

Chief Lists 'Must' Bills

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower today put labor control, road construction and farm measures at the top of legislation he wants Congress to pass in this session.

Eisenhower was asked at his news conference if he has any "must" list of legislation.

The President replied that he has not gone to the trouble of making out such a list. But he said the first order of business in his earlier messages to Congress was a bill to provide machinery to curb all of the abuses brought out by the Senate Labor-Management Committee investigation.

Eisenhower went on to say that in his judgment one necessary measure would be the one to provide the revenue for continuing the interstate highway construction program.

The President said a decent farm bill is terribly important at even this late date in the session.

The Senate has passed a labor control bill based in part on the disclosures made by the special investigating committee headed by Sen. John McClellan (D-Ark). The House has not yet acted on a labor bill.

Eisenhower has asked an increase of 1 1/2 cents per gallon in gasoline taxes to finance continued construction in the interstate road program. House Democrats have been talking of a compromise but the Ways and Means Committee has not yet acted finally on any measure in this field.

The two houses have been unable to agree on any general farm legislation. There seems little prospect that the Democratic-dominated Congress will act in this field.

Law Offered By Hatfield

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Mark Hatfield suggested Wednesday that other states copy Oregon's new law providing for succession to the governor in event of his physical or mental disability.

The new law provides that a committee shall have the power to determine when the governor is physically or mentally unable to serve. Members of the committee are the state's Chief Justice, dean of the University Medical School and superintendent of the state hospital.

Hatfield said he would urge the resolutions committee of the National Governor's Conference to encourage governors to recommend such legislation in all states.

He said Oregon's new law protects the state "from the costly hide and seek game which has engulfed the state of Louisiana."

Such a law in Louisiana, he said could have forced Long to turn his office over to his lieutenant governor.

Cancellation Of Journey Explained By Red Leader

WARSAW (AP) — "When they spit in my face, a guest, why should I go?"

Thus Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev explained the sudden cancellation of his three-week August visit to Scandinavia.

"I only want to go to places where my message can be helpful," Khrushchev told newsmen at a Soviet Embassy reception Tuesday night celebrating his "friendship tour" of Poland.

"Maybe I will go later," he added.

"My visit to Scandinavia would not have been a step to peace, but would have led to sharpened tensions."

The Soviet government sent notes to Sweden, Norway, and Denmark Sunday calling off Khrushchev's visit because of what it termed an unfavorable atmosphere. It assailed Scandinavian politicians and editors.

"I think well of the Swedes," Khrushchev said at the reception.

"They beat us and then Peter (the Great) beat them at Poltava. I consider we are quits. I have nothing against (Swedish Premier Tage) Erlander nor against Premier H. C. Hansen of Denmark."

"But when a government newspaper (which he did not identify) comes out against my visit, that is another pair of shoes."

Asked what he thought about the Geneva conference, Khrushchev replied:

"I think nothing. Why must I
