

Bob Rosburg Grabs PGA Championship

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (AP)—Bob Rosburg, a stubborn man with a hacker's style, has shed his five-year role as an oddity of big time golf for the regal garb of Professional Golfers Assn. champion.

With a startling four-under-par 66 in the wind and gloom at Minneapolis Golf Club Sunday, the 32-year-old Californian confounded the skeptics and ended his long quest for a major prestige victory.

To do it he had to break the heart of Jerry Barber, the spunky little veteran who had his first national title within grasp only to run out of gas on the final holes. Barber struggled home with a 73 for a 72-hole 278, one stroke back

of Rosburg and in a tie with another weird swinger, Doug Sanders.

Rosburg thus became the second man this year to win a big tournament using the so-called baseball grip that makes most golfing teachers wince. Art Wall Jr., its other leading exponent, won the Masters.

But it has been most closely identified through the years with Rosburg, and made him a curiosity wherever he played. He acquired a reputation for scrambling and finishing second.

With \$8,250 in first place money beckoning him, however, he delivered one of the great pressure rounds of the year.

Six strokes behind Barber, heading into the final round and all but discounted as a contender, he fired five birdies on the front nine for a 30 to equal the course record set just two days before by Barber. It pulled him even with Jerry.

Then, playing in the threesome ahead of Barber, he stayed shoulder-to-shoulder with the little man for four holes. Barber's birdie on the 15th thrust him back into the lead but he lost it by hitting into the trap on the 17th and lost the title by doing the same on the 18th.

Rosburg is a big man with a formidable girth who wears spectacles and a look of great weariness on the golf course.

Barber, aware all the time how Rosburg was going, thought he had the title when he tapped in a 20-foot putt for a par on the 16th after coming out of a trap.

"But on the last two holes I went out to lunch and forgot to come home," he said with pained humor afterward. He hit into a trap on the 17th and couldn't extricate himself without a bogey. Trapped again on the 18th, he punched 18 feet past the hole.

By this time the daylong overcast was dumping rain on the course and 12,000 spectators lining the 18th fairway and rinning the green.

Barber, walking the line of his putt, squatting to study it, and intensely reading the green, was a forlorn figure in the rain. He stroked the ball, but his confidence was gone and the ball was short.

Sanders, one stroke behind Barber after 18, hung on all day and just missed tying for the lead when he fluffed a 2½ foot putt on the 17th.

Mike Souchak, two strokes behind after 54, knocked himself out early by gunning wildly on the front nine in an effort to catch up. Defending champ Dow Finsterwald stepped into the breach with a 70 to finish fourth at 290, three strokes off the pace. Barber and Sanders each won \$3,562.50 and Finsterwald \$2,500. Ken Venturi, Souchak and Bob Goalby, who closed with a 68, wound up with \$2,000 each in a tie for fifth at 281.

Hal's Nine Wins Pair Saturday

A pair of sparkling pitching performances by Frank Detz and Gus Gestvang boosted Hal's Sport Shop, the 1959 Men's Softball League champions, past Bend, 8-1 and 2-0, in an exhibition twin-bill at Conger Field Saturday night.

The pair of victories was the third in four games against the Bend nine, as the two teams split a doubleheader in Bend last month.

Detz, who struck out 10, gave up a triple to Red Cahoon and a single to Verle Mitchell for the only Bend safeties in the first game. Roy Harris boomed out a pair of triples in four trips to lead the winners at the plate while teammate Leon Morgan added a pair of singles in three trips.

Gestvang was the complete master of the second tilt, yielding only one hit, a single by Dick Anderson, and letting only one Bend runner get as far as third base. Don Anderson led off the second with a walk and stole second and third in quick fashion, however, Gestvang struck out the side to put down the threat.

Both of Hal's tallies were scored on squeeze bunts. Dale Cunningham scored on Dick Young's bunt in the third and Chuck Ruff romped home on Gestvang's sacrifice in the fourth to wrap up the night's scoring.

Burdette takes the stretch on the pitching rubber and then fires over to first base, attempting to pick Mazeroski off the bag. The throw, however, is very wild and the ball lands in the box seats behind first base.

Do you think that:

b. He can move around to third base?
c. He can only advance to second?



Answer: C—He can only advance to second. If a ball thrown near first base is wild and goes into the box seats behind first base, the runner is not entitled to advance.

