Rose City Nine Trips KF Little Leaguers With Last Inning Two Out Home Run

PORTLAND (Special)—There is a saying about a game never being over until the last out. This age-old prediction made believers out of a large contingent of Klamath Falls rooters who made the trip to witness the finals of the District Three Little League Tournament held here Saturday afternoon in newly constructed Fairview Farms Stadium.

Little Tom McDermott hammered a towering home run over the left center field fence with teammate Carl McDade on base and two out in the bottom of the last inning to give Rose City a 5-4 victory over the KF Little League All-Stars.

In winning Rose City gained its third district title in three years and earned a berth in the State finals set for Portland next weekend.

Friday afternoon the KF Stars pounded a 10-7 victory over the Montavilla nine to move into Saturday's championship match. Rose City clinched its spot in the finals by virtue of a 7-6 win at the expense of South Wellington Park.

Saturday's game winning blow came off Klamath's Larry Barnes, who entered the game in the sixth inning with no one out, in relief of starter Jim Patzke. Patzke had walked McDade, the first batter, and had a 1-2 count on Kent Pashek when Barnes took over.

The determined little right-hander fanned Pashek on one pitch and did the same to Braden Gil-

lespie with three blazing fast balls. He blew the first two pitches past McDermott and then threw his first ball in seven pitches. McDermott blasted the next loss

a 3-0 cushion in the first inning when he smashed a line shot over the left field boards with Mike Spiker, who had walked, and Bob Moss, who had singled, ahead of

down at the plate by centerfielder Chris Beach's perfect peg. The flurry ended when Moss was tagged out by Gillespie when he tried to score on a fast ball.

Friday afternoon a brilliant relief pitching job by Steve Young and a clutch two-run single by Tom Schiff boosted the KFers into the finals.

Young, the last of three KF hurlers, took over for Jon Crume in the fifth when the tiring Crume issued a pair of walks after retiring one batter. The fire-balling right-handed twirler, who had an 8-0 record for Weyerhaeuser-Don's in league play, held Montavilla hitless the rest of the game.

KF starter Tim Bailey was raked for four singles, while his teammates committed three boobies in the first inning. Crume, who is nursing a smashed finger, entered the game at that point and was replaced in the fifth by Young.

The losers picked up their four final markers in the third off two free passes, a single by Rick Fredricks and two KF bobbles.

Mike Spiker, the diminutive second baseman who was filling in for Crume, scored the first KF run when he walked, moved to second on a groundout and scored on Dave Johnson's solid single to center in the first.

Larry Barnes and John Parisot to put together back-to-back doubles in the second, for the second run and then came the fatal fourth and fifth frames.

It seems that archery, a centuries-old sport, is just now coming into its own as a popular participation-type activity. Its rise to prominence as a family sport is reflected by the vast number of bowmen, women and children who converged on Fall River, Oregon, last week for the National Archers Association Tournament.

Relegated, unfortunately, to a spot of relative unimportance on national sport pages because of the pre-eminence of major, minor, Little League baseball et cetera, archery has been forced to survive on its own merits, with little or no publicity.

But survive, it did. Eight hundred archers from all corners of the United States, a handful from Canada, three from Alaska and two from Istanbul, Turkey, met 25 miles from Bend and formed a virtual "Camp City" for the four days of the national championships.

This corner, of course, is just as guilty of ignoring the bow-and-arrow shooters as any one else. But the time has come when this situation must change, at least locally . . . especially in view of the fact that Klamath Falls may now boast a National Champion in the art.

Miss Cheryl Ann Baxter, 14, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Baxter, has been exposed to the sport since she was a little girl. Last March, however, she decided seriously that she liked the sport. Yesterday she was named Intermediate Girl's Champion.

She and her parents, Dad is the Klamath Archers president, were three of the Klamath Falls contingent, the largest winning representation from any one club in the country, that vied in the nationals. Sixteen of the 50 members of the KF club entered the tournament and of these 16, 14 placed one, two or three in their respective divisions during the meet. No mean accomplishment.

Entrants in the tournament were classified according to their scores in tournaments prior to the nationals. And the Klamath Falls group gained one more distinction . . . Walt Bower, a hearty 75 years old, was the eldest of all those entered.

In addition to the Baxter family, Ed, Maggie and Carolyn Sample, Merle and Esther Hodge, Sid and Gerald Munjar, Bob Young, Bob Dearing, and Bower made the trip and each brought home a plaque or medal emblematic of their skill. Sample placed fifth among the Men's heavy tackle division. This, too, is not something done every day . . . by just anyone.

Next year the archers will hold their annual championship competition in either Florida or New Jersey. According to the Baxter family, the expense concerned with participation in archery is one that can be easily controlled by the bowman himself. You can pay a lot for equipment . . . or you can build your own. It's not what's used, but the way that you use it.

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—Portland sent 13 men to bat in a nine-run first inning Saturday night as the Beavers beat the Salt Lake Bees 15-5 in a Pacific Coast League baseball game. The victory sent the Beavers into first place.

Second '59 All-Star Game Presents Curious Aspects

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Since the setting is Los Angeles, it figured there would be some odd angles to the second 1959 all-star baseball game, which comes off Monday at Memorial Coliseum.

But even for Los Angeles — where a man with two heads might not be considered eccentric unless he wore only one hat—this game presents some curious aspects.

It's unusual, of course, for a second all-star game to be played at all. Ordinarily, this is a once-a-year production. But that's hardly the most peculiar feature of this game.

For one thing, it's being played at 4 o'clock in the afternoon (7 p.m. Eastern Daylight Time). Up to now, the British are the only people who have ever scheduled anything for 4 p.m. and the best excuse they can find is hoisting tea cups.

For another thing, the game has not overwhelmed the local population—although it's the first all-star game in West Coast history and many American League stars will be making their first appearance here.

But, whatever the odd angles—and there's a sound reason for nearly every one of them—the game will count as part of the all-star series that began 26 years ago. And it should make a pile of money for the players' pension fund.

The American Leaguers, who lost the first 1959 all-star game 5-4 at Pittsburgh, still lead in the series, 15 games to 11. But their manager, Casey Stengel of the Yankees, has had terrible luck running all-star teams. Casey has won only three games, lost twice that many. Fred Haney of Milwaukee, the National League skipper, is 1-1.

In the July 7 game at Pittsburgh, Stengel and Haney had to go with the starting lineups selected by a vote of players in the two leagues. This time, however, they have the option of starting anybody on their rosters, and they have been allowed to add three players to their squads, making a total of 28.
