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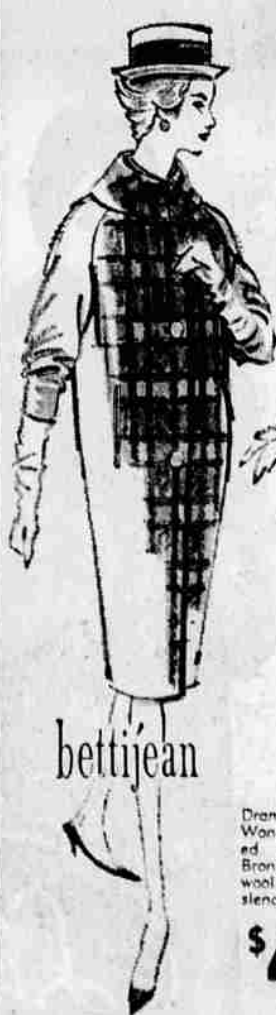
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WASHING TIP

Nurses and those who wear white uniforms on the job can keep them sparkling with a heavy-duty soap. Soap is recommended rather than detergents because it helps preserve antistatic finishes present on most white nylon uniforms. Use a water softener when using soap though, so soap curds won't discolor the uniform.

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
