

Centennial Flower Show To Feature Special Displays

August 1 and 2 are the dates set for the Centennial Flower Show sponsored by the Klamath District Garden Clubs. Garden clubs from all over the Klamath Basin are cooperating on its management. A feature of the show will be special displays by other clubs and groups of people interested in the history and the progress of this area.

The Centennial Flower Show started out to be just a plain flower display, but under the leadership of Mrs. Crystal Cheyne as general chairman of the show, and Mrs. Scott McKendree, director of the Klamath district, it has broadened to become one of the main features of the Centennial program for the Basin. The chairman of the Centennial program, Ben Swartz Jr., and the local Centennial committee have given their support to the project.

The theme of the show is based on the idea, "The Heritage of a Century," and will show the progress from the days of the first settlers to the present day. Besides the show itself, there will be exhibits of historical objects by the Historical Society, of native Indian artifacts by the Artifacts Society, a display of local art by the Art Society, and a collection of native trees by the Crater Lake

Ranger Service. Local merchants and industries are contributing a share to the project in the way of materials or awards to be given to the junior winners.

Entries for the flower show are to be made on the afternoon of July 31, at the exhibit building of the Klamath County Fairgrounds. There are two main sections—one for horticultural specimens, another for arrangements. The horticultural specimens will include any flower that can be grown here. Containers will be furnished by the show committee.

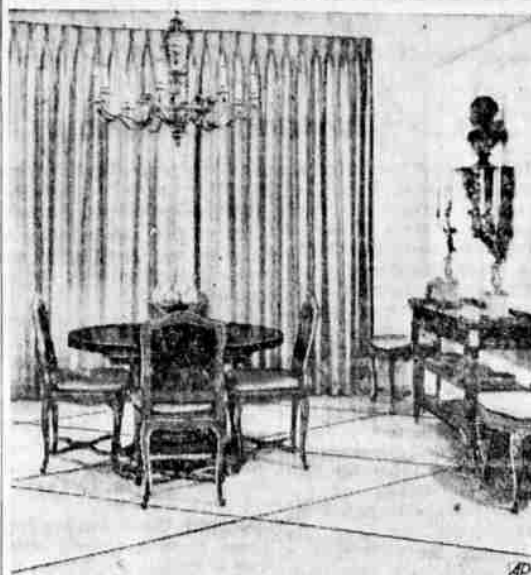
The arrangements include such intriguing labels as "Along the Applegate Trail," a composition of native material, and "The Family Album," old-fashioned arrangements featuring an album or an old-fashioned picture. These glass pieces have individuality and may be used in a variety of ways for years and years. The handwrought glass, which is made in America, displays the natural beauty of the material, combined with the handcraft skill.
