MALIN—Invitations have been sent to the 33 remaining original students who attended the old Malin school in 1909 and 1910 to be present Saturday, August 1, at a class reunion. The affair is being held in connection with the 50th anniversary of the founding of Malin to be celebrated Saturday and Sunday, August 1-2. The original school was a one room cabin on the Charley Anderson place. It was replaced by the building in picture.

Miss Amy Puckett, the first teacher of the school still living in Oregon, is expected to be present. Students of that early time still living here, recall the old iron stove that stood in the one room shack. Children walked long distances, some as far as four miles through the winter snow with gunny sacks wrapped about their feet in lieu of galoshes.

Juniper and sagebrush were used for fuel and students ate cold lunches brought from home. Mrs. Emmett Lahoda of Malin has chairmanned the reunion plans. Gifts will be presented to the visitor coming the greatest distance, the one married the longest time and to the parent of the largest family.

Arrest Rate Stays Steady

The number of juvenile arrests for traffic violations in June continued at the existing rate of about one a day. The county juvenile office said 34 juvenile citations were issued during the month, 16 by state police, 16 by city police and two from other sources. Greatest number of violations was seven, for speeding. Six drivers were arrested for improper brakes and four for having no drivers' licenses. Half the violators were between 17 and 17½ years old, the office said, and property damage from accidents amounted to \$496. For the first half of the year, 193 arrests were made. These included 44 arrests for speeding, 25 for running stop signs or stop lights, 21 for improper mufflers, 19 for having no drivers' licenses and 11 for having no vehicle licenses. Of the 193 arrests for the first six months, 66 were in the 17-17½ years age group, 41 in the 16½-17 group and 40 in the 17½-18 group. Property damage for the period amounted to \$2,526.

Guests have arrived from as far away as New York and Louisiana. A dance open to the public is planned for Saturday night in the Broadway Hall with music by Fred Divisek and his Polka Band from San Francisco. A group of costumed dancers, members of the original Czech families who colonized Malin will dance the national Beseda during the evening. Tickets will be \$1 per person. Bohemian pastries and coffee will be served during the evening. On Sunday a beef barbecue and picnic is planned in the park. Three and one-half beves donated by the W. C. Dalton Company, Johnson Stock Company, Loveness Company and Mr. and Mrs. Ben Henzel will go into the barbecue pits at 2 p.m. Saturday on the Jerry Smalley Ranch. Bill Carter of the California Oregon Power Company will barbecue. Rolls, coffee, ice cream, punch and Bohemian pastries will be served by the committee with the meal. Guests may take picnic baskets if desired and table service. Following the dinner hour, M. M. Stasny, one of the original settlers will give a brief talk, sets of Bohemian dancers in the brilliantly colored costumes of the old country will dance and there will be music by the Fred Divisek Band. The swimming and wading pools will be open.
