

Legionnaires Victors Over BR All-Stars

The American Legion baseball team closed its 1959 season with a pair of commanding victories and two complete teams of Babe Ruth League All-Stars got a good workout as the Legionnaires dropped the National League Stars 7-3 and then pounded the American Stars 14-3 in a big doubleheader at Gem Stadium Thursday night.

The twinbill, which attracted one of the better crowds of the season, was arranged as a proving ground for the newly-formed All-Star aggregations and was the initial action for each as a playing unit.

Credited with the victory in the first game was Gary Beber, who hurled a no-hit, no-run effort for better than four innings. In the fifth frame, Beber tightened up, loading the bases with the only single gained by the Nationals plus a pair of walks. His relief, Estin Kiger, normally a third baseman, walked a pair, allowing the Nats to score three runs before the first game was over.

The winner of the second game was Legion's John Webb. Webb gave up the only two American League safeties before stepping down in favor of Blake Griggs who finished up.

Basinette '9' Hosts Red Bluff

Coach Ken Carrier's Klamath Basinette squad hopes to nab its second win of the season over Red Bluff in a rematch scheduled for Saturday night at Gem Stadium. Game time has been moved up to 7:30 instead of 8 o'clock as previously reported.

The Red Bluff team fell to the KF girls two weeks ago, 6-2, when the local nine traveled into Northern California for a pair of exhibition tilts, one with this week-end's foe and the other with Orland.

Carrier has slated Karen Smith to move in from her regular left field position to take over the mound chores in place of Joy Adreon, who will be out of town for Saturday's contest. Adreon flipped a 14-0, three hit shutout against Roseburg Sunday in the Basinettes' last action.

The remainder of the KF lineup for the final game of the season will be Terry Wickline catching, Ruth Hagelstein at first base, Sharon Wilson at second, Susy McPherson at shortstop and Shirley Anderson at third while the outfield will be composed of Chris Shearer in left field, Darlene Perry in center and Jody Sims in right.

Heavyweights TV Feature

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Willie Pastrano, who never has been knocked off his feet, takes on Alonzo Johnson tonight in a heavyweight 10-rounder which is a must for both fighters.

The National Boxing Assn. ranks Johnson seventh. The NBA has Pastrano unranked but RING magazine rates him eighth.

The nimble Pastrano needs to win to remain a contender. Johnson has won 12 in a row and needs the fight to continue his fistic rise.

Pastrano originally was scheduled to meet Alex Miteff, but Miteff was ailing.

Johnson, whose home is in Bradock, Pa., has won 17 of 18 fights. Pastrano, of Miami, has a 48-7-5 record.

The Americans used four chuckers: starter Kent Hunsaker who allowed four hits, five runs, walked two and fanned two to be charged with the defeat; Gary Patzke, who issued three runs and three hits while walking one; Sherm Allen, who gave up four hits, four runs and walked one; and Jay Paxton, two runs, two hits and also walked one.

The Nationals also called upon four pitchers. The starter, Norman Davis gave up one run and one hit in his inning, was charged with the loss. He was followed by Dick Carleton, who gave up two hits and three runs; Sam Walker who issued one hit and no runs and Lyle Phelps who was reached for two hits, three runs, two walks and fanned one.

The big hitter for the Legion over the two games was center-fielder Rich Dewey who poked a triple and three singles in five charged at bats. Don Willey, Blake Griggs, Steve Binney and Ross Paxton each added three singles through the evening.

Sherm Allen and Chuck Phillips collected American singles while Ron Simpson notched the only National bingle.

The two BR nines enter the district tournament along with Lakeview at Gem Stadium next Tuesday.

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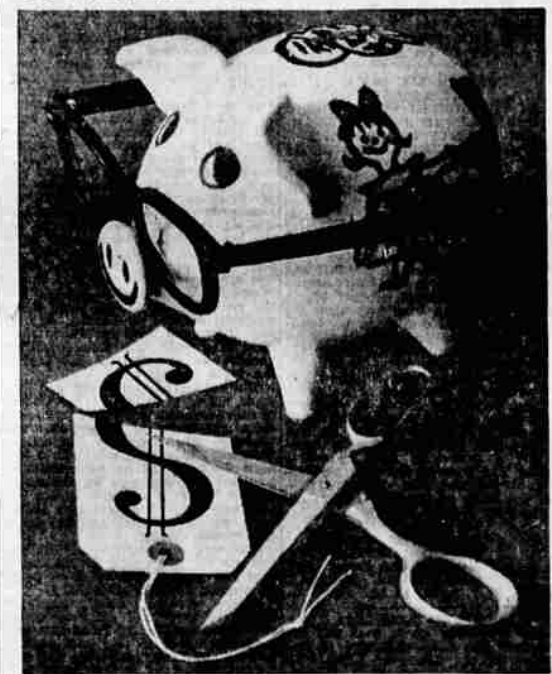


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
