rain-idled first place Chicago White Sox as Minnie Minoso's grand-slam homer triggered a seven-run sixth inning that overhauled a 4-0 Yankee lead and beat the champs 8-5.

Indians 8, NY 5

It was the insistent Indians' eighth victory in 17 games against New York this season—and the seventh they've put away with a home run.

This one, Minoso's 15th, made Minnie the first in the AL to hit two slams this season—and it was his first home run against Yankee pitching in three years, almost to the day. His last home run against New York came on July 24, 1956, when he was swinging for the White Sox.

KC 9, Orioles 3

Harry Chitt, Dick Williams and Roger Maris homered for the A's, who scored the clincher on Wayne Terwilliger's two-run single in the third for a 5-0 lead against loser Hec Brown (6-6). Ned Garver (6-9) won it with a seven-hitter, on Billy Klaus' home run, after pitching a two-hit shutout for five frames.

Tigers 11, Nats 2

Harvey Kuenn, the bat leader at .347, and Al Kaline, No. 3 at .340, each had four hits for the Tigers and drove in five runs.

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between them in support of a four-hitter by Jim Bunning (9-8).

The lean right-hander gave up a first-inning run on singles by Bob Allison and Harmon Killebrew and a sacrifice fly, but then blanked the Nats on one hit until Allison smacked his 26th home run in the ninth. Hal Woodeshick (6-2) lost it.

If there's to be a turning point in the tight fight for the National League pennant, it may be at hand—not in the won-lost records or batting averages, but in the injury lists.

For while right-hander Jack Sanford proved himself sound again by pitching first-place San Francisco to a 5-1 victory over St. Louis Thursday, Milwaukee's third place Braves found they'll have to do without slugging Ed Mathews indefinitely. And second-place Los Angeles lost Gil Hodges for at least a week.

Hodges, the man with the big bat in the Dodgers' comeback, pulled a leg muscle after his 19th home run had touched off a 5-3 victory over the Chicago Cubs.

Mathews, the NL home run lead-

er with 29, was kept out of the lineup because of a bruised hip.

Dodgers 5, Cubs 3

Hodges broke up a scoreless tie with a two-run homer in the fourth, then was injured sliding in the sixth. The big first baseman is battling .293.

Wally Moon also homered for the Dodgers, his seventh, and forced in another run with a bases loaded walk in a two-run seventh that nailed it for Larry Sherry (1-2). The young right-hander singled home the clincher in the seventh for his first major league victory, but needed Don Drysdale's saving relief job after Ernie Banks singled home two runs in the eighth. Moe Drabowsky (4-8) was the loser.

Giants 5, Cards 1

Sanford had the Cardinals blanked until the ninth, walking one, striking out five and allowing nine hits. Wally Shannon's two-out single broke up the shutout.

Cincy 6, Braves 2

Willie Jones' grand-slam homer beat the Braves in the eighth after a two-out error by second baseman Bobby Avila.

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
