the name appropriately given to an institution established in Koda in 1957 as unique—and remarkably successful—experiment in meeting a little-recognized need in postwar Japan.

"New ways of thinking and living have come to Japan since the end of the war," says Shiga. "Our society has become democratized. But the old folk, whose minds are deeply ingrained with feudal, old-fashioned ideas, have often found it difficult to adjust to the new Japan."

"Our 'university' is an attempt to help the old people of Koda make this adjustment, so they can understand and enjoy their new environment instead of feeling useless and discarded."

At 90, widow Ju Suzuki is the oldest student at Kotobuki.

Youngsters under 70 do not qualify for admission, though many would like to.

"We keep enrollment down to about 60 for financial reasons. The 'university' operates on an annual budget of \$277 dollars apportioned out of local taxes by the Koda town assembly. And tuition is free."

There are 32 men and 28 women in the class of '59 from a town of 18,000 people of which about 800 are over 70 years old.

Classes are held once a month at the Koda town hall to which the old folk commute by bus, on foot, and sometimes in muddy weather on the rear luggage racks of bicycles pedaled by sons or daughters.

Ten classes constitute a complete course, but attendance at eight of these is sufficient to assure a student of a diploma.

Classes last from two to five in the afternoon and are divided into lecture and recreation sessions.

"For lectures," Shiga explains, "we have teachers come to discuss problems of the old in our changing society, which is something no one ever considered before."

"Students are encouraged to talk about their particular problems and this serves as a basis for general discussion."

"We also have talks on politics and other subjects of current interest. And travelogue movies are also popular."

"For recreation, the old folk try their hand at handicrafts, or play games, for example, trying to walk a straight line with an apple balanced on the head. They seem to enjoy themselves as much as small children."

Capucci's Double Hems Star In Florence Show

FLORENCE (AP)—Capucci dropped double hems recently and all but ran away with the Florence showing of fall and winter fashions.

The young couturier's collection had a big impact on the buyers and fashions writers who have been watching the newest Italian fashions in the historic old Pitti Palace.

His styles had an over-all look which seemed to hit closest to what Italian designers have been trying to achieve.

Capucci's collection is a pageant of hemlines, consistently low. Nearly every costume has two: one on the skirt, another on a jacket or a nine-tenths length coat.

The distance between the hems is either several inches, or from the top of the thigh to below the knee. Floor-length gowns are worn with knee-length satin smocks.

The Capucci line is straight—strictly vertical—with elongated tunics or stretched out middles spanning the torso. Sometimes the tunics or tubed skirts are threaded with six-inch belts, but most of the time the waist is a wasteland and tunics a waistless sheath.

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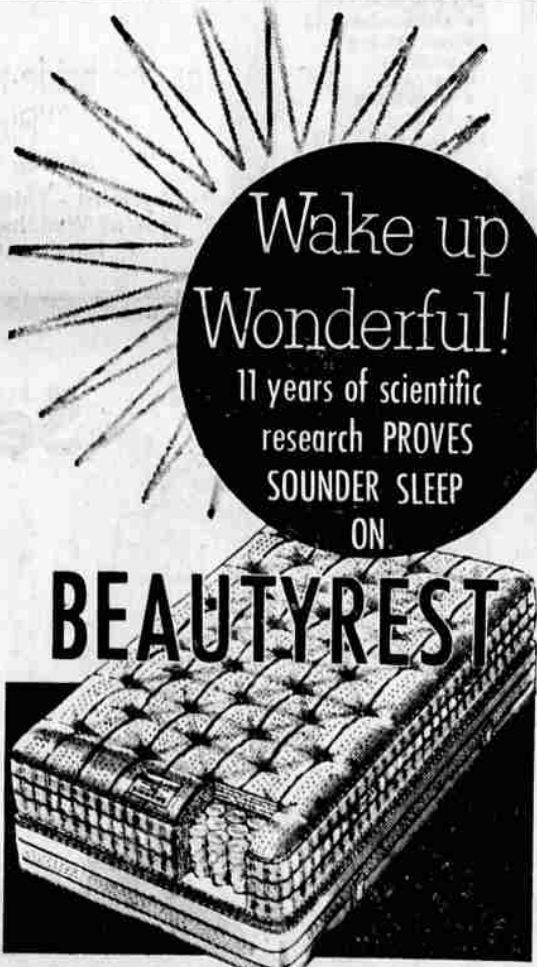
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
