

Klamath Entrants Winners

CAMP WHITE — Lead-footed Lou Wolff, driving the sleek Wolff & Wiley flathead Ford powered B dragster eliminated all comers for the second consecutive time at the drag races held here last Sunday.

Wolff, driving the quick-starting acceleration machine, defeated favored Noel Black from Medford in the top eliminator runoffs when Black's dragster broke an axle leaving the starting line. The only other competition vehicle left in the running was the Wheelers Zombie and Wolff edged this beautiful coupe for the top eliminator trophy.

Black registered the top time of the day with a mark of 121.19 on the quarter mile strip. Black was driving the Roberts and Black 400 cubic inch Olds powered A dragster. This was the first time out for this engine and the team felt confident they would be turning faster times in the future.

OUT OF DOORS with Field & Stream

The fine fishing which prevailed earlier in the month has begun to tail off in the Klamath County area but there are still a few hot spots to the north, especially Williamson River and Agency Lake.

The Williamson has been very good on super doopers and wobble lures while Agency is "hotter than a firecracker," according to Joe Green of Joe's Sporting Goods. Streamer flies and sonics are the best for Agency.

Most reservoirs to the east are drying up in the heat, accounting for the lack of good fishing in that area. Green also reports that there should be a definite change in the fishing in the county as the moon changes this week.

Odell Lake catches are good on mackinaw, although you will have your best results with a silver flat fish No. U-20 at a depth of 150 feet. Four Mile has been good still-fishing on eggs. The same goes for Collier Park, where night fishing is the best bet.

Single egg fishing is best at Wood River, where some nice catches of German Browns are picking up. Klamath River, strangely enough, is good on bass down by the slough near Highway 97.

Crystal Creek, up above Harri-man Lodge, is producing catfish as big as two pounds on worms

or nightcrawlers. You will have your best luck in the evening in order to snare some of these beauties.

One has to hike into Rosary Lake, but the trip is well worth it as fly fishing late in the evening is producing good catches.

Lake of the Woods has shown a definite tail-off since the first of the season, while Diamond Lake was only fair this past week. The best catches were made on trailing flashers or flat fish and worms. Flies are also good in the evening. Last week's shower settled the bloom on the lake, promoting the clearing of the lake.

Shasta Lake has plenty of water for fishermen, skiers and boaters, and the supply will be ample for the rest of the summer. This word came today from Eugene L. Christian of Sacramento, water-master for the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation which controls the lake.

"Even by Labor Day," Christian said, "the lake will still have around 2,600,000 acre feet of water. And it will still have around 20,000 acres of water surface. And that's a lot of water."

Other bureau officials estimated that by Labor Day the lake's shoreline would still exceed 300 miles.
