

Statistics Prove Champion's Claim

The combination of powerful hitting and stout pitching which carried Weyerhaeuser-Dons to the 1959 Klamath Falls Little League championship proved to be the difference as the W-D squad racked up a near-perfect 14-1 record in league competition.

Dave Johnson led the league in the hitting department while

teammate Steve Young paced the pack in the pitching category. Johnson rapped the ball at a sparkling .510 clip while Young hurled eight victories without a defeat.

Other departments in which the league champs led were individual doubles, triples, homers, runs scored and runs-batted-in while also pacing the league team-wise in triples and homers.

Johnson, aside from his league-leading average, also led in doubles with six, homers with eight, and runs-batted-in with 32. Richard Bath, also of W-D, followed a close second behind Johnson with an even .500 average while pacing the league with 33 runs scored.

As a team the W-D squad hit a resounding .332 and poled 22 three-baggers while tying with second-place Hal's Sport Shop in homers, both with 12. The Hal's nine ranked first in doubles with 20, and second in percentage with a .315 mark.

The league's last-place squad, Car-Ad-Co, who won only one game all season, second in homers with 11. Bend-Portland tied with Weyerhaeuser-Dons for second place honors in two-basers, each with 18.

Pitching-wise Johns - Manville hurlers allowed only 65 bases on balls while the Bend - Portland pitching staff, led by Jim Patzke, took high honors with a total of 136 strikeouts. The Car-Ad-Co

staff gave up 132 free passes and picked up only 91 strikeouts for the "worst" in that category.

Patzke led the league with 21 whiffs, followed by John Parisotto's (Johns-Manville) 48 and Young's 46. Parisotto also yielded 20 walks in 45 innings to pace the league.

DUNSMUIR—The Dunsmuir Little League All-Stars bowed to the Northern Siskiyou All-Stars, 4-3, Tuesday night in a benefit game for Dunsmuir player Terry Dickerson. Terry is still hospitalized with a broken leg, shattered as he defended third base, while playing with the Dunsmuir Cubs, recently.

In a tight game under the lights at the Dunsmuir Park, both teams were limited to four hits. Ken Jones, hurling for the northern team, allowed no hits in the opening three innings. Ed Flowers and Bill Gray pitched for the Dunsmuir team. Bill Newlin, Dunsmuir fielder, drew applause with a spectacular catch in center field and starred again by accounting for one hit.

In the final games of the season, Joe Blevins drove through a bases-loaded home run and Bill Wheeler slammed two homers to put the Stars ahead of the Giants, 14-6, in the opener Monday night. Johnny Antonelli had more trouble with the wind at Seals Stadium Friday night. But the San Francisco Giants hustled an ailing Willie Mays off the bench and Sam (Dependable) Jones out of the bullpen for a 2½-game lead in the National League race.

It was Jim Davenport's two-out, 10th inning single that gave the Giants a 6-3 victory over the Chicago Cubs, but only after Mays, out of the line-up because of a sore neck, had come through with a pinch-hit single as San Francisco gained a 5-5 tie in the eighth. And it was Jones, an ace as a starter or in relief, who blanked the Cubs on one hit over the last two frames for his 14th victory.

Antonelli, still smarting from the rebuttal after blaming the Giants' wind-blown park for two homers that beat him earlier in the week, got in trouble when the Cubs overhauled a 2-0 Giant lead with three in the fifth, touched off by Bobby Thomson's home run.

Second-place Los Angeles slipped with a 2-1 defeat by the St. Louis Cardinals. The Dodgers now are just two games ahead of the third-place Milwaukee Braves, who rapped Pittsburgh 6-0 behind Juan Pizarro's four-hitter. Philadelphia defeated Cincinnati 2-1 on Carl Sawatski's two-run pinch-hit homer in the ninth.

Al Smith, the guy they used to boo, now is the big man with the 11th hour bat for Chicago's White Sox, who don't win by much but make the most of it.

The Sox retained their half-game lead in the American League by beating Baltimore 2-1 Friday night, and it was Smitty's ninth-inning home run that did it, giving southpaw Billy Pierce the edge in a duel with Hoyt Wilhelm after Nellie Fox's two-out triple tied it in the eighth.

It was Chicago's 22nd one-run victory against five defeats. It also was the 16th decision the Sox have put away in the final inning—and the fifth time Smitty has done the job.

Second-place Cleveland stayed close by whipping Washington 5-2. Detroit rapped New York 4-1 and Kansas City made it five straight with a 3-1 decision over Boston.

A walk, sacrifice and Davenport's single after an intentional walk to Mays, added another game to the Giants' lead as they beat reliever Don Elston (5-3) for their third in a row.

The Cubs, losing their home run king, shortstop Ernie Banks, who

was spiked on the foot in the first inning, had taken a 5-4 lead in the sixth on Earl Averell's two-run homer. But the Giants then tied it when Leon Wagner and Mays delivered pinch singles in the eighth after a single by Jackie Brandt, who earlier had homered.

