Summer greetings sent to their friends in Klamath County from Africa by Rev. and Mrs. Ainsley, told of the arrival of a first son, William Charles, on March 21. The little boy joined two sisters, Rebecca and Carolyn who are spending vacation days with their parents and new brother before returning to school.

William Charles was born at Elat before the family moved to their new mission at Bolondo. Their palm-shaded home is 200 feet above the beach of the Atlantic Ocean.

They live just three degrees above the equator and are the only white couple in their mission in Spanish Guinea. They serve the northern half, conducting Sunday schools in several dialects which Bill and Nancy Ainsley have mastered since their arrival on the continent about two years ago. Other services, too, are conducted by the Rev. and Mrs. Ainsley, including personal calls to homes of those who live in the perimeter of their mission field.

They passed examinations in the Bulu language before going to their new location and are now studying a coastal language, Benga.

Letters will reach them at Apartado 195, Bata, Spanish Guinea, West Africa.

The Rev. Ainsley was pastor of the Mt. Laki Community Church before entering the missionary field.

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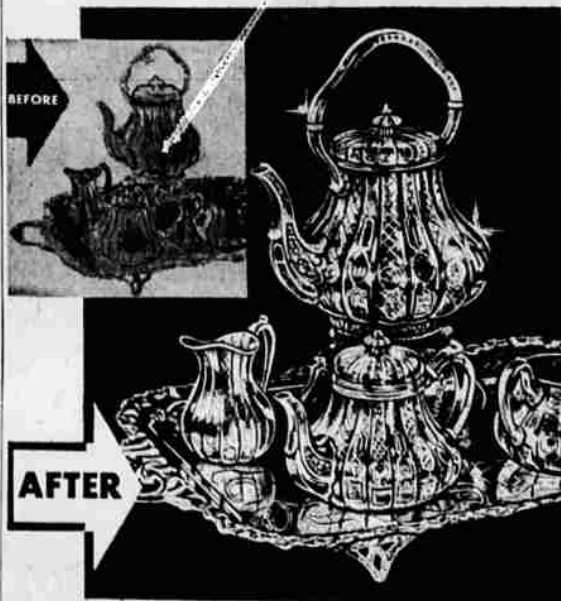
