

MALIN ANNIVERSARY

The two-day schedule for the celebration of Malin's 50th anniversary was announced today by Vic Kalina, general chairman for the event.

Saturday, August 1 —
2 p.m. — A reunion in the Community Hall for the classes of 1909 and 1910 of the Shasta View School.
9:30 p.m. — Dance in the Broadway Hall with music by Fred Divisek and his Polka Band of San Francisco. Entertainment will be a Bohemian Folk Dance Bazaar by the Czech dancers in full costume. Tickets are \$1 per person. Bohemian pastry and coffee will be served during the evening.

Sunday, August 2 —
11 a.m. — Family community picnic at Malin Park. Barbecue, rolls, punch, coffee, ice cream and Bohemian pastry will be furnished free. Bring salad, beans or personal choices of food and table service. There will be Bohemian music, entertainment and speeches by Malin oldtimers.

College Gift Total Soars

CORVALLIS — Value of gifts, grants and scholarships presented to Oregon State College topped the two million dollar mark for the second straight year, President A. L. Strand reported recently.

Of the \$2,139,819 received this past year, \$2,009,437 was for research and training grants, \$113,969 for scholarships and fellowships and \$16,413 for miscellaneous gifts from chemicals to books.

This past year's total is \$117,381 higher than the previous year total of \$2,022,438, Dr. Strand said. Single gifts and grants varied from \$1 to \$273,000.

Funds were received for a variety of research subjects including electron transport in heart muscle, irradiated meat products, frost hardiness of woody plants, barley improvement, beef cattle genetics, hatchability in turkey eggs and toxicity of kraft pulp mill wastes to fish.

Largest contributor was the National Science Foundation with a total of \$775,390. Of this amount, \$203,900 was for major research projects, \$18,870 for summer undergraduate research, \$14,250 for summer science training for high school students and the remaining \$538,370 for high school and college teacher-training programs. Gifts and grants from industry amounted to \$49,375 and from private sources \$61,151. OSC's Science Research Institute took in \$144,415.

The agricultural experiment station received \$289,119; the forest experiment station, \$40,217 and the engineering experiment station, \$72,938.

Some of the other government agencies contributing are public health service, \$257,689; quartermaster corps, \$66,217; Army ordnance corps, \$40,970; office of the surgeon general, \$75,700; Army signal corps, \$32,934; atomic energy commission, \$85,579 and office of Naval research, \$79,323.

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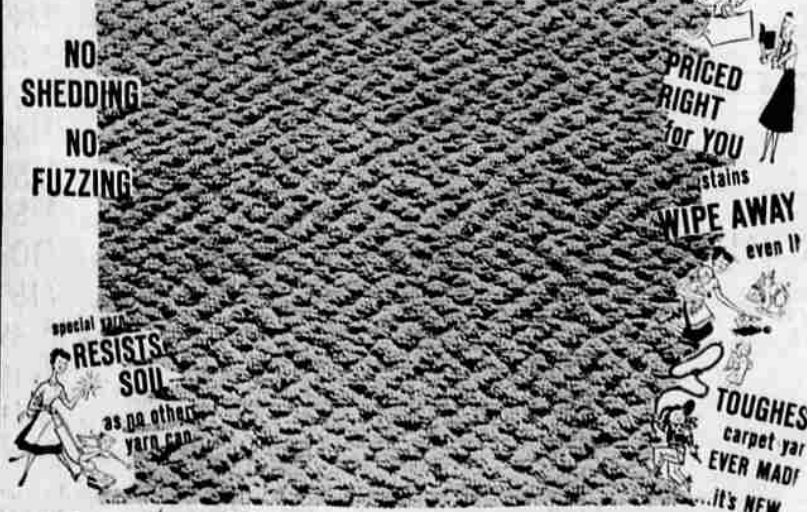
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
