TODAY'S 2-MINUTE MYSTERY THE CASE OF THE DEAD LOSER

The night of July 19 was unusually hot, and tempers flared quickly. In a downtown Portland bar, Reg Babcox and Harry McClean nearly came to blows. But both men drove off in Babcox's car, their differences apparently settled.

Two hours later a motorist driving along the mile straightaway between Portland and Dans Falls found the body of McClean, stripped to the waist, in the middle of the blacktop road.

An autopsy disclosed McClean had suffered a concussion as well as facial injuries. Death, however, was due to his being run over by an automobile. The marks of a tire, clearly impressed on his midsection, had a tread similar to those of Babcox's sedan.

"We tested the sedan's tires, but found nothing," Sheriff Monahan told Dr. Haledjian. "Babcox admits that the argument flared up anew after he and McClean left the bar. They pulled off the road, stripped to the waist, and fought it out."

"Babcox says he left McClean unconscious beside the road. He believes McClean, recovering partial consciousness, dragged himself to the middle of the road, and was killed by a hit-run driver."

"Did you find McClean's shirt at the scene of the fight?" asked Haledjian.

"We did," replied the sheriff. "Now all we have to do is find the driver. The tire tread is common, and could fit a hundred thousand cars."

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Little Rock School Board Selects Six

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — The Little Rock School Board has assigned six Negroes to once-white public high schools which the board intends to reopen in September, a board member said Saturday.

Fifty-five Negroes registered for the fall term at Little Rock's three white high schools which were closed last year in the integration dispute.

Three Negroes were assigned to Central High School and three to Hall High under the first use of an Arkansas pupil placement law.

The board chose the pupil assignment system in order to obey a federal mandate for integration of the Little Rock School District and at the same time hold desegregation to a minimum.

Mrs. L. C. Bates, president of the Arkansas Branch of the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People, charged the School Board was not acting "in good faith" in making so few Negro assignments.

"I'm sure we'll appeal this board action to the federal court," she said.

Everett Tucker Jr., president of the school board, said he felt the board was proceeding in good faith in assigning the six Negroes.

"Any of the 2,250 white and Negro students registered for the four public high schools who feel they are dissatisfied are entitled to pursue administrative remedies between now and school-opening," Tucker said.

The pupil placement plan allows for assignment appeals to the school board.

It provides for assignment of students on the basis of such factors as educational aptitude, health and availability of transportation facilities. Race is not a factor.

Nixon May Join Dam Dedication

THE DALLES, Ore. (AP)—Vice President Richard Nixon will be asked to officiate at dedication of the 250 million dollar The Dalles Dam on the Columbia River Sept. 26.

The Dalles Chamber of Commerce turned to Nixon after President Eisenhower's appointment secretary said the President probably would not be able to attend.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Col. A. Ralph Steinberg, 62, who rose from a New York City commissioner in 1932 to national posts with the Franklin D. Roosevelt administration, died here Friday of a heart attack. In 1936 he was national coordinator for the Democratic party and secretary of Tammany Hall. He later held many government posts.

Top Fashion Designer In Paris Falls Far Behind Promises For Short Skirt

PARIS (AP) — Yves Saint-Laurent, for Dior, cut the highest hemlines of the season today, some of them showing the kneecap in front, and even resurrected sacks.

He calls it all the "New Woman of 1960" look.

According to the 22-year-old heir to the late Christian Dior's fashion crown, this collection is deliberately aimed to be spectacular. But his show just doesn't go that far.

None of the new skirts are literally above the knee, and all curve down in the back.

Only a few of his boldest skirts show the kneecap in front, while a great many are at the top of the calf, and the big majority cover the knees completely.

In many evening models, Saint-Laurent brought back the sack.

Most new Dior creations are so flat-chested they look steam-rollered, but some have the deep-down décolletage known as "cleavage."

Waists range from small and belted to undefined to simon-pure sack. The dress and suit silhouette is generally trimly streamlined, but full-length coats look like capes in black view.

Mannequins wore chokers of beads from chin to collarbone for what was a sort of giraffe-necked effect. Saucer-sized round earrings went with them. Shoes had peculiar bent-under needle heels and needle points.

Black is the top color, with reds and blues to cheer up the many browns, beiges and grays.

In the cocktail and evening clothes, many have long trains behind but are looped up the knee in front. The kneecaps play peek-a-boo under draped and ruched strapless sheaths that fit like the skin to the hipline. One shock number was slit and draped up the right side so one whole kneecap showed when the wearer walked.

There were some elbow-length cape collars, and full cape coats with arm slits. Loose 3/4-length kimono sleeved coats were worn over matching dresses that imitated suits. Sleeveless or short cape-sleeved sheaths were covered with short matching jackets.
