Eastern Oregon — Partly cloudy through Saturday. Scattered afternoon and evening thundershowers. Little change in temperature. Low tonight 54-56 degrees; high Saturday in 90s.

Western Oregon — A few isolated thundershowers in southern mountains this evening. Low cloudiness and fog along coast tonight and Saturday morning, clearing partially in afternoon. Fog over interior valleys tonight and Saturday except for patches of low cloudiness Saturday morning. Cooler Saturday with high from 75-85 degrees in north to 90 in the south. High along coast 62-70. Coastal winds mostly westerly to southwesterly and 8-18 miles an hour.

Fire Weather — Very high fire danger will continue through Saturday in all interior Oregon areas except the immediate coast. Eastern winds have resulted in very low humidities. Relative humidity will range from 15 to 25 per cent in the northwestern interior to near 10 per cent in Southern and Central Oregon.
