

Death Claims Female Solon

GREENWICH, Conn. (AP)—The first woman Democrat in Congress, Mary T. Norton, is dead at 84.

She died Sunday of a heart attack in Greenwich Hospital.

Mrs. Norton rose through New Jersey politics and was named to run for Congress in 1924 by Frank Hague, who headed the Jersey City, N.J., Democratic organization.

She was elected, and stayed in Congress for 26 years. On her 75th birthday, in 1950, she announced that she would not seek reelection. She made the announcement from the Bethesda, Md., Naval Hospital, where she was recuperating from a combination of influenza and pneumonia.

Her career in government was not over, however. Secretary of Labor Maurice Tobin appointed her a special consultant to the Labor Department on "woman-power," and she served until the end of the Truman administration.

In her early years in Congress she drew considerable attention by calling for the repeal of prohibition, at a time when most congressmen were avoiding the subject. She introduced the first resolution calling for repeal.

Her congressional career set a record for length of service by a woman legislator. For five years she headed the House Committee on the District of Columbia, the first woman to ever head a congressional committee.

She was also named to the House Labor Committee and in 1937 became its chairman. She held that post for 10 years.

She was a strong New Dealer, helping to guide and later defend the Roosevelt administration's wage and hours legislation. She also championed the fair employment practices act.

In 1947 she was named "Outstanding Catholic Woman of the Year."

She was married to Robert F. Norton, a businessman, in 1909. He died in 1934. Their only child died soon after birth.

Mrs. Norton came to Greenwich three years ago.

She leaves two sisters, Mrs. Joseph McDonagan of Greenwich and Mrs. Ann Hopkins of New York City.

Heavy Rains Hit Nebraska

Rain-battered eastern Nebraska cleaned up Monday from a storm that flattened crops, knocked out power and communication lines and blocked highways.

A survey of police and fire officials indicated the violent rains that poured down on the area Sunday caused damage estimated in the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Schuyler, Neb., reported 9.30 inches of rain, with more than eight inches falling in little more than three hours. Many business places and homes were damaged by the gushing water.

One utility worker said basement walls had caved in at more than 75 homes in a small area of suburban West Omaha, which also received about nine inches of rain.

At least six bridges in the Omaha area were threatened by the swirling, debris-laden water, but there were no reports of any washouts.

The Weather Bureau said showers and thundershowers were scattered Sunday from the western Great Lakes across the upper Mississippi Valley into the Dakotas. Scattered showers also fell from the western portions of Kansas and Nebraska across the central Rockies and into the southern plateau region.

Cool Canadian air covered the northeast corner of the country from Maine through New York, Pennsylvania and into West Virginia, where temperatures were mostly in the 50s during the night. Westward to the Pacific Coast it was warmer.

A general warming trend was expected to accompany scattered showers from the upper Mississippi Valley into the Great Lakes area Monday. Elsewhere, skies were expected to be mostly fair with a chance of a few scattered thundershowers.

NATO Forces Sign Treaty

BONN, Germany (AP)—A seven-nation treaty on stationing of North Atlantic forces in West Germany was signed here today.

The treaty detailed conditions governing the stay in West Germany of NATO troops.

It was signed by West German Deputy Foreign Minister Hilger van Scherpenberg and the ambassadors of the United States, Britain, France, the Netherlands, Belgium and Canada—the countries whose troops are in Germany.

Forgotten River Kills Patrolman

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Is there such a thing as a lost stream?

A tragedy has revealed that there is.

It all started Saturday night when patrolman Joseph Reiss, 35, was checking a reported cave-in at a street intersection in north-eastern Philadelphia.

Suddenly the earth below him crumbled without warning. He was swallowed into a gaping hole 43 feet deep, 60 feet long, and 60 feet wide. There has been no trace of him since.

City Water Commissioner Samuel Baxter said that the cave-in was caused by the collapse of an 11-foot arch over a forgotten stream that had been turned into a sewer 75 years ago.

Rockefeller-Norway Miss Set August Wedding Date

KRISTIANSAND, Norway (AP)—Steven Rockefeller and a former maid in his wealthy family's home plan a late summer wedding in a small Lutheran church in Norway.

Gov. and Mrs. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York said they are delighted at their son's engagement to Anne Marie Rasmussen, 21, pretty blonde daughter of a prosperous Kristiansand grocer.

"She is a wonderful girl," the governor said.

Announcing their engagement Sunday, the young couple did not set a wedding date. But a friend of the Rasmussens family said it would probably be Aug. 22.

It will be performed by the Rev. Olav Gaustad in the Lutheran Church at nearby Soegne. The pastor is an old friend of the Rasmussens. The Rockefellers are Baptists.

The governor has indicated he and his wife will come to Scandinavia for the wedding.

"I can't imagine that I would not participate in the wedding of any of my children," he told newsmen Saturday.

Steven, 23, and the third of his parents' five children, first met Anne Marie when she came to the United States in 1936 to learn English and worked for a time as a maid in his home. She left the Rockefeller employ in 1957 to work in a New York department store, then worked for an insurance firm in New York.

After serving an army hitch, young Rockefeller flew to Oslo July 10 and met Anne Marie. They came on to her home by motorcycle, and the romance rumors have been booming ever since.

The girl's father, Kristian Rasmussen, appeared with the couple at a news conference Sunday.

"If our daughter will be happy this way, we will not stop her," he said.

Radiant Anne Marie, wearing a charcoal grey frock with rose polka dots, showed reporters her modest-sized engagement ring—a diamond surrounded by smaller diamonds and set in platinum.

ALBANY, Ore. (AP)—U. S. mail sacks and other stolen goods were reported discovered Sunday in a car that ran out of control and crashed near Albany, state police said.

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Backers Face Road Block In Civil Rights Measure

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Civil rights backers try for the third time today to crack through southern opposition blocking Senate Judiciary Committee action on a mild, two-part civil rights bill.

The southerners, led by Chairman James O. Eastland (D-Miss.), were able to postpone consideration of the measure when supporters first brought it up June 20.

Sen. Olin D. Johnston (D-S.C.) exercised his personal privilege and forced another delay at the committee's regular weekly session last Monday.

Even if supporters are able to persuade the committee to take up the bill today, it probably will take a week or maybe longer to reach the voting stage. Backers feel they have the strength to win approval and send the full Senate if and when the committee votes.

Other congressional news:

Labor Reform: Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.), co-author of the Senate-passed labor reform bill, warned that House approval of a "punitive" clean-up measure would endanger the prospects of any anti-racketeering legislation this year. But House Republican Leader Charles A. Halleck (Ind.) announced he would vote against reform legislation unless the House approved a tougher administration-backed substitute.

CHICAGO (UPI)—The American Medical Assn. took a dim view today of some doctors charging a dollar every time a patient telephones for advice. The association's AMA News said fees for home and office calls should be pegged high enough "to compensate for occasional services such as telephone consultations, medical reports and filling out insurance forms."
