Houston, local representative of Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States, who won the distinction of being one of the top 100 Equitable salesmen in the nation and is in New York at the 100th anniversary celebration of his company.

**Rickys Jewelers**, 700 Main St., Klamath Falls, received an honorable mention prize (of an imported Italian fine Cameo pin) from Reed & Barton of Taunton, Mass., America's oldest major silversmith. . . the contest was based on the most artistic window display of their newest sterling pattern, Cameo.

**Consolidated Freightways** has received ICC approval of its acquisition of three motor carriers and certain operating rights of a fourth. . . CF paid \$360,000 in cash and issued 135,600 shares of stock for the purchases which will extend the diversified carrier's service into Colorado, Nebraska, Wyoming and Manitoba, Canada. . . ICC approval of the purchase of another carrier, Arizona Express, Inc., of Tucson, was held up until Aug. 27 pending disposition of a petition for reconsideration filed by Association of Western Railroads. . . the acquisitions are Gallagher Freight Lines, Inc., Denver. . . Martin Transfer Co., Longview. . . Kenneth Poorman Co., Inc., Portland. . . and the international operating authority from Fargo, N.D., to Winnipeg of Buckingham Transportation Co., Rapid City, S.D. . . the purchased firms have 465 employees and 364 units of equipment. . . they earned \$5,123,000 in gross revenue last year.

A Portland man, Harold E. Klump, has been named as Northwestern district sales manager for

the Curtiss-Wright Corp., South Bend Division, construction machinery. . . his territory will include Oregon, Washington, Alaska, Wyoming, Idaho and Montana. . . the South Bend Division manufactures Curtiss-Wright's complete line of self-propelled and tractor-drawn scrapers.

**William B. Boone**, resident manager and general partner of Dean Witter & Co., investment bankers, and Portland First Citizen for 1958, has been elected as president of the Highway Lifesavers Committee of Oregon Citizens, Inc. . . he succeeds Frank A. Dresslar, who is retiring from Pacific Telephone Co. and moving to Las Vegas where he will become president and chairman of the board of Southern Nevada Telephone Co. . . traffic deaths to July 23 this year totaled 235 compared with 213 for the same period last year. . . through May there was a total of 22,124 traffic accidents, compared with 21,391 in the like period of 1958. . . as of July 23, there had been 32 traffic deaths in Oregon in July, compared with 31 last year.

## Argument Still Rages On How Long To Drive Your Car Between Oil Changes

**DETROIT (AP)**—You can get a lot of expert advice on how often to change the oil in your car. In fact, the more experts you talk to, the more advice you'll get. And it probably will add up to this: Within reason, use your own judgment.

There is the school that says flatly the oil in the engine of an automobile should be changed every 1,000 miles. The owner's handbook for most 1959 model Chrysler Corp. cars says every 5,000 miles, or three months under normal conditions.

Most service stations stick with the 1,000-mile recommendation unless they sell one of the brands

and acidity, prevent corrosion, oxidation or sludge.

Almost every motor oil on the market has from four to eight of these additives and they break down with use.

The way a car is used has much to do with how long the oil lasts. Cold weather, dusty roads, start and stop driving all shorten the life of the oil, because it is under these conditions that the oil becomes contaminated with water, dirt and various oxides that harm an engine.

There was a time when a driver could look at the dipstick which shows his oil level and tell whether his oil looked clean. Today he can get fooled because some of the additives in good oil cause it

to look gray. When these desirable additives quit working, the oil clears up.

Both the auto industry and the oil industry are tending to accept the use of time, rather than miles, in suggesting oil changes.

The American Petroleum Institute wants to make it 30 days in winter, 60 days in summer but in no case more than 2,000 miles. Auto manufacturers still favor longer periods.

## Steel Strike Now Hitting The Taxpayer

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The 17-day-old steel strike is beginning to pinch the taxpayer.

It has taken several forms: relief money, unemployment compensation and surplus food.

The cost to the federal government alone is expected to reach 45 million dollars a week if the strike continues much longer.

In many states there has been a gradual increase in the number of persons applying for relief money and unemployment compensation as the strike has idled about 85,000 workers in allied industries.

Also on the upswing are applications for free government foods, such as flour, corn meal, powdered milk and rice.

Some idled employees have taken part-time jobs, which tends to hold down the amount of unemployment compensation doled out by the states.
