Run, Pitch ChiSox Weapons

After Luis Aparicio and Nellie Fox bunt and run you dizzy, Al Lopez waves in Turk Lown or Gerry Staley to shut the door in your face.

That is the reason the Chicago White Sox are three games out front in the American League today and pulling away fast. Except for the runner-up Cleveland Indians, the rest of the league is fading into the gloaming. Both Baltimore and Kansas City, tied for third, are 11 games back. And the Yankees? They are 12 games down in fourth place.

ChiSox 3-9, Nats 2-3

The little men did it again Sunday in the first game with Washington, slashing and racing to upset the punchy Senators. Trailing 2-1 in the last of the ninth, Aparicio opened, with a single. Fox bunted and catcher Steve Koczek threw the ball away. Aparicio scored and Fox dashed to third. Two intentional walks loaded the bases and Billy Goodman plunked a fly ball single into left over a drawn in outfield for a 3-2 victory.

Lown, who took over after Billy Pierce left for a pinch hitter in the eighth, won his eighth despite a shaky ninth inning. It was his fifth straight.

Again in the second game, when Bob Shaw began to stumble in the eighth, in came Staley to breeze through 1 1/3 hitless innings, saving Shaw's 10th victory, 9-3.

Francona had four singles in the first game and a double and single before his homer. The only time the Orioles got him out was when third baseman Brooks Robinson made a diving catch of a line drive.

Gary Bell won his 11th in the second while Al Cicotte lost his first on relief in the opener. Hoyt Wilhelm was Baltimore's winner and O'Dell, who worked in both games, dropped the second. Cleveland's attendance soared over the million mark to 1,069,562 with the turnout of 34,682.

All-Star Fans Face 'Scorcher'

LOS ANGELES (AP)—There was a 24-hour truce in the red-hot major league pennant races today as interest switched to the season's second All-Star Game.

Casey Stengel, already beleaguered by the grave problems of his own New York Yankees, faced new troubles as pilot of the American League squad.

Intensity of the flag race in his league apparently left the old warrior with only two rested pitchers, Baltimore's Jerry Walker (8-5) and Pete Ramos (10-13) of Washington.

Manager Fred Haney of Milwaukee was set to lead off with ace right-hander Don Drysdale of Los Angeles for the Nationals.

Today's all-star affair was the second edition of 1959, and the American all-stars were seeking revenge for their 5-4 loss at Pittsburgh July 7.

The site is big Memorial Coliseum, the time for the game 4 p.m., and upwards of 50,000 are expected to brave 90-degree-plus heat for Los Angeles' first turn as host of the event.

The brass was here, including Commissioner Ford Frick and the rival league presidents, Joe Cronin of the American and Warren Giles of the National, plus other top names in the game.

But the eyes of the fans were set for the galaxy of stars, and doubtless the Coliseum's controversial left field screen, which stands 250 feet from home plate at the foul line and rises 40 feet.

Haney is well acquainted with the screen. Stengel is no total stranger to it. He saw it when his Yankees played Los Angeles in the Roy Campanella benefit earlier this year before a crowd of 93,103—largest in U.S. baseball history.

Casey, with right-hander Drysdale in mind, named no less than six left-handed batters to his starting lineup.

But what to do about pitching was something else. Stengel was set to start fireballer Ryne Duren of New York. This would have been a dilly. But he had to use Duren for 3 2/3 innings against Kansas City Sunday.

Four other American League all-star hurlers were pressed into action Sunday. They were Hoyt Wilhelm and Billy O'Dell of Baltimore, Cal McLish of Cleveland, and Bud Daley of Kansas City.

Walker was belatedly named Sunday to replace his teammate, catcher Gus Triandos, and Ramos was subbed for teammate Camilo Pascual. Triandos and Pascual had injuries.

Walker pitched one inning in relief Saturday, and Ramos last pitched Friday night. He has lost five straight.

So Casey had his problems. His lead-off left-hand batters, barring further changes, are Pete Runnels of Boston, Nellie Fox of the White Sox, Ted Williams of the Red Sox, Yogi Berra, and switch-hitting Mickey Mantle of the Yankees, and Roger Maris of Kansas City.

The right-handers are Frank Malzone of Boston, Luis Aparicio of Chicago, and Walker.

Willies Keep SF On Top

The new firm of Willie McCovey and Willie Mays are keeping the San Francisco Giants on top of the National League. They provided the dynamite Sunday while Johnny Antonelli's 15th victory — a six-hitter — tamed the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-3.

McCovey is hitting a sensational .500 with 9-for-18 since the Giants moved him up from their Phoenix farm last Thursday. He went 4-for-4 the first day, knocked in the winning run the second and then went 3-for-5 Saturday.

The newest Willie hit his first major league home run — a 390-blast off Roony Kline with Jim Davenport on in the fourth inning. Mays put the Giants out in front to stay with a seventh-inning double off loser Bob Porterfield. Once again Davenport scored.

The Giants added another run in the eighth off Roy Face (still 14-0).

