COFFEE BREAKS are for "pioneers" as well. After 97 days on the trail, the Oregon Centennial Wagon Train members and townspeople they visited had consumed 16,490 cups of Boyd's Coffee. The Boyd Coffee Company started them off with 300 pounds and 4,000 Boyd's cups to speed them on the way westward.

Coffee has been an important item with the Oregon Centennial Wagon Train members.

Taking a total of the number of cups of coffee which have been enjoyed by the train members and the many friends they have made on the long trip from Independence, Missouri, to Independence, Oregon, at 97 days it added up to 16,490 cups.

Placed side by side, these cups would stretch over 2 1/2 city blocks. Just as an army travels on its stomach, so have the Wagon Train members fueled up with coffee.

Boyd's is one of a number of firms who have made donations of their products and services. The Boyd Coffee Company sent along 300 pounds of coffee and 4,000 Boyd's cups to see these pioneers through to their destination, Independence, Oregon.

At every over-night stop, local residents have turned out to more closely inspect the camp sites. In larger towns through which the wagon train passed, celebrations and appropriate ceremonies have welcomed the 500's caravan. Every night finds many local people lingering around the campfire and "swapping" yarns with the "pioneers" who appear in period costume at these stops.

Seven wagons, 14 men, eight women, five children and drawn by 22 horses and mules comprise the basic caravan making the trip from Independence, Missouri, to Independence, Oregon, with August 15 the estimated arrival date.

Originating with an idea in Roseburg last year following a meeting of the local Jaycees, enthusiasm grew. Soon the "On to Oregon Cavalcade" was organized as a non-profit corporation to sponsor the



#### JELLIED FRESH FRUIT FOR SHORTCAKE

MADE WITH M. C. P. "LOW SUGAR" PECTIN  
Jellied Fresh Fruits Will Not Soak Into Shortcake

PREPARATION OF FRUIT: Wash thoroughly. Hull and crush berries. Grind tree fruits.

1. Measure 2 cups crushed or ground fruit and 1 cup M.C.P. "Low Sugar" Liquid Pectin into kettle. Mix well.

2. Add 2 cups sugar; blend mixture thoroughly to dissolve sugar.

3. Some tart fruits, such as Red Raspberries and Loganberries, may be tart enough to tell the fruit, but other fruits will need lemon juice. The amount of lemon juice to add ranges from 1/4 cup to 1/2 cup, depending upon the kind of fruit being used.

4. First, try adding 1/4 cup lemon juice, mix well. If texture and tartness suit you, do not add more lemon juice. If jellied fruit is not firm enough, then add 1/4 cup more lemon juice; but no fruit will need more than 1/2 cup lemon juice for this basic recipe.

5. The fruit will jell immediately when the proper amount of lemon juice is added and it is then ready for use on shortcake, or if you want to keep it for future use, it will keep for weeks stored in refrigerator same as milk.

"Jellied Fresh Fruits" can be frozen in regular freezing containers for long storage. When thawed out, jellied fruit will retain its perfect texture and fresh fruit flavor.

The above recipe will make 2 1/2 lbs. of "Jellied Fresh Fruit." This recipe may be doubled, tripled, etc., by multiplying all the ingredients by the same number.

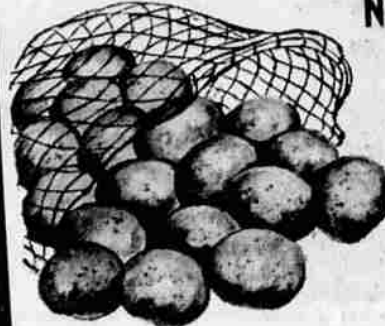
