

Giants Recapture NL Lead; Athletics Set 5-Year Mark

McCovey' 4-4 Debut Spectacle

San Francisco is back in the National League lead, but it took a while of a parlay to do it—five unearned runs, a 4-for-4 debut by rookie Willie McCovey and Pittsburgh's first victory in 10 games.

The Giants cut their own slump at four and moved into first place by a half-game as McCovey, a .377 hitter at Phoenix some 12 hours earlier, smacked a pair of triples, scored three runs and drove in two for a 7-2 decision Thursday over the Philadelphia Phillies, who chipped in four errors.

Pittsburgh cleared the way for the Giants by beating Los Angeles 5-4 in 12 innings, skidding the Dodgers to third. Milwaukee took over second place with a 6-2 decision over the Chicago Cubs, hammering four home runs as Warren Spahn gained his 26th victory.

Cardinals 1, Reds 0
St. Louis defeated Cincinnati 1-0 with Bob Gibson blanking the Reds on eight hits in his first major league start.

Giants 7, Phils 2
McCovey, 21, a lean 6-4 first baseman, also singled twice in his first major league game after Manager Bill Rigney shook up the Giants' line-up, switching Orlando Cepeda from first to third base and benching Jim Davenport.

With McCovey showing them how, the Giants collected 10 hits and rolled up their biggest run total in more than two weeks. Mike McCormick (10-8) beat the Phils for the fourth time this season.

Robin Roberts (9-10) lost it, with the Giants' first five runs unearned. They broke a 2-2 tie in a three-run fifth on an error, sacrifice, singles.

Bucs 5, Dodgers 4
A one-out single by Ray Mejias, following a single by Dick Groat and Bill Virdon's double, won it for the Pirates, who blew 3-0 and 4-3 leads. Benny Daniels (6-6) was the winner in relief, but needed a dandy assist by lefty Don Gross—who got Wally Moon on an in-field out and then fanned Duke Snider with the tying run on third.

Mejias also homered for the Bucs, against Dodger starter Johnny Podres. Stan Williams (4-4) was the loser.

Braves 6, Cubs 2
The Braves moved .003 percentage points ahead of the Dodgers and within .003 of the Giants by handing left-hander Art Ceccarelli his first defeat in five decisions.

Consecutive homers by Felix Mantilla and Hank Aaron clinched it in the third.

Spahn (14-10) beat the Cubs a third time this year. He allowed five hits, one Bobby Thomson's ninth home run.

'Willies' A Reality For Foe

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The Giants now figure they're ready to give the other National League clubs the Willies.

Willie Mays, Willie Kirkland, and now—Willie McCovey.

McCovey, a 21-year-old rookie came up from Phoenix and slammed two triples and two singles off Robin Roberts Thursday in a sensational major league debut with San Francisco. His performance sparked the Giants to a 7-2 victory over Philadelphia and snapped a four-game losing streak.

"I've never seen anyone break into the big leagues and hit the ball like that," chuckled Giant manager Bill Rigney.

The 190-pound McCovey, batting .377 with the class AAA Pacific Coast League club, left-handed a Roberts' low curve for a rifle shot single down the right field line in the first inning.

In the fourth, the Mobile, Ala., Negro crashed a Roberts' high fast ball to the centerfield scoreboard for a triple and scored the Giants' second run on an error at the plate.

On his fourth time up in the seventh, he ripped an outside fast ball for a triple to score Mays who had doubled.

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11 Game Run Sets A's In 3rd

Where do the Kansas City A's go from here? They've pulled off an incredible jump from the cellar to third place in an 11-game streak, longest in the American League in five years, but can they crack the exclusive, two-club "first division?"

The A's, making their run in just 11 days, moved past Baltimore into third by whipping Washington 4-1 Thursday night. But they still trail Chicago's first-place White Sox by 8½ games and second-place Cleveland by 7½ after making up 3½ games on the leaders.

