Eastern Oregon Park Facility Study Started By Commission

BAKER, Ore. (AP)—An inspection started Saturday of two areas that eastern Oregon residents want turned into huge outdoor ski and recreation areas. The tour by the Oregon Parks Advisory Board will climax a long series of hearings throughout eastern Oregon. The first tour planned for Saturday was an inspection of the Anthony Lakes area, some 30 miles northwest of here in the Blue Mountains. At a hearing Friday in Pendleton, Baker and Union County delegations urged the state to help in the development of the lakes area, at the 7,000-foot elevation in the Whijman National Forest. The delegations said that with the proper facilities, Anthony Lakes could be turned into a ski and recreation area that would rival Sun Valley, Idaho. One vital state function, the commission was told, would be the construction and maintenance of a 14-mile road into the lakes. Only an old Forest Service road, no longer maintained, now runs the 14 miles from the lakes to the nearest state highway. William Tugman of Reedsport, chairman of the committee, said

"We have only one park in a national forest, in the Santiam Forest, and the Forest Service has told us that is the last park

Legion Mothballs '59 Suits

Klamath Falls American Legion baseball suits went back into mothballs Saturday after the KF nine racked up a pair of exhibition wins over the Babe Ruth League All-Stars in Gem Stadium Thursday night. The two victories gave coach Hi Hatfield's Legionnaires a 15-win, 9-loss season record and a second place in their district league standings. With a team batting average over the long season of .273, the final statistics also show that five of the KF sluggers rated percentages on the high side of .300. Pitcher Blake Griggs, who, in company with Rich Depew, Dave Saks and Don Willey, will slip into a suit of Klamath Kub flannels for the rest of the season, leads the entire squad, both in the hitting and pitching department. Griggs won seven and lost three while rapping the ball at a .453 clip. Another chucker, Gary Beber, 3-1, although he played in only eight games, is crowding Griggs with .444. The number three spot belongs to regular Don Willey, the utility man who has powdered the ball for a .377. Catcher Dave Saks is next with .348 while Depew, centerfield, is close despite a hand injury that sidelined him midway in the year. Depew collected a triple and three singles in four at bats Thursday to boost his count to .342. Said Hatfield of his season, "I think we did pretty well. A couple of our losses came under some adverse conditions. It's a good ball team." The league season statistics follow:

we are going to get in the forests because they want to develop those things themselves. "What we can do for them I don't know... maybe lend our weight to further appeals to the Forest Service. "We certainly can't spend a great deal of money to develop roads and the area when we can't have control of it," Tugman said. The committee also was scheduled Saturday to start an inspection tour of part of Owyhee Lake, the 75-mile-long body of water behind Owyhee Dam southwest of Nyssa. Malheur County residents have asked the state to build a four-mile-long road from the base of the dam into a state park on the shore of the lake. There is no such suitable access at present. The tour will end Sunday afternoon. Due to lack of communications in the isolated area, no report on the committee's findings will be available until sometime Sunday, Tugman said. The committee acts as an advisory body to the state Highway Commission, which has the final authority in park and road matters. Tugman said the committee will submit its findings in time for a decision at the Highway Commission's next meeting, probably sometime late in August.

Registration will be held from 9 to 11:30 a.m. Competition will be held in some 25 classes. The bond posted on the strip record has been raised to \$125, a further enticement to all drivers of sleek acceleration machines capable of registering speeds in excess of the established miles per hour on the one-fourth mile track. Sports cars will be featured in six different classes for added interest and competition. This year marks the first season the sports car has been emphasized on the local strip. Drivers are warned that all vehicles except stock cars and sports cars under 2,700 cubic centimeters engine displacement will be required to have a 360 degree safety shield surrounding their bell housings. This shield must be constructed of one-fourth inch steel and securely anchored to the frame of the vehicle. Portland advanced one notch into third place in Pacific Coast League standings Friday night by rolling over Phoenix 11-2. The winners were helped by Jim Greengrass' 15th and 16th home runs for the season. Pastrano Seeking Rematch

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Willie Pastrano, his right hand dunked in a bucket of ice water, wants another crack at Alonzo Johnson. Johnson, a former Braddock, Pa., barber, unleashed a punishing body attack Friday night to earn a unanimous 16-round heavy-weight decision over the nimble Pastrano. Pastrano said he jammed his right thumb in the first round but it did not hamper him from using his right hand. He said he "felt a little rusty" after a layoff since February. Johnson and Manager Mike Bazzone said they followed a pre-fight plan calculated to slow down the fleet Willie. "We figured we had to go for the body," Bazzone said. "It worked." A punishing body attack in the seventh staggered Pastrano, but he did not go down. His wife, Edna, hospitalized with the same type of virus which claimed her husband, was not expected to attend the 11 a.m. (EST) services. The Chapel Hill Methodist Church was the scene of the services for the 240-pound Tatum, one of the nation's most successful coaches. Tatum, who had hoped this season might be "my best ever," died from a virus attack that overwhelmed his vital organs. He entered the hospital last Saturday. Doctors said the virus apparently was a common type that "affects many people in a mild form." But in Tatum's case, it resulted in a breakdown of the vital organs. North Carolina Athletic Director Chuck Erickson said, "We're all so shocked at this time to consider such matters" as naming a successor to Tatum.
