The pitchers had nothing but misery in Monday night's South suburban Little League action. Fourth place DARCO evened their record at 7-7 by scoring a last-inning run for a thrilling 10-9 victory over second place Kingsley field while last-place Oregon Food scored their third triumph of the season with a 17-13 decision over Teamsters 911.

The Oregon Food nine tallied one run in the first inning and six more in the third while racking up 13 base hits. Robert Bartlett's three-run third inning home run paced the winners at the plate. Bartlett, who relieved winning pitcher Jack Smith at the start of the fourth inning, also smacked a two-bagger as did teammates Tom Hall and Smith.

For Teamsters, the loss was pinned on starter Wayne Gallup, while Dave Rusth pitched the fourth stanza in relief. David Wright, Robert Middleton, Jim Smith and Lyle Haney all collected a pair of singles each for the losers.

Rodney Clinton and Doug Coddington blasted a pair of two-run homers for DARCO in the fourth inning. Coddington in addition to his four-master, poled a two-bagger and two singles while teammate Doran McBride collected a double and a pair of singles to lead the winner's 18-hit attack.

From there the winner moves on to Sacramento for the Western Regional championships which will be held August 21 and 22.

The final hurdle comes in Williamsport, Pennsylvania, August 25 through August 29, when the regional champs will vie for the World title which has been won the last two years in a row by Monterrey, Mexico.

The 1959 World Series, will, for the first time see eight teams in action. The series will draw four teams from within the United States and four teams from foreign countries.

A new field, now under construction in South Williamsport, across the Susquehanna River from the present site, will be the probable playing field. The national office will move as soon as the field and adjacent buildings are completed.

Little League play, inaugurated in 1939, has had the World Series competition as its highlight since 1947.

Promoter Promises Date Set

GOTEBORG, Sweden (AP)—Promoter Bill Rosensohn is sure Ingemar Johansson will defend his heavyweight title against Floyd Patterson as per agreement in the United States in September.

Edwin Ahlquist, the champion's adviser, says there will be no negotiations until all questions about Ingemar's purse for the first fight, June 26, are fully settled.

Johansson said he surely is going to the United States. He added henceforth he would only sign contracts "where I can see the signature of my challenger on the opposite side."

Ahlquist and Rosensohn held conferences all day Monday. Then Ahlquist called a press conference to explain that the promoter was going back to New York today to get a complete financial statement on the first fight.

Rosensohn had nothing to say at the conference. Monday night in a telephone interview he said emphatically he had an ironclad contract for the return fight. He said he was confident things would be straightened out.

"It is only natural that he wants to see that he gets what he has coming to him," said Rosensohn.

Much of the champ's purse was tied up in escrow to assure he would go through with the rematch and in legal proceedings by heavyweight Eddie Machen who claimed damages for a run-out on an alleged rematch.

When a reporter asked Rosensohn to confirm or deny rumors that he might become Ingemar's manager, the promoter laughed it off. "I am a promoter, not a manager," he said.

Rosensohn repeated that he would handle all the television and radio arrangements for the rematch.

Jim Grow KO's Foe In Seventh

LEWISTON, Idaho (AP)—A left followed by a right brought Jimmy Grow of Lewiston a knockout victory over Al Carroll of Sacramento, Calif., at 1:46 of the seventh round in a scheduled 10-round lightweight bout Monday night.

Grow, at 134, used the left-right combination effectively in the early rounds and held a slight edge over Carroll, 133½, when he ended it all. It was Grow's 35th knockout in 54 victories. He has lost nine and had two draws.

A crowd of about 1,600 watched the first professional fight card here in four years.

Cheryl Ann Baxter Leading KF Archers

BEND, Ore. (AP)—Archers scored high at the four-day 14th annual National Field Archery Assn. tournament at nearby Fall River Lodge Monday, despite strong winds.

Two defending champions were back of the leaders, and Northwest entrants fared poorly. There were 743 entrants.

Cheryl Ann Baxter, Klamath Falls, headed the list of contenders in the girls intermediate freestyle division with a 240. The only other KF bowman among the leaders was Ed Sample who is fourth in the men's heavy tackle division with a 297.

Rube Powell, four-time free style champion from Chula Vista, Calif., was fourth with 482 well back of James Casper, Racine, Wis., who led with a 506.

Lon Stanton, the defending men's instinctive champion from Lake Ozark, Miss., was in second place after the opening round. Carl Heinrich, Richmond, Mich., led with a 453.

Oregon's Bill DeSalle, Portland, was seventh in the freestyle with a 471. Bill Neve, Renton, Wash., had a 416.

In the instinctive division, Oregon champion Vern Bennette of Salem was far down the list with a 382. Ex-Oregon champion Darold Steinks of Vale had a 384.

The instinctive class permits no sighting devices, while the free style archers are allowed to use sighting devices. Neither, however, is allowed to use range finders.

All shooting was in the first round, which consists of shooting at targets with alternate rings of white and black. The other two rounds are a hunter's round and an animal round.
