### Shrine Circus Stated Here

The circus is coming to town and according to advance reports no circus has finer offering of the wonders inherent to a circus than the 1959 Shrine-Polack Circus. Popular with both children and adults it will be presented Tuesday and Wednesday, August 11-12, at the Klamath County Fairgrounds, with afternoon and evening performances both days at 2:15 and 8:15. Reserved seats will go on sale Tuesday, August 4, at the Shrine Club office in the Klamath Auditorium, formerly the Klamath armory, at Main and Spring streets.

New animal acts are Prince El Kigordo's jungle-bred male and female African lions, the acrobatically inclined chimpanzees of the Konyots, and the circus world's first performing Afghan hounds as a feature of Burger's Ken-I-Kade. The Besalou elephants and their foot-balancing star Opal seem more popular than ever. So do George Hanneford's "royal family" of bareback riders with their stately horses and their irrefragable "clown prince," Tommy Hanneford.

New aerial features are the Flying Alexanders' triple-somersaulting endeavors, the High Wire Corona's gravity-defying adventures, Senior Cardona's soaring sweeps on his cloud swing and the Reynoso Trio's feats of teeth suspension. The trapeze artistry of glamorous Princess Tajana is given a festive Indian setting by the Barlette-directed "Spangleland Pow-wow," whose participants also disport themselves as the Aerialoventies.

New acrobatic events are twirling teeterboard trajectories by the Five Amahds, incredible contortion and balance by the Tong Brothers and the trampoline meritment of the Ricardos. Precedent is challenged by the perch-top double revolve of the Georgian Trio. The clowns run riot with their revelry. Ringmaster Ross Paul keeps the show moving at a smart pace. Henry Kyes, the "Paul Whiteman of Spangleland," directs the music.