Rookie Jay Hook and veteran Brooks Lawrence teamed up with a five-hit shutout for Cincinnati's 2-0 decision over Chicago. Hook gave up only three hits but walked three in a row in the seventh, bringing Lawrence from the bullpen.

Singles by Eddie Kasko, Vada Pinson and Gus Bell and a double steal accounted for Cincinnati's two runs in the third off loser Dave Hillman.

Richards Attacks 2nd Tilt

CLEVELAND (AP)—In a soft, Texas drawl, Paul Richards accused major league officials of "a miserable act of maleasance."

The mild-mannered Baltimore manager, angered by arrangements for today's major league All-Star game, Sunday night spoke out against it as a "money-grabbing exhibition" and a "b i a c k mark on all of baseball."

"The entire thing is a travesty," said Richards.

"In the first place, it's not important enough to take three days off to run right, like they did the first one. It's drawing little interest from the newspapers and it doesn't look like it will draw the way it should."

"If they have about 40,000 empty seats with the best players in the game coming to Los Angeles... then it will be a black mark on all of baseball."

"But worse than that, this exhibition is now being allowed to interfere with something which is supposed to be important — the American League pennant race."

Richards erupted after pitcher Jerry Walker was named to the All-Star squad Sunday in place of the Orioles alling catcher, Gus Triandos. The manager, with starting pitchers Hoyt Wilhelm and Billy O'Dell also on the All-Star roster, was looking ahead to a three-game series with the league-leading Chicago White Sox.

"Yet we plan our pitching so we have Walker to open Tuesday night against Chicago, and now, with no warning whatsoever, we are supposed to look for somebody else..."

Scott Valley Stars Victor In Stadium Thriller Sunday

A mighty blast that cleared the right field wall with ease spoiled what would have been a three-hit shutout for smiling Pete Storti, a big right-handed chucker for the Scott Valley Stars, but he still had a pretty fair day as the Stars whacked the Klamath Kubs 5-1 in a Northern Cal League baseball game in Gem Stadium Sunday afternoon.

The game was the last home stand for the Kubs in Nor-Cal regularly scheduled league play. The league winds up the regular season next Sunday.

Storti, one of the coolest performers ever seen on the Gem pitching rubber, had little trouble with vaunted batting power of the Kubs, allowing the KF nine only four hits over the nine inning distance.

Rube Johnson, the versatile state policeman who has missed most of the Kubs games because of the demands of his job, stepped to the plate, the first man up in the sixth canto, and smashed a one-two pitch into right-field oblivion to score the Kubs only tally. Johnson, who has worked the outfield, started the Sunday game as the catcher then moved to first base in the top of the sixth to make room for newcomer, Davey Saks, behind the plate.

The only other Kub extra-baser was a second inning double by outfielder Floyd Linderman. He poled one high on the wall in left center a good 400 feet from home plate. The rebound helped to hold him at second where he died as Storti dispatched the next three KF batters neatly.

Storti struck out 16 Kubs and walked five in gaining his win.

The loss was charged to Ed Vegley who was lifted for Blake Griggs in the fourth frame after he had given up singles to Don Purdy, Storti and a triple to SV catcher Rod Vinal. An error by Irv Whitte coupled with a walk rapped the Stars with three runs, and Griggs was summoned to the hill. Vegley gave up four hits, five walks and fanned three during his stint.

Griggs, one of the four ex-legionnaires to join the Kubs recently, made his first appearance in a Kub suit. He forced the first man he faced, Fred Gonzales, to ground out to the box in the fourth and from here on was effective in allowing only five hits, two walks and fanning five while permitting the Stars two runs.

A key to the Scott Valley success was the long ball. Six of the nine SV hits were extra-basers. Third-sacker Dale Evans rapped a triple, a double and a single in five trips; Vinal doubled; Purdy collected two doubles and a single and Storti accomplished a single and a two-baser in four trips.

Rich Depew, the young ex-legionnaire, who finished up the game in center field turned in a sparkling catch and rapped a sharp single for the Kubs.

The other KF hit was a single by first-sacker Bob Janes.

The Kubs threatened in the bottom of the ninth when Depew singled with one out. Bob Kelly, who pinch-hit for second baseman Butch Kimpton, forced Depew at second, however, on a fielder's choice. Kelly then advanced to second when Saks got aboard on an error off a sharp blow to second, but both died on the sacks when John Bianchi fled out to the shortstop.

The Stars scored in the fourth, the seventh and the top of the ninth. The ninth inning tally came when Dale Evans who had doubled, scored from third, stealing home on Griggs.

The stands, a better than average crowd attending the game, seemed highly pleased with the appearance of the newcomers to the Kub lineup, and manager Irv Whitte said in the locker room following the game, "These boys will definitely help our club. We'll be playing some extra-season games and they will see a lot of action yet this year."

In addition to Griggs, Saks and Depew, little Don Willey performed a creditable job on third base where he relieved Dean Dunson in the fourth.