Cards 2, Bums 1

Southpaw Johnny Podres (8-7) lost his third in a row for the Dodgers after balking the Cardinals on three hits until the eighth inning. Then four singles gave the Cards both runs, with Bill White's hit tying it 1-1 and Gino Cimoli's two-out hit beating his ex-mates.

Lindy McDaniel's two inning, hitless mopup saved it for Ernie Broglio (3-6). The Dodgers, playing without injured Gil Hodges, scored in the fifth on a walk and Charlie Neal's two-out double.

Braves 8, Bucs 0

Joe Adcock hit a two-run homer, his 10th, in the first inning for the Braves, then added another RBI with a single in a four-run fifth against lower Harvey Haddix (7-8). Pizarro (3-1), the young lefty who earlier pitched a two-hit shutout against the Bucs, struck out a dozen in this one, fanning every Pirate at least once.

Phils 2, Cincy 1

Rookie right-hander Jay Hook (1-1) had the Phils shut out on five hits until the ninth, when he gave up a walk ahead of Sawatski's fifth home run, the ninth pinch-hit homer by the Phillies this season. Jim Owens (6-3) was the winner, blanking the Reds on five hits until the eighth, when Eddie Kasko hit his first home run.

Chicago 2, Birds 1

Pierce (11-1) beat the third-place Orioles, who now trail by seven games, with a six-hitter. He gave up a third inning home run by Bob Nieman, but allowed only one hit over the last five frames. Wilhelm (10-6) lost for the sixth time in seven decisions although the White Sox managed just five hits. They were shut out on three singles—two by Fox—until the eighth, when a walk came ahead of Fox's three-bagger.

The winning homer was No. 8 for Smith, who was hobbled by a bum ankle last season and was given a bum rap by Chicago fans when he replaced the popular Minnie Minoso in left field after a swap with the Indians. It was the third time Smitty's homered for a last inning decision for the Sox, who have bagged only 11 of their

34 victories by more than three runs, and only 20 by more than two.

Indians 5, Nats 2

The Indians broke right-hander Camilo Pascual's winning streak at seven while Gary Bell (9-9) skidded the Senators to their fifth straight defeat with a six-hitter. Cleveland scored in the second off Pascual (11-8) on Jim Raxewsky's solo home run, then clinched it in the third on George Strickland's two-run single. Roy Sievers scored both Nat runs with his 15th and 16th homers.

Tigers 4, NY 2

Don Mossi (8-4) became only the fifth southpaw in the last 25 years to beat the Yankees five times in one season. He had a four-hit shut-out until the ninth, when Elston Howard hit a two-run homer. Don Larsen (6-6) lost his fifth in a row, lasting only through a two-run first inning touched off by Eddie Yost's 13th homer, his one season high. The Tigers, only a game behind the fourth-place champs, who trail by eight, scored a deciding pair against reliever Eli Grba in the sixth on a walk, error and singles by Lou Berberet and Ted Lepcio.

KC 3, Boston 1

Three singles and an error gave Kansas City two runs in the third and Dick Williams then hit his ninth home run—fourth in four games—in the fifth off loser Frank Sullivan (6-6). Johnny Kucks (4-8) won it, allowing nine hits.

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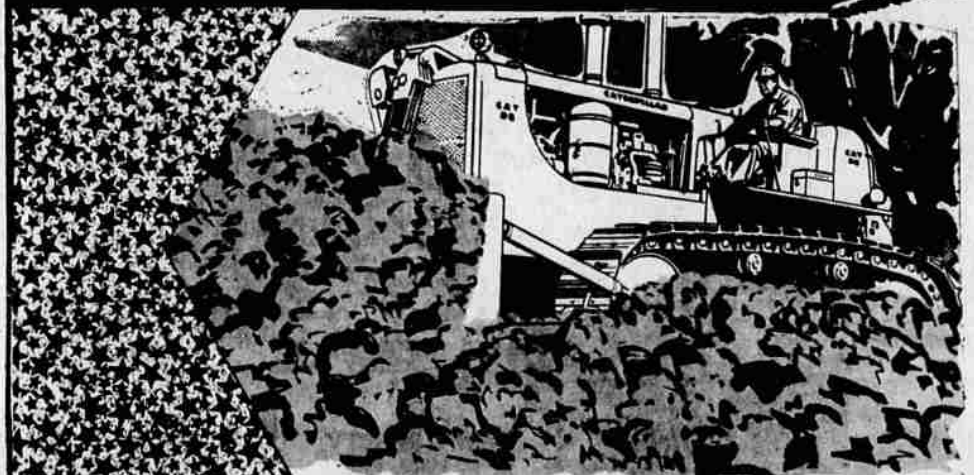
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