Jerry Barber's Cake Ends Up As Dough

MINNEAPOLIS (UPI)—The haunted dreams of seven sorry weeks disappeared today for Bob Rosburg.

They have been dark and dreary days, even for a man whose occupation takes him constantly into the sunshine. They were bitter and distasteful with the thoughts of what might have been.

Because seven weeks and 1,200 miles ago, the portly, pink-cheeked man from Palo Alto, Calif., threw away the U.S. Open golf championship.

Seven weeks ago, at Winged Foot Golf club in Mamaroneck, N.Y., he was right up among the leaders in the Open. He went out for the final round in position to win one of golf's greatest prizes and fulfill the dream he has cherished since tossing aside a job as an automobile salesman to shoot for fairway fame and glory.

ONE MISERABLE SHOT
But burly, bespectacled Bob tossed it all away by chopping out a soul-scarring double bogey on that prophetic 13th hole. And when it was all over he sat on the sidelines—one miserable shot back—and watched Billy Casper accept the honors.

Sunday the golfing gods got even.

Rosburg sat on the sidelines this time—in the finals of the

PGA championship—and watched another guy throw it away. And when it was over, even in his jubilation he could understand the nightmare which had to imprison little Jerry Barber, the man who might have been.

"It's a helluva way to lose," Rosburg said.

It was, indeed.

Little Jerry—fighting his 43 years, pushing back the pressure and straining every muscle in his five-foot, five-inch 133-pound body to the limit—stood only two holes from victory.

"Second again," Rosburg was thinking bitterly as he stood by futilely and almost hopelessly.

MADE A BIG RUN
He had made a big run at it, this one-time Stanford baseball and golf star who just couldn't shake the lure of the fairways.

Six shots back as the final round started, bulky Bob blazed across the front nine in a breath-taking 30 strokes—five shots under par—and then slipped to only one bogey on the back side as he finished with a brilliant four-under-par 66 for a four-round total of 277.

Meanwhile, little Jerry had been playing steadily. And he seemed to have it when, on the 15th hole, he rattled home a 12-foot putt for a birdie which put him one stroke ahead of Rosburg with only three holes remaining. Barber met another big test on the 16th, where he trapped his drive, but stroked in a 15-foot putt for a par which saved his slender, precious lead.

The fairway lates cried then for Barber, sending down a light rain. But in the sunshine above the clouds they were smiling on Rosburg, the man they had kicked around seven weeks ago.

For Barber trapped his approach shot on the 17th and took a bogey which dropped him all even with Rosburg. And on that final hole he trapped his approach again, for a bogey which dropped him down to second.

In a 20-year tournament career, little Johnny hadn't won a big one, either. But, battered by the years, he accepted it philosophical.

"On the 17th hole, the cake I was looking for turned to dough," he said. "I just went out to lunch and forgot to come back."

Eugene climbed farther out of the NWL cellar with a 6-5, 13-inning victory over Tri-City.

Babe Ruth Teams Set

The interest and tension concerning the coming Babe Ruth League State Tournament to be held in Gem Stadium beginning Thursday and continuing through Saturday of this week is mounting.

The tourney, which includes eight teams battling for the right to represent the state of Oregon in the next step in national competition, the regionals slated for Vancouver, B.C. soon, shapes up to be a battle between Klamath Falls and Portland.

Other district winners were: No. 2, Tualatin National; No. 3, The Dalles; No. 4, Northeast American; No. 5, Madison National; No. 6, Cleveland; No. 7, Grant and No. 8, Wilson.

According to reports from Portland the Madison squad and Cleveland appear to be the power ball clubs. One of them is slated for trouble, however, as they square off in the second game of the tournament.

Thursday's opener pits Grant and Wilson at 1:30 Thursday afternoon, followed by the Cleveland-Madison hassle at 3:30 p.m.

The third game of the day matches The Dalles and Northeast American at 7 p.m. while the Klamath Falls club wraps up the opening day's action with a contest with the Tualatin Nationals beginning at 9 p.m.

Friday action finds the consolation round beginning at 1:30 while the championship bracket continues at 7 p.m.

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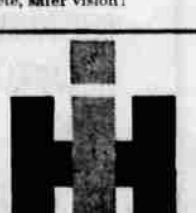
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
