WEED—Lee Templeton, big left-handed 25-year-old first baseman, the oldest man on the Yreka semi - pro baseball team, was awarded the trophy as the Most Outstanding Player on the field at the close of the 12th annual Northern California League All - Star game played here Sunday.

Templeton rapped a pair of singles in four trips to the plate and had a perfect day in the field to earn the honor.

In close contention for the award were Klamath Falls' Dene Dunson, Dunsmuir's Jess Fidler and Yreka's Daryl Severns.

In addition to the presentation of the trophy to Templeton, league president Harry Hammond, Yreka, awarded cups to players on both All-Star squads and presented a special award to Scott Valley's Dale Evans, the winner of the base-running contest held prior to the start of the game.

Evans' time, 15.3 seconds, was eclipsed by the effort of Weed's Rooney Hilliard, but the speedy shortstop was disqualified in the event for failing to touch first base on his trip.

WEED—A near capacity crowd rode with its favorite, the North, as it eked out a narrow 3-1 victory over the South in the 12th annual Northern California League All-Star baseball game played here Sunday afternoon.

The North, made up of players from Weed, Yreka and Scott Valley, and managed by Denny O'Brien of Yreka, capitalized on six timely hits and four untimely South errors to ultimately break up a 1-1 tie in the eighth and go on to win one of the closest ballgames in the history of the yearly feature.

The game, 9-0 for our complete frames, saw the South narrowly miss a three run lead in the last of the third when KF's Floyd Linderman poled a mighty smash over the left field wall that was called foul by inches by the plate official. There were two men, Jess Fidler, Dunsmuir, and Danny Moore, Mount Shasta, both of whom had singled on the sacks at the time. Linderman eventually struck out and McKenzie flied out to right to end the threat.

Fidler's three singles in five trips were the most hits collected by an individual during the game while Lee Templeton, Yreka, who was voted the Most Outstanding

The victory gave the North a 7-5 margin over the South in All-Star games won over the years.

The win was credited to Mike Brannham, Yreka, the third of the North pitchers to see action, although he experienced a siege of wildness that allowed the South three bases-on-balls, in the two final stanzas. He gave up the only South tally in the eighth when Klamath Falls' Mike McKenzie, third base, rapped a clean single to drive home shortstop Danny Moore, Mount Shasta.

The defeat was charged to KF's Ed Vegley, the third South chuck-

Player at the end of the contest notched two for four.

Some sparkling glove work was turned in by Yreka's Daryl Sevens and Gary Gresham who alternated on third for the North. Each team racked up a double play.

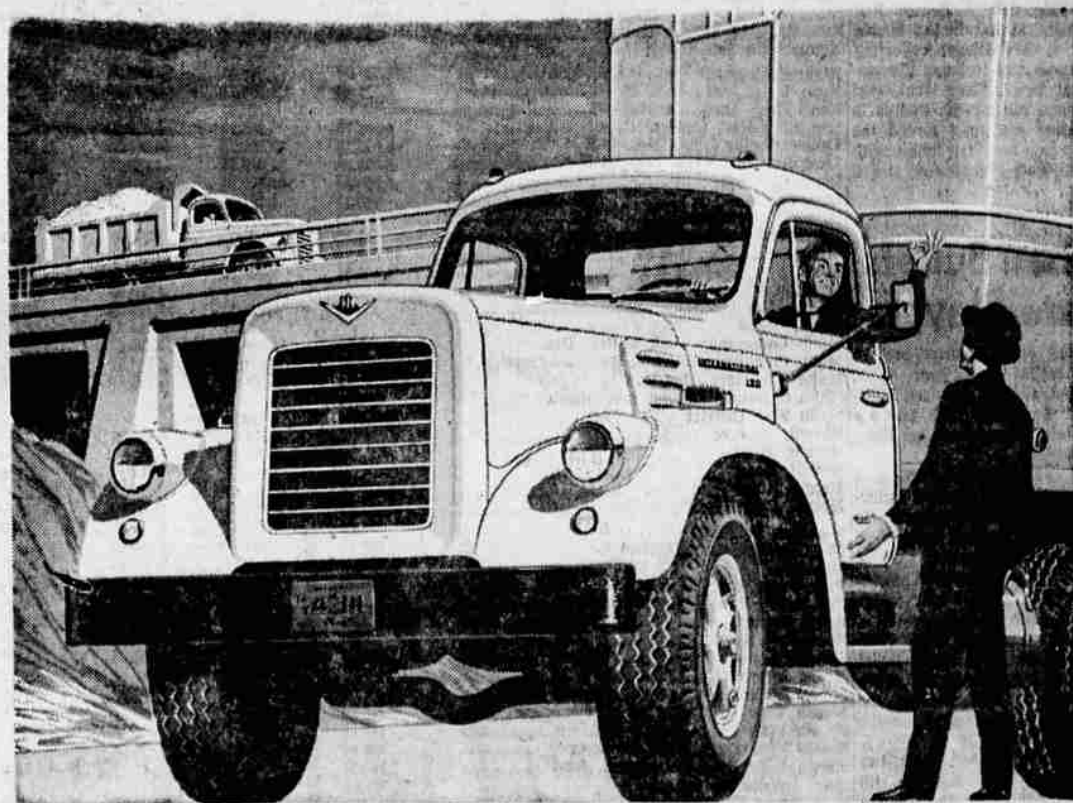