The White Sox kept their tough pace with a 3-1 victory over New York, plunking the world champion Yankees 10½ games behind as Early Wynn (14-6) became the A's top winner. It was the Sox' 15th victory in 30 games since the All-Star break, when they were second, two games behind Cleveland.

The Indians stayed close by beating Boston 4-3 with Minnie Minoso driving in all their runs. Detroit tied New York for fifth by rapping Baltimore 11-2.

St. Louis beat Cincinnati 1-0 as Bob Gibson pitched an eight-hit shutout in his first major league start.

Southpaw Bud Daley, after missing his regular turn because of a leg injury, blanked the Nats on six hits for six innings, then needed Tom Sturdivant's neat relief for a 12-6 record. That ties the Kansas City record for most victories in one season set by Art Ditmar in 1955 and tied by Ned Garver last year.

Sturdivant came on in the seventh with one run in, the bases loaded and one out. The big right-hander struck out Roy Sievers and then ended the inning by retiring Jim Lemon, another of the Senators' sluggers, on a fly.

Sturdivant finished with a hitless 2-3-inning job.

KC 4, Solons 1

The A's, hanging a 12th straight loss on the last-place Senators, beat Hal Griggs (2-8) with two runs in the second, counting the clincher on Bill Tuttle's single. That gave them the longest streak in the AL since the Yankees won 13 straight in 1954.

Chicago 3, NY 1

Wynn put away his 263rd victory, tops among active major leaguers, with a six-hitter. He walked only one, struck out nine and lost a shutout on an unearned run in the fourth inning. Al Smith drove in the tying run for the White Sox and added another in the eighth after Sherm Lollar's double and a single by Billy Goodman beat rookie Eli Grba (1-2) in the seventh.

Injuns 4, BoSox 3

Cleveland ended its slump at two games when Minoso's third single cracked a 3-3 tie in the ninth against losing reliever Mike Fornieles (1-2). Minnie had given starter Mudcat Grant a 3-0 lead with two singles, but Frank Malone's 14th home run tied it in the sixth and left the victory for reliever Larry Locke (2-1).

Tigers 11, Orioles 2

Ted Lepcio and Coot Veal each drove in three runs for the Tigers and Al Kaline hit his 17th homer. Frank Lary (13-7) won it with a seven-hitter. Billy O'Dell (6-8) was the loser.

Cheryl Ann Baxter Named New Intermediate Queen

BEND, Ore. (AP)—Two early leaders were shaded in the final round Thursday but still came through to win key over-all titles in the men's competition at the National Field Archery Assn. Tournament.

Cheryl Ann Baxter, Klamath Falls, annexed the freestyle title in the animal round for an aggregate total of 1,751 to become the Intermediate Girl's champion.

Another Klamath Falls entry, Ed Sample amassed a 2,014 for a fifth place in the Men's tough heavy tackle division.

Carl Heinrich of Richmond, Mich., finished second to Lon Stanton of Lake Ozark, Mo., in the instinctive division of the animal round but had a winning aggregate score of 2,799.

The aggregate was the total of scores made in the tourney's three rounds—field, hunter and animal.

Robert Kadlec of Rochester, Minn., won the men's freestyle title, with a total score of 2,970. But he, too, could finish no higher than second in the freestyle animal round.

The other men's winner, however, took both the animal round and the over-all championships in his division—heavy tackle. He was Jim Palmer of Dansville, N. Y., who had a winning aggregate of 2,663.

There were no western winners in the men's division, but two entries from California came through with over-all triumphs in the women's competition.

Anna Van Dolsen of Vallejo, Calif., won the heavy tackle title, and Faye Sconyers of Modesto, Calif., the instinctive championship.

The other women's title, the freestyle, went to Cleo Robertson of Samaria, Mich.

Over-all titles were won by four Oregon entries. Michael Namitz of Beaverton triumphed in the intermediate boys' freestyle. And Walter K. Barr of Astoria won in the junior boys' freestyle.

Nyla Mullins of Portland also won a junior girls title, in the freestyle competition.
