

Church Group Backs UF-RC

The Klamath Council of Churches went on record as approving of and giving its support to the Klamath County United Fund, at its last regular executive committee meeting held recently.

Those present felt that the idea of one drive would be beneficial to the community, and that member churches should be encouraged to promote, through their congregations, the support of the fund.

Further business included the request of several grocery stores to have representatives of the member churches take the issue of Sunday closing in Klamath Falls to their local boards to determine the degree of interest.

The council has not taken any specific action concerning this matter, but feels that if there is support by the stores and the churches represented, a study of the situation can be made.

A program, possibly in the future, was also brought up at the meeting. It would be a one-day training school for techniques in teaching Sunday school classes, and would be offered to the community sometime around the first of April, 1960.

This course will only be presented if member churches feel it is needed. If so, actual teaching situations involving children would be presented to teachers from all departments of the various churches, who would observe.

The sentence was imposed by U.S. Dist. Judge George H. Moore. A jury convicted Jacobs April 30 of evading payment of \$22,691 in taxes in 1951 and 1952.

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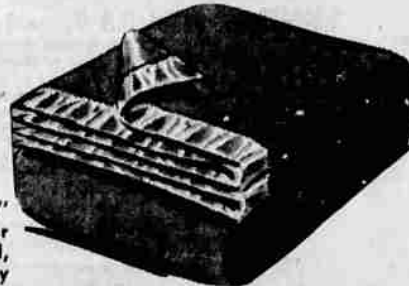
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
