The elementary board accepted a resignation from Shirley Routh, a physical education teacher at Fairview School last year. The high school board hired her to teach P.E. there.

Other teachers who resigned were Anita Allen from the elementary system and Eugene Strehlow and Arthur LeCours, high school science teachers. LeCours will instruct at Oregon Technical Institute. Strehlow will teach at St. Helens.

Harold Dody, Reina Hurlbut and Lloyd Manown were hired in the elementary district, and Ralph Foster, a teacher at Fremont School was given the dean of boys position and an attendant raise in salary. Named to the high school staff besides Shirley Routh were Alvin Keck, a football and basketball coach and William C. Mansfield, a coach.

The high school board appointed Floyd Wynne, Herald and News city editor, and Forrest Kelly, an insurance salesman for the T. B. Waters Insurance and Real Estate Agency, to the budget committee. They and three other citizens will be responsible with the school board for compiling school budgets each fiscal year. They re-

Chief Issues Fire Warning

Roy Rowe, chief of the Klamath Falls Fire Department, warned residents today to make sure electrical circuits for heating up roof-top drainpipes during winter are off.

He blames a coil of heating wires on a similar drain for setting a fire that damaged a Dugan and Mest Chevrolet warehouse and the Mouldingcraft mill at 320 Market Street Tuesday morning.

The apparatus probably either had been left on since winter or had been recently turned on and forgotten, the chief said. The wires short circuited, heating the drainpipe to incendiary temperatures, Rowe believes.

No Charge, No Jail

District Judge Pro Tem P. K. Puckett released from jail Monday a prisoner against whom there was no formal charge.

The prisoner was Joe Lathridge, 40, 547 Commercial Street.

Lathridge was arrested Saturday night by Deputy Sheriff Robert Hartley. Hartley said Lathridge was accused of stealing four pairs of slacks from F. W. Bold and Sons store at Bonanza that evening.

No complaint was filed against the man, however, and Puckett released him from jail where he had been held since Saturday.

Hartley maintained that the district attorney's office refused to accept a complaint against Lathridge. But the district attorney's office said no person had asked for a complaint and that the office did not know Lathridge was in jail until he appeared in court.

After listening to this argument for a while Tuesday night, one resident snapped: "Who ever saw a cop walking around without his shoes?"




