

Patzke 1-Hits Foe

KF Little Leaguers Victor

A fifth-inning home run ruined a near perfect game for pitcher Jim Patzke as the Klamath Falls Little League All-Stars trampled the Lakeview All-Stars 8-1 to win the sub-district championship at Mills Little League Park Saturday afternoon.

The KF victory guaranteed the local nine a berth in the district Little League playoffs set for Portland's Fairview Field next Friday afternoon, the second step toward the coveted World's Little League championship.

Patzke, a 12-year-old right-handed fireball, twirled three-up, three-down baseball for all but two frames of the regulation six inning contest. He walked one man in the third stanza but no one else, with the exception of Lakeview rightfielder Mike Wiggins, was to reach second base. Wiggins fielded one over the center field wall in the fifth for Lakeview's only tally.

Providing the cushion for

Patzke's superb pitching performance was a trio of home runs, two off the bat of KF's Dick Schiff, and one by rightfielder Tom Bath. The powerful pair drove home all eight of the Klamath Falls markers.

Second baseman John Crume collected a pair of singles in four trips while Bob Moss, Steve Young, Larry Barnes and Patzke each contributed singles to the winning cause.

KF 'Nine' Edge Out Red Bluff

A single by shortstop Susy McPherson drove home the winning run to cap a thrilling, come-from-behind 7-6 victory for the Klamath Basinettes over Red Bluff at Gem Stadium Saturday night.

McPherson's blow to left-center field followed singles by Ruth Hagelstein, Terry Wickline and Chris Shearer to bring the local nine from a 6-5 deficit to their fifth victory of the season against three losses.

McPherson, Hagelstein and Wickline led the 13-hit attack against Red Bluff's Ruth Dolan to back up the four-hit hurling of Karen Smith. Hagelstein had a perfect night at the plate, rapping three singles and a double while Wickline poled a trio of one-baggers.

McPherson smashed a three-run homer in the fourth inning and almost collected another four-bagger in the sixth, however Red Bluff rightfielder Brenda Foey made a diving catch of the Basinettes' slugger's drive down the right field line.

Smith struck out three and walked two while Dolan whiffed nine and gave up no free passes. Tuesday night at Conner Field the Basinettes will take on a team composed of former Basinettes players in a 7-inning Basinettes tilt. No admission will be charged. The linescore:

CHICAGO (AP) — Harry (Suit-

case) Simpson's pinch single in the 17th inning sent home the winning run and gave the Chicago White Sox a 3-2 triumph over Baltimore Saturday.

The victory, the 23rd one-run decision captured by Chicago, enabled the White Sox to maintain their one-half game American League lead over Cleveland.

Back-to-back singles by Jim Landis and Sherm Lollar started the 17th inning uprising. Al Smith was given an intentional pass and reliever Billy Loes, third Baltimore pitcher, got Jim Rivera to bounce into a force play at the plate. Simpson, batting for Bubba Phillips, then lined a single to right center to end the marathon.

The 17th inning affair matched the longest game in the majors this year. That was also between Chicago and Baltimore with the Sox winning on a homer by Earl Torgeson.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Southpaw Art Ceccarelli beat the San Francisco Giants Saturday 5-3 and won his fourth straight for the Chicago Cubs since being called up from Fort Worth three weeks ago.
