Varipapa To Show Locally

Newly elected member of bowling's Hall of Fame, Andy Varipapa comes to Klamath Falls Saturday to give an exhibition of his pin-spilling ability and world-famous trick shots at Lucky Lanes, through the cooperation of the bowling alley and the Brunswick-Balke-Collender Company.

Bowling's little giant has set so many scoring records during his career that a resume of them would take columns, but he is proud of all of his second consecutive triumph in the annual All-Star Tournament held in Chicago in December, 1947.

There Andy met and defeated in man-to-man competition the cream of the nation's bowlers, winning 40½ games while losing 28½, and averaging the splendid score of 210.8 per game to win the national match game title.

The astounding Varipapa, conceded by all to be the greatest trick shot bowler, was not always the perfectionist that he is today. He reminds beginners that he shot a snappy 84 in his first game, and that several years ago he ran a total of 109 in the Peter-Son Classic.

In addition to holding bowling's most coveted crown for two years in a row, Andy, with his partner Lou Campi, also held the national match game doubles title in 1948, winning the crown in Houston from the best pairs of bowlers in the nation.

He is fifth among all participants in the All-Star averages, having rolled 794 games for a total pinfall of 162,811, an average of 205.41. In addition, he is near the top in the ten-year averages of the American Bowling Congress with a mark of 201.51, showing the remarkable consistency of his kneeling under the toughest conditions.

Player Banished For Life

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP)—Weeks of rumors that gamblers were trying to put the "fix" on Southern Assn. baseball games crystallized Thursday when Chattanooga's top slugger, Jesse Levan, was banished from the diamond for life.

It was the first lifetime suspension handed a minor leaguer in more than 10 years.

One other Chattanooga player, Waldo Gonzalez, drew a one-year suspension. Three more Chattanooga players and one Mobile player had their knuckles rapped for not reporting gambler propositions earlier.

Levan, a first baseman and 15-year veteran of the minors, protested. "I've never accepted a bribe or a fix—there has never been a bribe or a fix."

Levan said he would appeal the suspension, handed down in Columbus, Ohio, by George M. Trautman, president of the National Assn. of Professional Baseball Leagues (minor leagues).

Shortstop Gonzalez apparently was headed home to Havana, Cuba.

Trautman's statement on his findings said no proof was obtained that the game was "thrown."

Metro 11 Seeking 'Eveners'

PORTLAND — The Metropolitan all-stars will have a chance to "even the statistics" when they clash with a team of State all-stars in the 12th annual Shriners' Hospital football game here August 15.

The Metros have been catching up the past two years, after six years — 1951 through 1956 — without a victory. Best the Metros could do during that period was a seven to seven tie in 1955, and their worst performance was a 30-0 loss in 1954.

Thanks to a 28-7 win in 1957 and a surprisingly easy 32-7 win last year, the Metros have almost evened the score with their State rivals.

The record now stands at six wins for the Staters as against four for the Metros, plus the single tie. The Staters have scored 163 points, the Metros 144, giving the former an average of 14.75 per game and the latter, 13.1 points.

Evidence of the wide-open play that has characterized the game since its inception in 1948 is the 23 point per game combined scoring average.

Qualified observers predict that this year's contest will be the highest scoring affair to date. They base their forecast on the fact that both squads are loaded with backs who can gallop and quarterbacks who can throw.

These same observers believe that last year's crop of high school seniors was one of the best in recent years, and their opinions are substantiated by the college coaches of the area who have shown keen interest in a greater number of players than ever before in recent history.

\$1,800,000 Sought

Bevos Charge Big League Monopoly

PORTLAND (AP) — Baseball's major leagues are a monopoly, the Portland Beavers said Thursday in a U. S. District Court suit that asked, among other things, \$1,800,000 damages, a chunk of television money and the breakup of the majors' farm system.

The suit well might have been averted, said an official of Portland's minor league club, if the majors had been willing to sit down and talk things over seriously.

But now, as the Beavers are faced with dwindling attendance, the suit represents the club's ultimate hope for survival, another official said.

In addition to the damages sought, the suit asked the courts to revamp the structure of the majors and whittle their power. Through the suit ran the contention that the majors have violated federal anti-trust laws.

The damages were sought, the suit said, because the ways in which the majors acquired players and televised their games had brought loss of income.

Things could be straightened out, the suit said, if the courts would enjoin the majors from trying to monopolize baseball and order them to sell every minor league club they own.

In addition, the suit said no ma-

for league team should be allowed to own or control more than 40 players.

Unfair competition from televised major league games also should be enjoined, and the majors should be forbidden to exercise arbitrary authority in expanding the leagues, the suit said.

The defendants included Commissioner Ford Frick, both leagues, their presidents and all 18 major league teams, including the Kansas City Athletics, with whom Portland has a working agreement.

In New York, Frick commented: "It looks as if it is another one of those suits like the one filed by Frank Lawrence of Portsmouth, Va., which was tossed out of court."

Arch Kingsley, Portland's president, disagreed and said: "The

Portland case was one of breach of contract. Ours is under the anti-trust laws charging monopoly and unfair competition. It is altogether different."

Clyde Perkins, Portland's vice president, said the suit might have been avoided if the majors were really willing to help solve the plight of league baseball.

"Last spring we said we would start suit if there was no action. As a result, there was a meeting with Ford Frick, then a meeting of a committee supposed to represent the major and minors, four each.

Portland Catapults Into PCL 2nd Place

Portland's hungry Beavers catapulted into second place in the Pacific Coast League pennant chase last night as the already-torrid battle for the flag tightened even further.

Only six games separate first-place Vancouver from seventh-place Rainiers who appear to be out of it at 10½ games behind going into the home stretch.

The Beavers, making most of every break, stopped the second-place Sacramento Solons 3-1 while Phoenix's Giants tamed the Vancouver Mounties 4-2.

San Diego's Padres rapped Seattle for the third straight time, 4-3, and the Spokane Indians drubbed the Salt Lake City Bees 10-4.
