Twenty Six Soviet Brass Defect In Eight Months

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Something very curious is happening inside the minds of some Soviet officials.

And it must have Russia's ruler, Nikita Khrushchev, puzzled and worried.

Mostly it has been kept secret — only a few cases have hit the newspapers — but in the past eight months throughout the world, 26 Soviet officials have defected.

These aren't refugees; they are officials who have been screened and rescreened for loyalty before being sent abroad.

The number doesn't include ordinary cultural exchanges, athletes, or average citizens who have finally found some way to escape.

It doesn't include everyday men and women who have worked their way on a dark night across the no man's land and under the barbed wire between the East and West to get to freedom.

The 26 includes only embassy officials, military attaches, prize-winning writers, government officials high and low, all men with some authority in the Communist hierarchy.

A handful of these have been well publicized. There was Alexander Ureviceh Kazachayev, an information officer in the Soviet Embassy in Rangoon, Burma.

In May, 40 Soviet guards hustled Russian military attaché Col. Mikhail I. Stryginsky from a Rangoon hospital and put him aboard a Soviet-bound plane. He'd attempted to jump from a hospital window after making an abortive attempt to escape to freedom.

A short time ago a Chinese Communist Embassy official asked the Burmese Government for asylum. He was beaten up attempting to escape.

Late last year, famed Russian novelist Alexander Teheyshvili defected into Germany. Teheyshvili was a sometime winner of the Stalin Prize for a novel praising the Soviet collective farm system.

But for every defector who is known, a fistful have been kept secret. The reasons: to protect the defector, to keep the Soviet Union from knowing precisely what is happening, sometimes to protect people who have cooperated in the defection.

If these defections puzzle Khrushchev, so do they puzzle the top U.S. cold war strategists. In the Pentagon and at the State Department there's a lot of head scratching by men determined to come up with an answer.

Perhaps a way can be found to increase the flow of defections. These men are of immense value.

"Lenny, the youngest, was babied all his life. He's the most lovable I think. Even the twins are different. Denny is the most affectionate of all of them. He's a real softy. Phil is the biggest of the boys and something of a philosopher."

"Different as they are, they're all close friends. When they were kids they didn't have many playmates so they stuck close together."

Grandfather Wyatt said he rarely sees Bing since Dixie's death. He visits the Groaner every Christmas to exchange gifts. Retired now, he was in the insurance business for 25 years in Los Angeles.

"Only way to see Bing except during the holidays is to spend the night at his house and catch him at 8 o'clock in the morning for breakfast," he laughed. "He's been a mighty fine son-in-law for the years."

"He's proud of those boys of his, too. I know he is."

"So was Dixie. She was very close to the youngsters until she passed away in 1952. Dixie was just a high school girl when she went into show business back in Chicago."

"If she had been sitting here tonight watching those boys sing and dance it would have been a wonderful thing."

Wyatt touched the corner of his eye and started for his room.

"It was a night to remember," he said.

Four Preachers Bury Uncle Jim

WHITESBURG, Ky. (AP) — Uncle Jim's folks are going to bury him on a hillside near his home at Blackey tomorrow, following in detail the instructions he wrote before his death.

Tucked beside him in the coffin will be his extracted teeth, carefully saved during his 93 years, 9 months, 27 days.

The old-fashioned coffin — narrow at each end and wide in the middle — which he ordered several years ago will be placed in the grave and rocks piled atop it.

There will be four preachers at the service at Mount Olive Baptist Church which Uncle Jim, a carpenter, built.

Uncle Jim's correct, though less familiar, name was James Brown. He died Saturday of a heart ailment.

He wore a flowing white beard and was the patriarch of Blackey — the man who gave the tiny east Kentucky village its name — the nickname of his brother Joe.

Ten of Uncle Jim's 11 children survive. He had 54 grandchildren, 65 great-grandchildren and 17 great-great-grandchildren.

Says one State Department official: "I hope we can find some way to keep this flow going. It's making a lot of people stop and listen to what we have to say for the first time."

Redeye Set For Infantry

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Army and Marines are going to equip infantrymen with a new guided missile designed to knock down low-flying combat planes.

Sketchy details of the new weapon, called "the Redeye," were disclosed and test models were shown as part of the annual three-day meeting here of the Assn. of the U.S. Army.

The Redeye looks like a World War II anti-tank bazooka. The weapon, fired from the shoulder, has an infra-red "heat seeker" in its nose which will carry it to a straining or bombing airplane that gets within range.

The Redeye and its launcher weigh 20 pounds. The weapon is four feet long.

The Army has awarded a six-million-dollar contract to develop the weapon to Convair Division of General Dynamics Corp., which will do the work at its Pomona, Calif., plant.

Wagon Train Moving Again

PENDLETON (AP) — The Oregon Centennial Wagon train headed west along U.S. Highway 30 toward the Columbia River today, after spending the weekend encamped here.

The seven wagons are expected to reach The Dalles next weekend. The wagons will be put on barges there to float down the Columbia River to a point near Portland, just as they were by early day pioneers.

The 50ers took to the air Sunday for a 70-mile flight to Joseph, where they paraded at the Chief Joseph Days celebration.

Nearing the end of their four-month jaunt from Independence, Mo., the wagons are due in Independence, Ore. Aug. 14.
